Your Vocation Nursing



Since it is highly probable that to a few young women the term "nursing" may suggest only a gay young person in a trim, white uniform, whose privilege it is to soar through life, day by day, as free as a bird, but they will find that the romance of this career is somewhat tempered for the nurse by certain prosaic facts. In this work like many others you will find that life is not just a bed of roses.

The nursing of the sick is a vocation which has been elevated to the dignity of a profession. The first school for training nurses was founded by Florence Nightingale in 1854. The general training course takes from three to four years in addition to the probation period of two to three months. Student nurses live at or near the hospitals and are paid a small wage. They attend lectures on medical and surgical subjects and also work in the wards. At the end of the first year they take a preliminary state examination and at the end of the full period of training they must pass a hospital examination and a final one at the hospital board. If successful they become State Registered Nurses and are eligible for private or hospital practice or for public health work.

There is also a training school for men who would like to become male nurses. It was organized by D. D. Mills in 1887. Their training is somewhat similar to that of the women.

There is a great need for nurses in institutions for bedside or clinical service, in Administrative and Educational positions such as Superintendent of Hospital and her assistant, in Specialties, as Anesthetist or Dietitian, in private duty or Public Health Activities and Government. There is great need for help in the Red Cross, Missions and Churches and miscellaneous types of work.

By entering the nursing profession you are entering one of the highest paying fields today.
