This month we are discussing a career which will interest all girls - Beauty Culture. We have inter-viewed Ruth Conway, a local beauty operator, and we have consulted an article written by Helena The career Rubinstien, a famous beauty culturist. of beauty culturists has increased greatly in scope within recent years and has attained the dignity of a major profession. The Beauty Culturist is primarily a lay advisor to women and sometimes men on the problems such as; skin care, make-up, rejuvenation, dieting, and the care of hair, neck, and hands. high-school education and preferable a college back ground is important to the Beauty Culturist if she is to command the respect and confidence of her patrons. She should know the fundamentals of organic chemistry and cosmetic chemistry as well as Facial Anatomy. The most important training of all is the hard school of experience.

The field offers great opportunities for much advancement. A girl may become a salon manager for a large beauty salon or even open her own shop. The beginner will start with about \$1,500 to \$2,000 a year and her salary will be increased as she pro-

gresses in her field and profession.

Desirable qualifications for success are; she should possess an interest in the welfare of other women and a sympathic attitude toward their beauty problems. She should be tactful and agreeable.
