



SPELLING CONTEST

Junior high students from Sacred Heart received top honors in both the written and oral divisions of the City Spelling Contest, held on Saturday, March 11, at Boone High.

First place in the city contest was attained by Lorraine Conway, who also won the oral contest. Tom Rinker won first in the written contest but was defeated by Lorraine in the final competition. Richard Rinker was second in the oral contest.

Ethel Ann Vest and Martha Clark were the other Sacred Heart students who were among the twenty five contestants representing the various schools of Boone.



As a representative of Sacred Heart Parish, our revered pastor, Reverend J. J. Ryan, is busily preparing for his Holy Year pilgrimage to Rome. Father plans to leave Boone shortly after Easter going to New York City, from where he will depart for Italy on the "S. S. Atlantic," the ship that recently brought Cardinal Spellman and his New York pilgrimage group home from Europe.

Father expects to arrive in Naples for the Feast of St. Januarius, May 6, and may be present when the blood of the saint preserved in the Cathedral of Naples changes from its normally solid state to that of a liquid, as it sometimes does on his feast day.

After viewing the many sights in the vicinity of Naples, including Pompeii and Vesuvius, Father intends to continue on to Rome, the Eternal City—destination of all Catholic pilgrims during the Holy Year—and spend nine days there including the Feast of the Ascension. Father will visit the four major basilicas of St. Peter, St. Paul, St. John Lateran, and St. Mary Major; and recite the prescribed prayers in order to gain the Holy Year Indulgence. He plans to be a member of one or more of the pilgrim groups who will enjoy the happy privilege of an audience with the Holy Father, and he will present to him a Spiritual Bouquet from the children of Sacred Heart School.

Father will then continue on into northern Italy, stopping at Assisi, the home of St. Francis; Venice; Milan, where he will see the famed gothic Cathederal of Milan, and the original painting of "The Last Supper" by Leonardo da Vinci; then north through the Alps by way of St. Gothard Pass to Luzern, Switzerland. Returning south to Genoa, the birthplace of Columbus, he plans to go from there along the French Riviera to Marseilles; thence to the famous shrine of Lourdes in the French Pyrenees.

Proceeding to Paris, Father plans to spend several days visiting the many notable religious shrines in that city and its environs
including side trips to the cathedrals of Rheims and Chartres. He
then intends to go to Ireland by air and, after a few days there, to
return to London for a short stay. Going on to the English port of
Southampton, Father will return to New York on the "Queen Mary", and
will be back in Boone on July first.





1850 - ONE HUNDRED YEARS - 1950

The decade which starts with the year 1950 will mark the one hundredth anniversary of the establishment of the Catholic Church in Boone. Therefore, it is an excellent time to stop for a moment and look back over the eventful his - tory of the parish.

The first priest to reach Boonesboro, in the early 1850's, found two Catholic families in the community. This little "parish" had no permanent pastor until the late '50's when a Father Delaney was made the first shepherd. He built a church in West Boone dedicated to St. Joseph, which was occupied a year before seats were furnished.

When the Northwestern Railroad was built through Boone in 1865 the size of the parish increased greatly, and as most of this increase was in Boone rather than West Boone, Mass was celebrated in Ive's Hall on Rast Eighth Street, Boone, as well as in St. Joseph Church. In 1880 the present site of the church and school was purchased and a building known as Sodality Hall was built for the church on the southwest corner of Twelfth and Marshall. It has since been moved to Madrid, Iowa.

During the winter of 1882, the rectory, together with all parish records, was destroyed by fire, and the next year a new parochial residence, the present school building, was erected.

In 1887 Rev. B. C. Lenihan was assigned as pastor. He established Sacred Heart School, and lived in the sacristy of the church while the rectory was used for studies.

In 1892 and 1893 the present church building was erected. It was redecorated in 1938. The original rectory building, adapted and remodeled to changing conditions, served for convent and school at first, then for school purposes only. It was remodeled in the 1920's to accommodate an auditorium.

Since 1910 Sacred Heart Parish has had only three pastors. New. James P. Barron served the local "flock" from 1910 to 1924; Father Masterson, from 1924 to 1931; and our present "shepherd", Father Ryan, from 1931 until now.

We can be proud of the many achievements which have marked the history of Sacred Heart Parish, and a glance at the Communion rail during Sunday Mass will serve to show that all this advancement has not been in the material reals. Despite many obstacles, the faith and pisty of Boone Catholies has been steadily increasing, and has affected favorably the attitude of non-Catholie neighbors.


