A SPIRITED SQUAD OF TOREADORS took to the gridirons this year with the stimulus, "This is the Year!" ringing in their ears. The Boone squad at the season's end was able to boast the respectful record of four wins, two ties, and two losses. The Toreadors ended up tied for fourth place in the Central Iowa Conference. To finish tied at fourth place in the always rugged C. I. C. is not, by any means, to be considered a disgrace. Under the coaching of L. K. 'Butch' Lewis and the assistant coach, Les McIntyre, the Toreadors once again proved that with their courage and determination they, while not being the 'winningest' team, proved to be one of the toughest teams to beat.

The Boone team was plagued from the start with more than their share of bad breaks. Let their first game of the season with North of Des Moines bear testimony. Starting out with a passing attack that was to prove a vital asset the rest of the year, the Toreadors took an early lead. During the third period, Larry Hall, a returning letterman guard, suffered an injury that was to end his football career at B. H. S. This loss was felt deeply by the squad. The final score: twenty-five to twenty-five.

Boone next traveled to Denison. Not having the potential strength of its victor, Denison fell to Boone thirty-one to seven in the second game.

In its first C. I. C. action and third season game Boone played host to, and defeated, the Oskaloosa Indians nineteen to nothing.

Homecoming was a hard fought and see-saw battle all the way. The Toreadors entertained C. I. C. member Bobcats of Marshalltown for this engagement. This game ended in another tie: seven all.

The Toreadors defended their honor by beating the Tigers at Grinnell thirteen to seven.

Boone probably played its best game of the season as it swamped Carroll nineteen to seven. This was the sixth game of the season.

Boone suffered its first defeat of the 'Fifty-two season by sinking to Newton in its seventh game. The Cardinals, number one team in the state and top C. I. C. team, blasted the Toreadors 26-0.

Again Boone met Ames in vain. Being hampered with many injuries, among these Jim Cowhick, a fine Boone back, proved a detriment to Boone's cause as it bowed to its traditional rival, the Little Cyclones, twenty to six. This game was the finale of the 'Fifty-two football season.

This year's football lettermen were Ackerman, Duley, Jacobi, Cooper, Seaton, Eamer, Smith, K. Murken, Grosnickle, Lind, Jaschke, Kelley, Newbold, Becker, McAlpine, Bridges, Cowhick, Courter, Mondt, and Dickey. The honorary captains this year were Ken Murken, Charles Bridges, and Jim Cowhick. Additional honor was bestowed upon Boone as two Boone men, Lloyd Courter, guard, and Jim Cowhick, halfback, placed first team berths on the C. I. C. all-conference team.

Varsity Boys' Basketball

THE SPIRIT OF THE '52-'53 basketball season is still fresh in our memories. Let us not forget the fine spirit and courage the Toreadors displayed throughout the entire season. Even with the chips down, the squad proved that it could uphold the glory of previous Boone High teams by showing an unrelenting will to win. It was this factor, and this factor alone, that allowed our cagers to pull the game out of the fire on several occasions when it appeared that the game was surely lost. It is felt that through the guidance of Mr. Gillespie, head coach, and Mr. Honeck, assistant coach, the team received the finest coaching possible.

A total of twenty scheduled games was played by the Toreadors. Of these twenty games Boone won eight and lost twelve. While this record is by no means outstanding, it must be remembered that the Toreadors played some of the toughest competition in the state. Also in addition to the scheduled contests, Boone was defeated in the district tournament as it attempted to take its first step towards Iowa City. The Toreadors' Central Iowa Conference standing was sixth place.

To start the season Boone was defeated at Algon. The next game at Nevada, however, was a different story. In their first game on their own home court, the Toreadors next defeated Webster City. Opening the C. I. C. season Boone was trampled by Grinnell. A surprise was in store for Boone spectators as they watched their Toreadors slip past Oskaloosa in a real thriller. The following encounter was a defeat mark on Boone's record as Eagle Grove whipped the Tore-

dors. The conclusion of the Newton engagement finds the Red and Green victorious with everyone bewildered by the fast finish except the home squad who knew they could do it all the time. Four defeats in a row were next handed to Boone by Ames, Marshalltown, Carroll, and Grinnell, respectively. Perry was edged out by the Toreadors by only one point in Boone's only overtime contest of the season. It was a nip and tuck battle all the way. Oskaloosa, Manning, Newton, Ames, and Marshalltown reigned victor over Boone High in that order as the Toreadors lost five straight. The Toreadors really showed they had the stuff as they slaughtered Cedar Falls in what was said to be their best showing of the year. On the very next night they again sparkled; the reason being the mowing down of Fort Dodge, playing here, that ended the Toreador regular season. Boone was defeated at and by Webster City in a heart-breaker in the district tourney. This concluded the Toreadors' basketball season of 'Fifty-two, 'Fifty-three.

The basketball lettermen for this year are: Jerry Beckett, Jim Cowhick, Miles Duley, Morris Kelley, Ronnie Lind, John Seaton, Joe Smith, Gary Grosnickle, Larry Hall, Charlie Hancock, and Bill Newbold. Charlie Hancock was chosen team captain.

Credit must also be given to coaches Honeck and McIntyre for the splendid jobs they are doing of developing future talent by means of the junior varsity and the sophomore teams. Both teams had regular schedules to follow, game experience for the boys being the object of these squads.

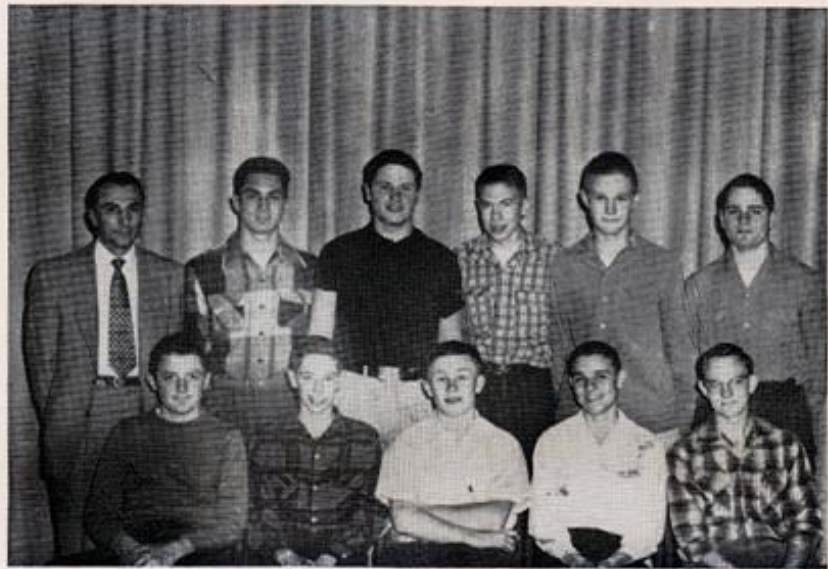
