You know we're waiting for a good "good" time. Invite your friends - all are welcome.



FATHER KELEHER GIVES VOCATION TALK

On March 11, Reverend Cletus Keleher of Fort Dodge addressed the Sacred Heart Junior and Senior High School students on the subject of vocations. Pointing out that there is a constant need for replacements in the religious life, due to deaths and sickness, he said that about one of five Catholic children do at some time receive a call to the religious life, and expressed the hope that at least a dozen Sacred Heart students would enter a religious or lay group to dedicate their lives to God. Beside the need for pastors, nuns, and brothers in our community or diocese, he said, there is much room in the missionary fields. He explained the qualifications, the duties, and privileges of missionaries.

The three main qualifications for religious life - good health, good moral background, and average intelligence were pointed out.
