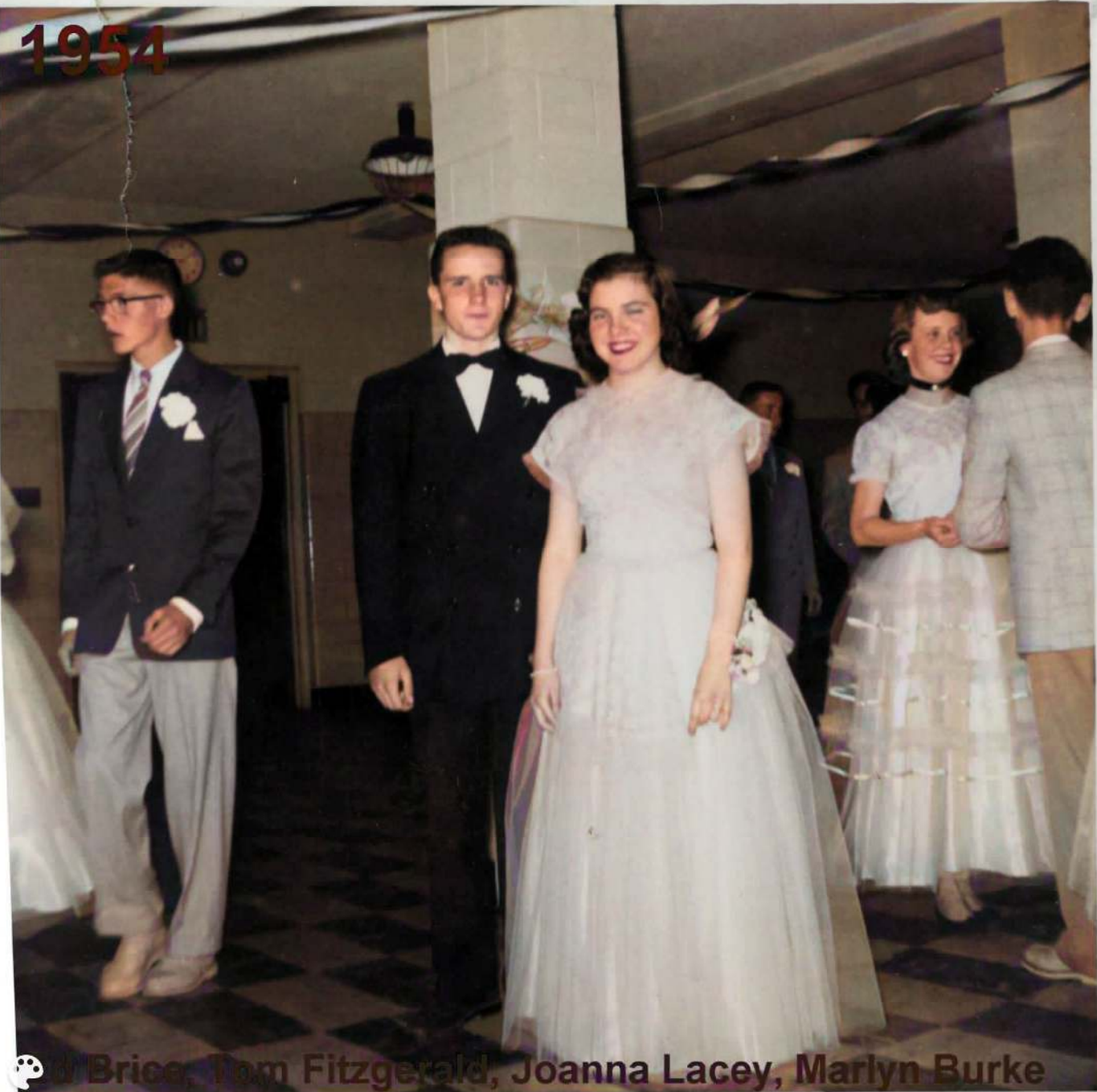




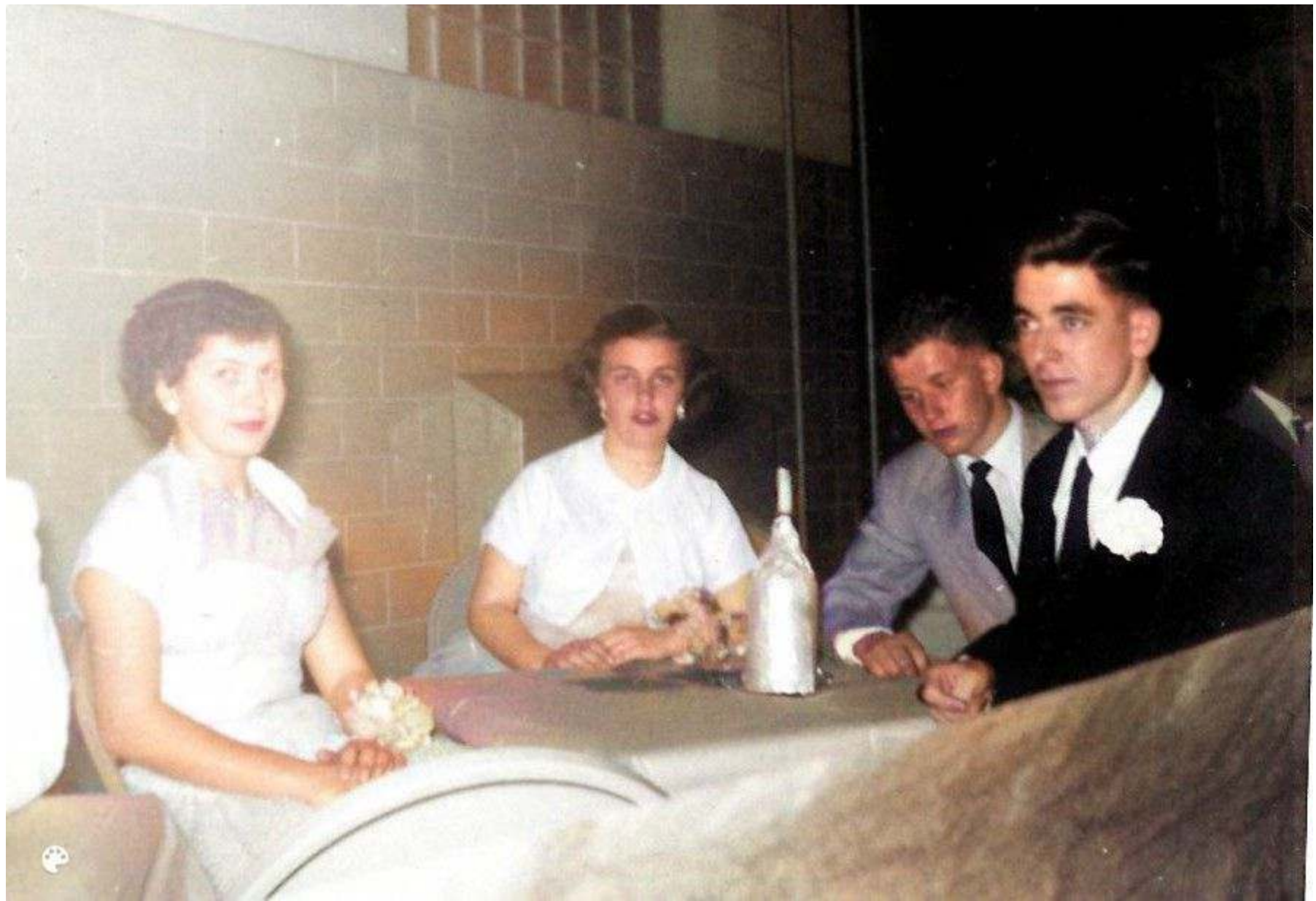

Students Enjoy Gala Evening

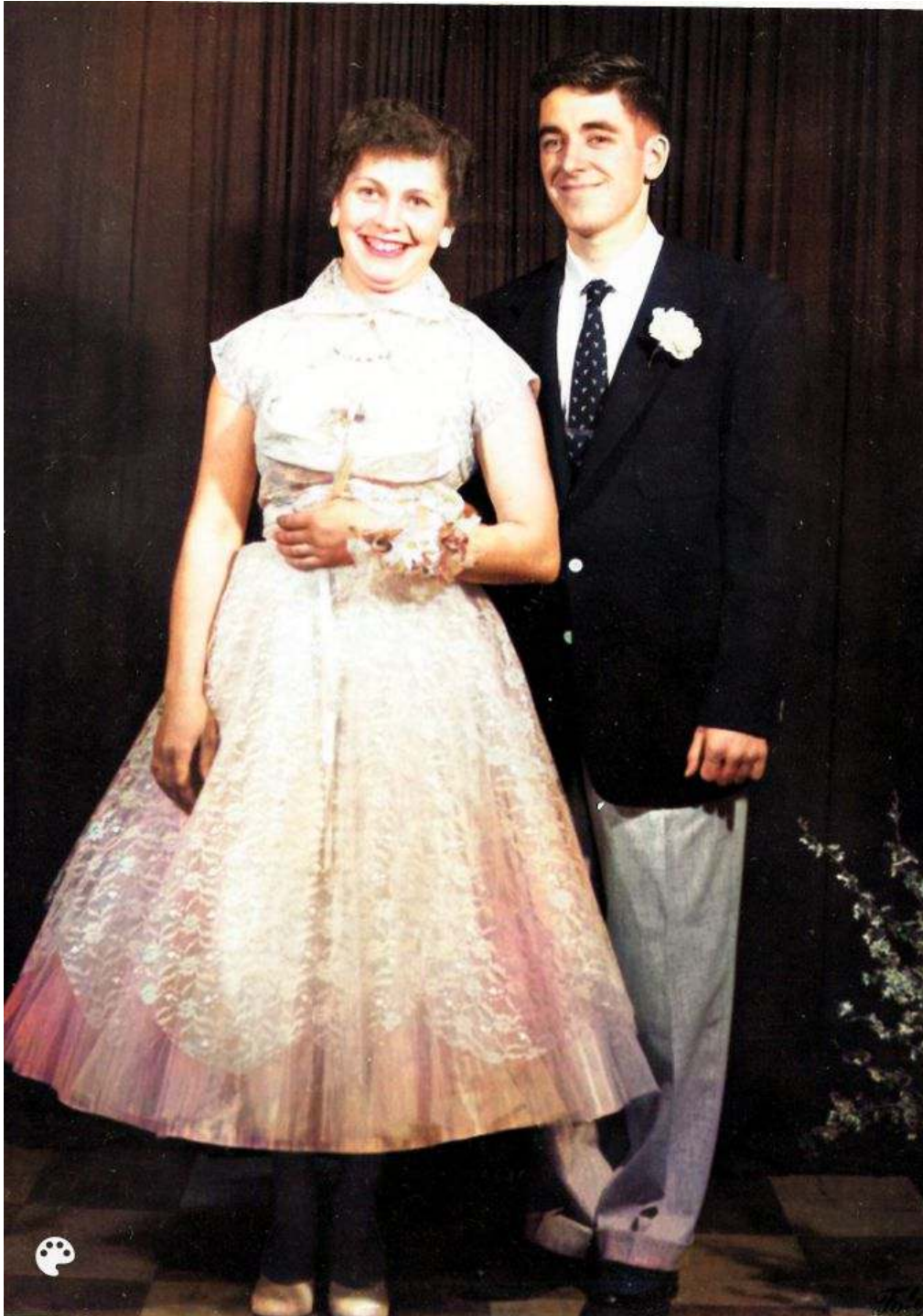

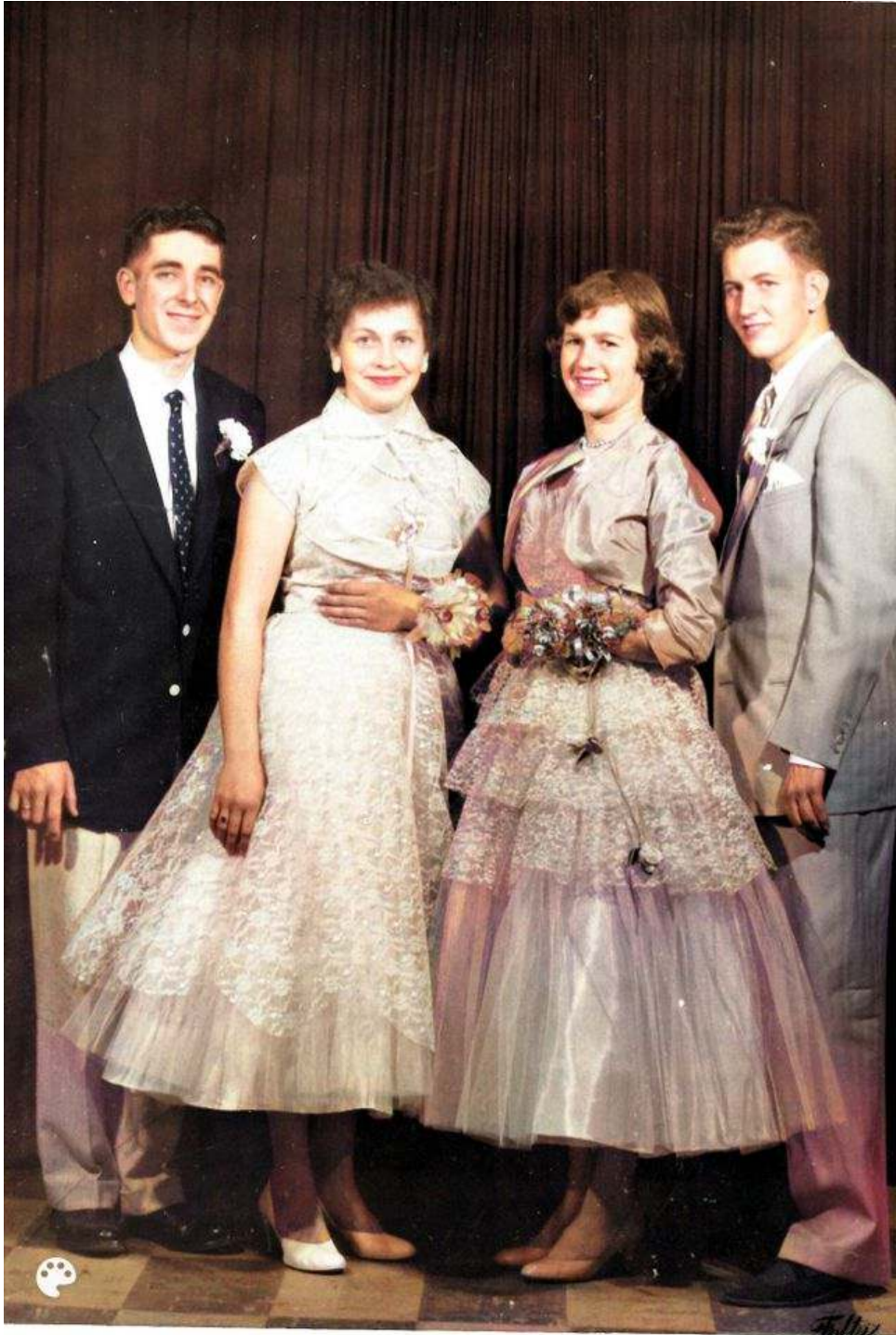

'A Trip To Mars' Boone Banquet-Prom Theme

BOONE — Time was when junior-senior high school proms featured such old-fashioned themes as a garden, land or sea travel, a cabaret or the like, but not so in this age of spaceship talk which makes a trip to the moon seem credible. "A Trip to Mars" was the theme chosen by the junior class of Sacred Heart High School here for the annual formal banquet and prom in honor of the senior class, held Wednesday evening, May 2nd at the parish hall.

Banquet guests, other than the seniors and juniors, were the pastor, Father J. J. Ryan, assistant, Father Cecil Friedman, and the parents of the junior and senior class officers.

After the serving of the three-course banquet, the program of toasts was presented with Peter Fleming, junior class president, as toastmaster. All of the introductions and program numbers carried out the theme of "A Trip to Mars". The toastmaster was assisted in the introductions by a robot, portrayed by Bob Garvey.

Following is the program, each speaker covering various phases of the route covered by the spaceship: toast of welcome, Miss Rosalie Day; Toast to Father Ryan, Miss Eileen Ryan; response by the pastor; response to the juniors, Miss Margaret Judge, senior class president; Toast to Father Friedman, Duke C. J. response by Father Friedman.

A skit entitled, "Space Op-

era", was presented by Peter Fleming and Misses Eileen Ryan, Rosalie Day and Marilyn Fitzgerald, after which the three girls, introduced as the Starlettes, sang "When You Wish Upon a Star." A toast to the Sisters of Sacred Heart School was given by Ed Brice and the program closed with prayer by Father Friedman. The invocation was given by Father Ryan.

Following the banquet program, the spaceship landed on Mars for the annual prom, with all of the Sacred Heart high school students and invited guests participating. The dancing began with a grand march led by Peter Fleming, Miss Rosalie Day, Miss Margaret Judge and Jerry Manriquez. Carl Nebbe's orchestra played for dancing.

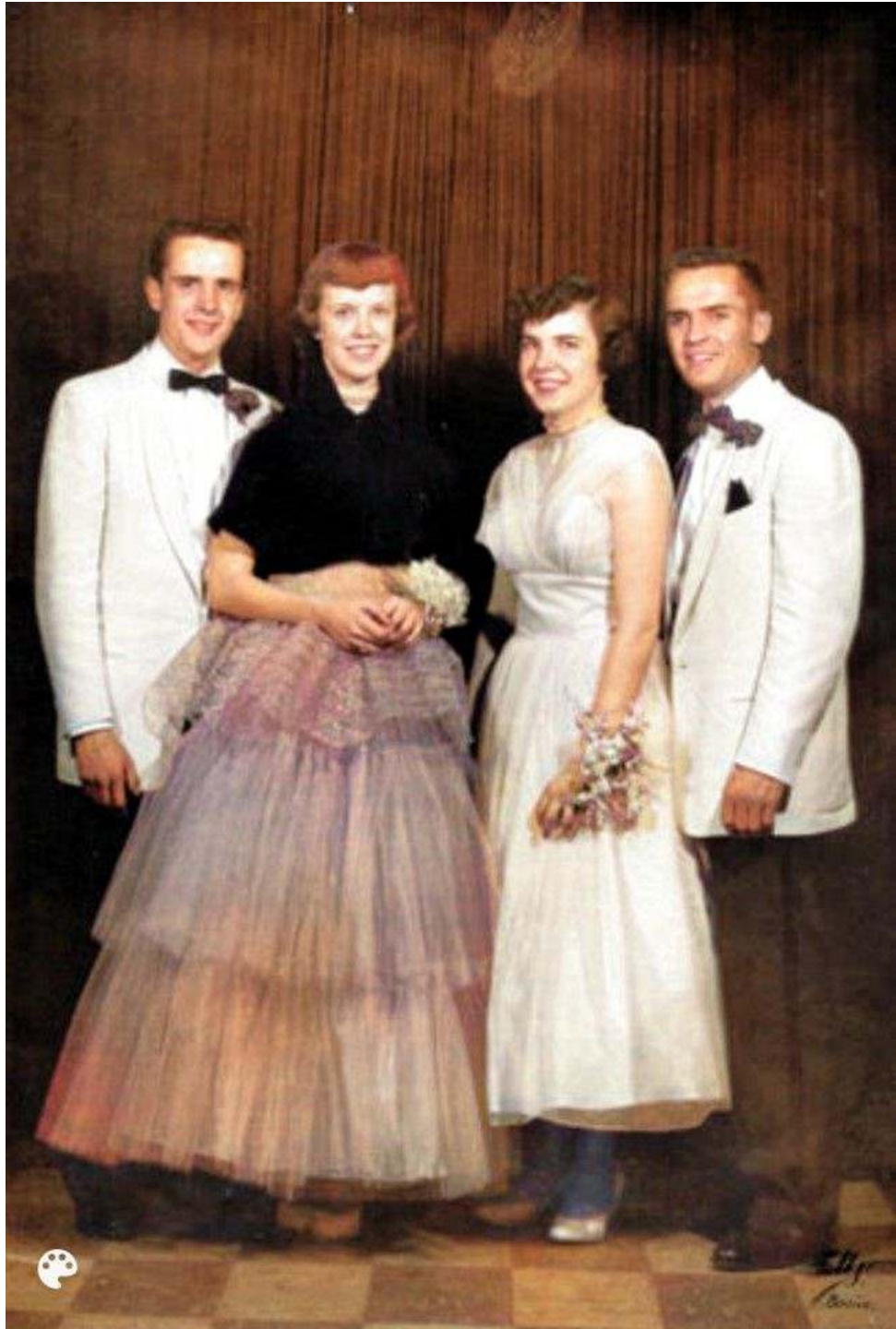
During the evening punch was served from a buffet table

centered with a floral arrangement and mint green candles. Standing in the center of the room on a platform was a large guided missile with blinker lights overhead and puffs of smoke at the base, realistic effects created from dry ice. Suspended from the lights were large balloons disguised to resemble various planets and also floating in the "sky" were two large flying saucers and rocketships.

Tables were arranged on the "spaceport" for refreshments. In one corner of the hall was a beautiful shrine of the Blessed Virgin, with a heavenly blue satin background glistening with streamers of cellophane and silver foil, dropping into a mass of clouds at the base, with special lighting effects. Three-dimensional stars twinkled in the "sky" and the orchestra stage was adorned with a background curtain of blue with glittering streamers in waterfall effect.

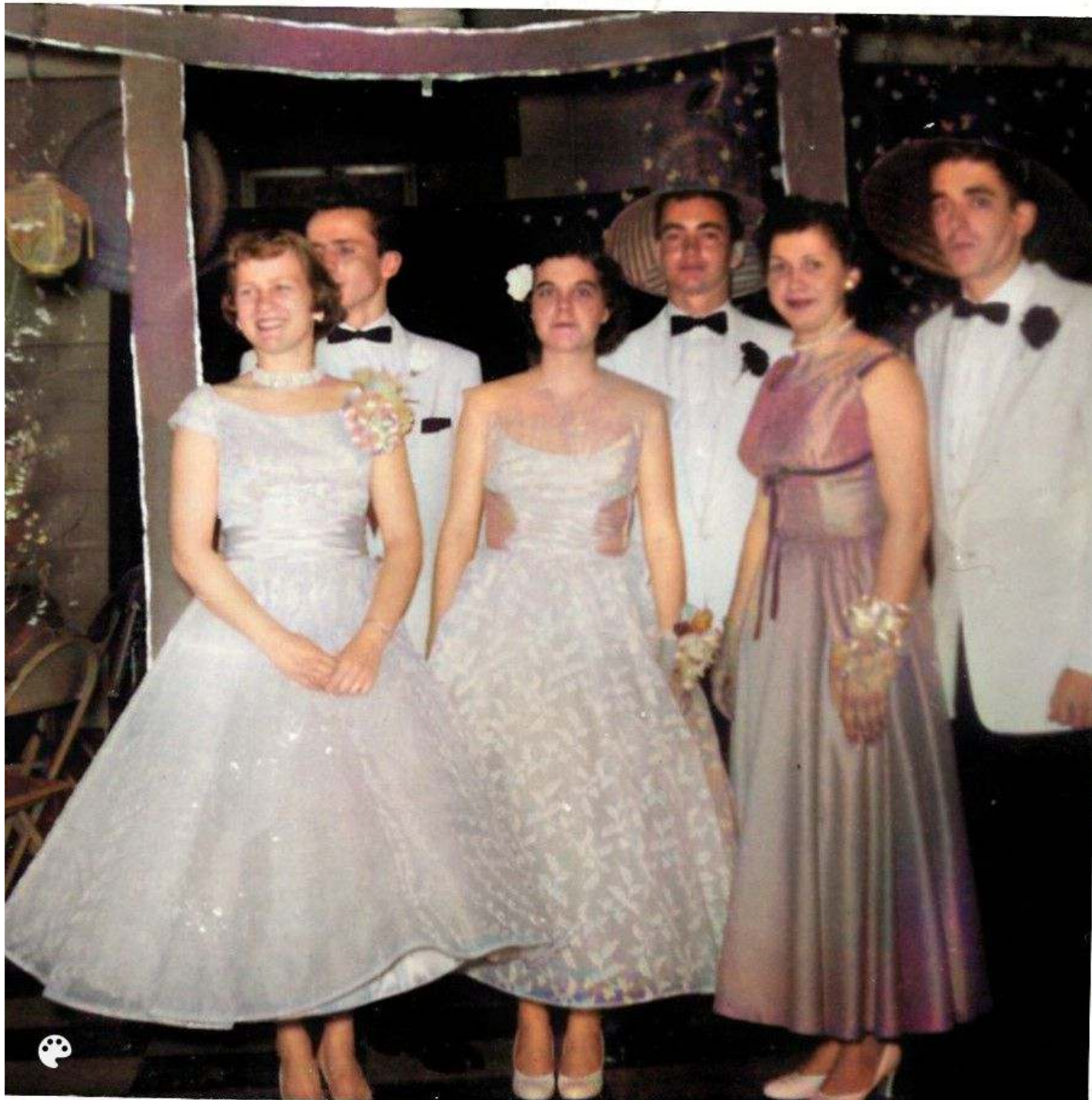

Misses Marcia Day and Patricia Brice, both seniors, were queen candidates and they served as the queen's attendants. The Sacred Heart high school cheer leaders, who have been doing an excellent job of leading cheers throughout the basketball season, led some peppy and novelty cheers to spur the Sacred Heart Spartans to victory in their scheduled homecoming game with St. Joseph's of Bode—and there's where the weatherman stepped in!

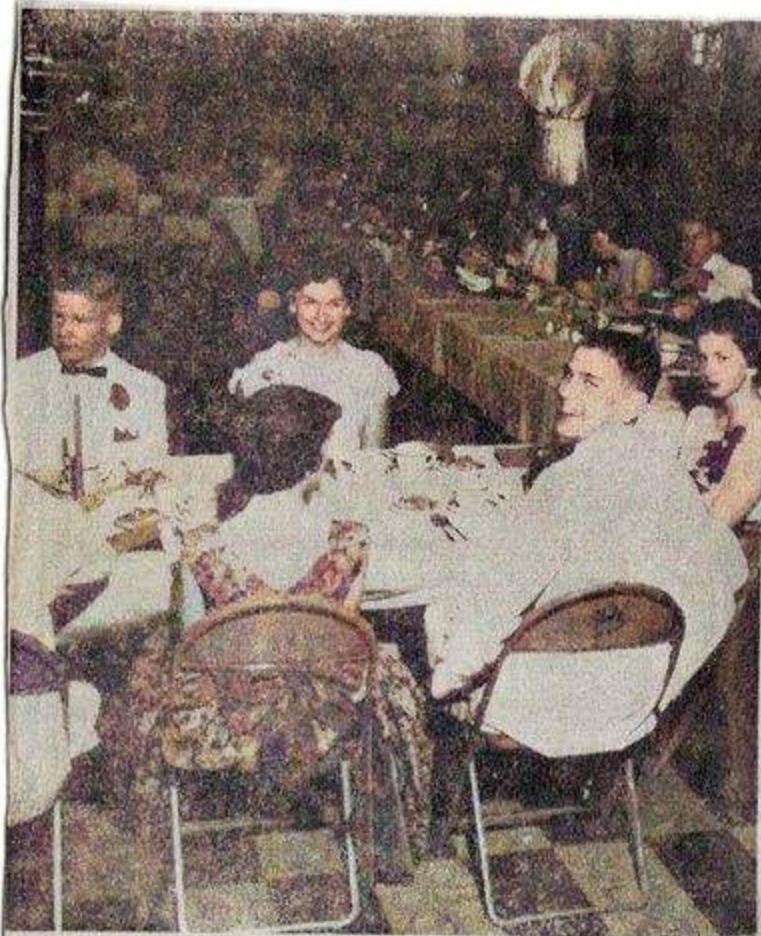
