FORTY HOURS DEVOTION

Although much of the history of this popular devotion in the Church is obscure, it is a generally accepted fact that it began in Milan in 1537. Approved by the reigning Pope and enriched with indulgences it spread throughout the world. In many diocese definite efforts are made to distribute the devotion so that when it closes in one parish, it opens in another.

A solemn High Mass called the "Mass of Exposition" is sung at the beginning, and a "Mass of Reposition" at the end. On the intervening day a "Mass for Peace" is said. The exact period of forty hours is not strictly adhered to.

The singing of the Litany of the Saints, and a procession in honor of the Blessed Sacrament are also parts of the ceremonial.

A plenary indulgence is granted to those who receive the sacraments of Penance and Holy Eucharist during the Forty Hours and in addition make a visit and pray for the Holy Father's intentions, saying six Our Fathers, six Hail Marys, and six Glorias.

Here at Sacred Heart, the Forty Hours opened on Sunday, May 19 with a Solemn High Mass of which Father Ryan was celebrant, Father Ronan Dowd of St. Gabriel's Passionist Monastery was deacon, and Father Koenig was sub-deacon. The servers were Firmin Koehler, Joseph Burke, John Doyle, James Fangman and Leo Fitzgerald. Thomas Fangman was cross bearer and led of procession of white-robed boys and girls which accompanied the Blessed Sacrament as it was borne through the church.

The altar was decorated with spring flowers by members of the Ladies Aid Society.

On Monday and Tuesday Mass was celebrated at 6:30 and at 8:00. At the 8 o'clock Mass, as also at the evening devotions Father Ronan spoke on the great gifts that God has given us in the Blessed Sacrament, in Holy Communion, and in the Mass. His talks were simple, forceful, and inspiring, and large crowds attended both the morning and evening services.



RECEIVE FIRST COMMUNION

May 5 will always be remembered as their "First Holy Communion Day" by twenty-two children of Sacred Heart parish.

The girls were dressed in white, the boys wore dark suits.

The main and side altars were decorated with peach colored glads and bridal wreath.

During the Mass, the Glee Club sang appropriate hymns--"Little White Guest," "Mother of Christ," "Jesus, Thou Art Coming," and "O Lord, I am not Worthy."

As the sacred moment of receiving their First Holy Communion approached, the children were led into the sanctuary by Peter Fleming and Bobby Garvey in white suits with gold capes and sashes, and by William James Conway, Jerry Manriquez, Michael Stammeyer and Daniel Garvey with blue capes and sashes.

Sister Mary William James prepared the children for this important event in their lives.

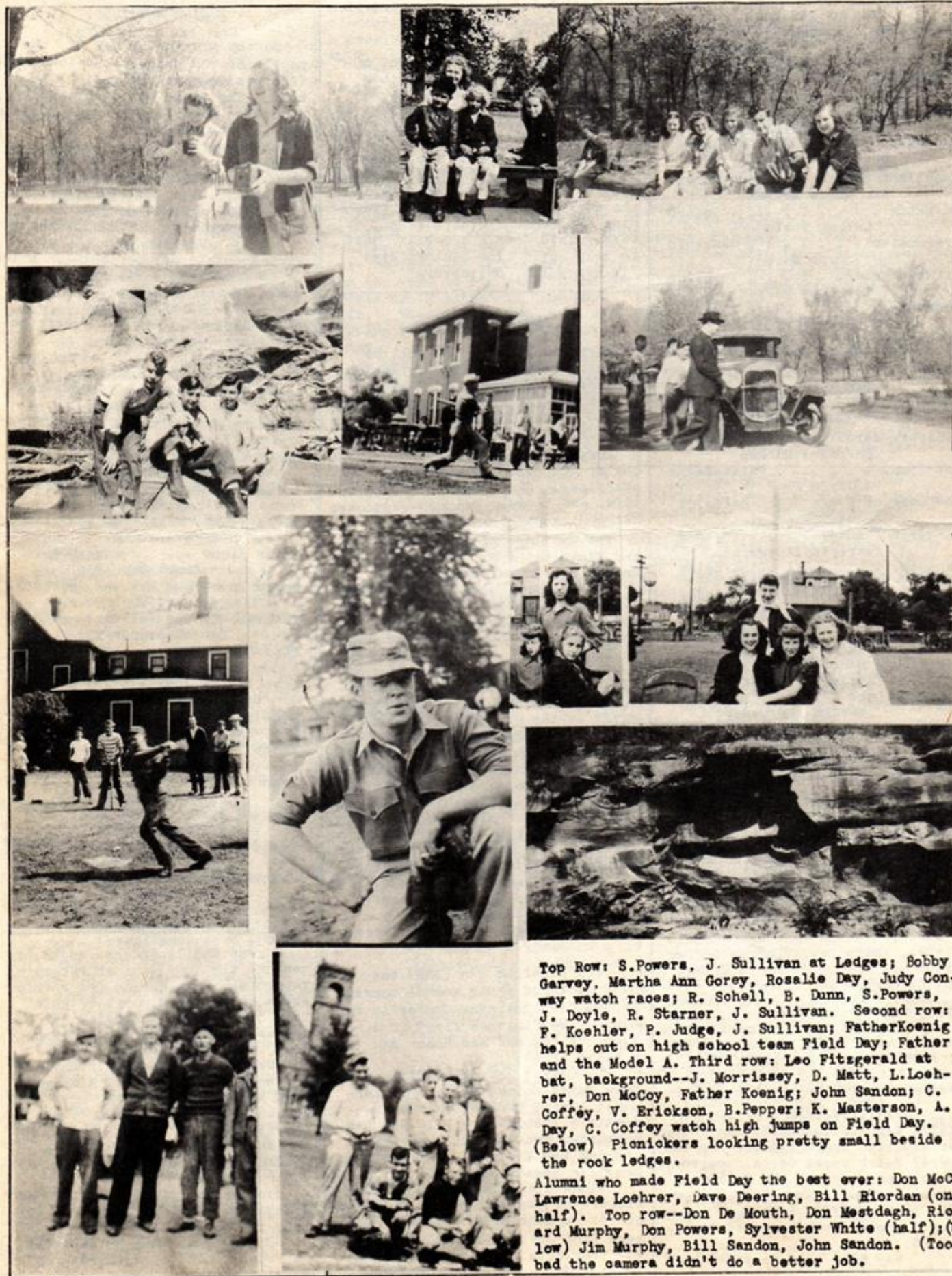
