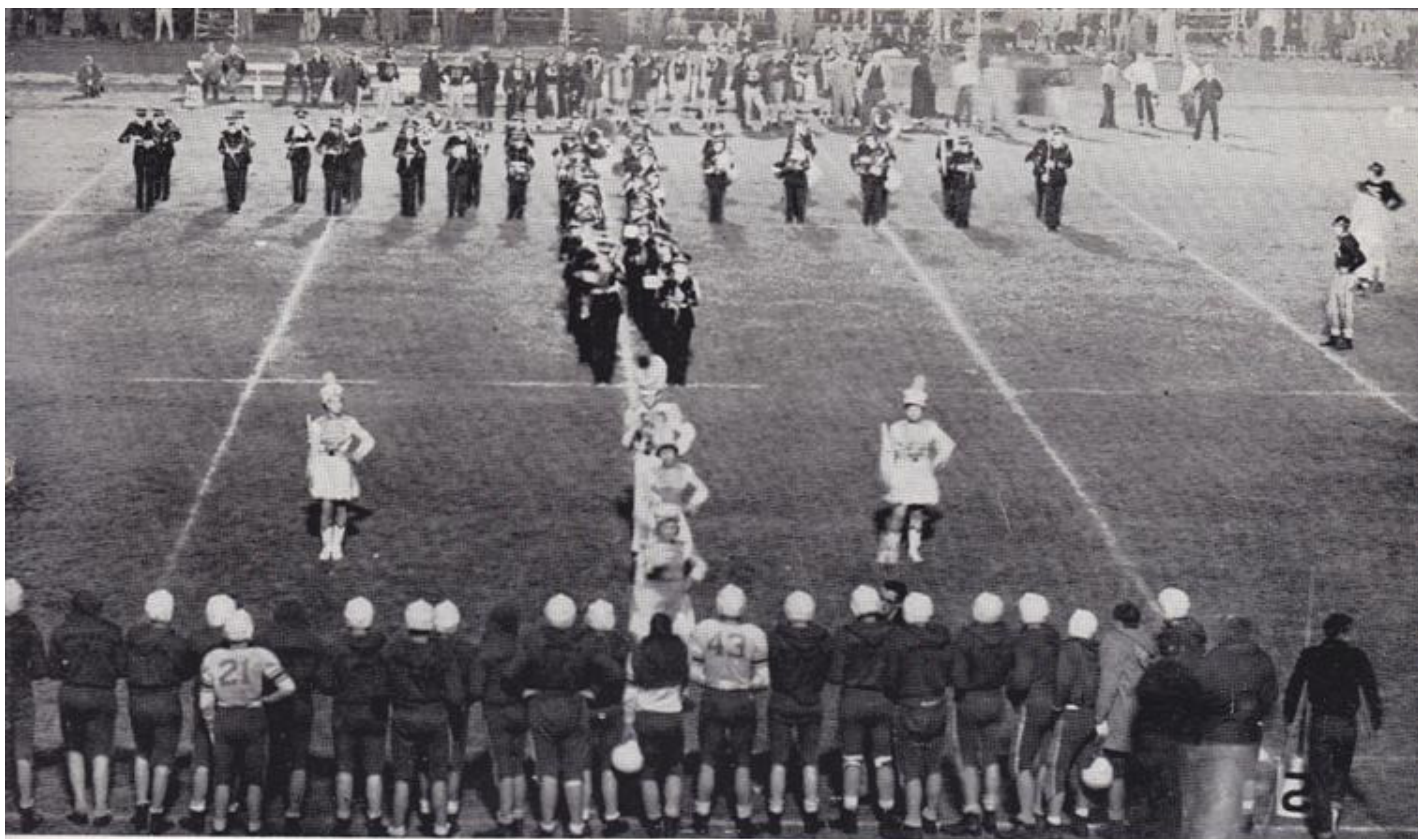

Band

Orchestra

FOR SEVERAL YEARS Boone has had one of the best high school orchestras in the Midwest, and this year was no exception. Although the orchestra took no long trip as in previous years, the sixty-five-piece orchestra, under the baton of Konrad Scholl, continued to gain the highest praise locally.

The string section was especially good this year, and Mr. Scholl gave them recognition in an informal string concert early in December. This was almost a 'dress rehearsal' for the annual Vesper Service at which the string section played 'Holy Boy,' and the entire orchestra played 'Sanctuary of the Heart.'

Throughout the year the orchestra worked towards its concert on February 17th. Proving themselves truly worthy of their fame, they mastered such difficult numbers as Dvorak's 'Symphony in E Minor,' 'Ballet Music' from *Faust*, and Haydn's 'Military Symphony.'

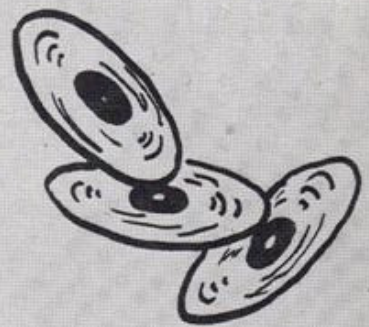
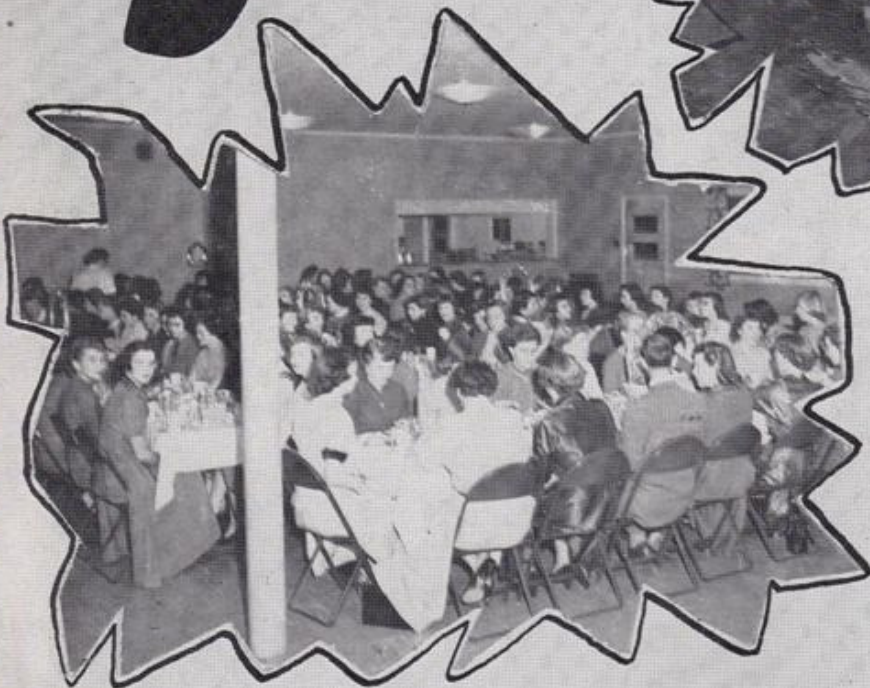
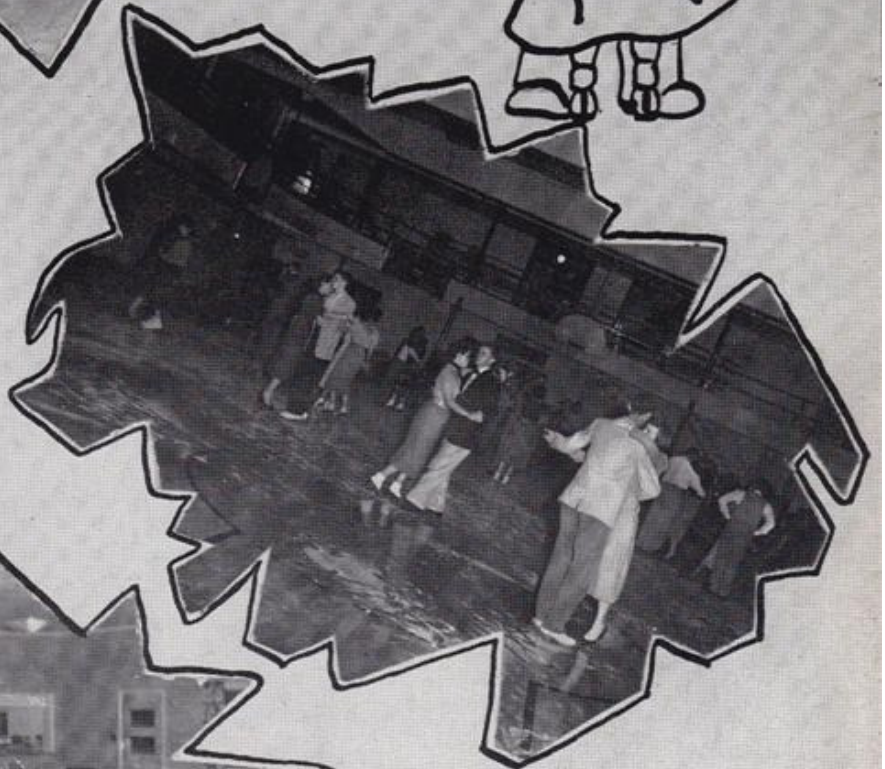
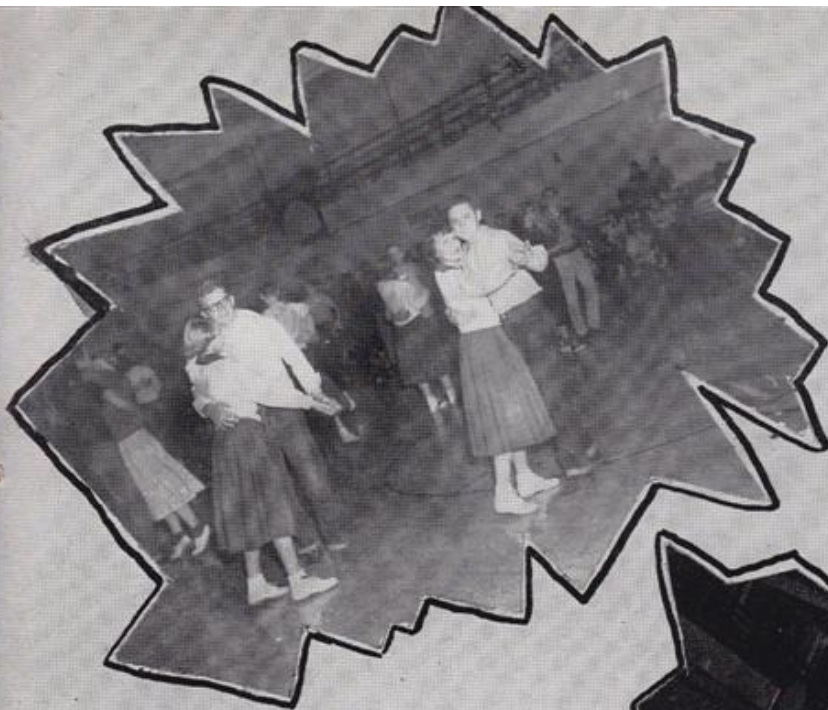


Youth for Christ

Football

SURPRISING EVERYONE except themselves, the Boone High Toreadors came up with a most successful season. They achieved a record of five wins and three losses. This was an outstanding record considering that Boone was picked to occupy the Conference cellar. One of Boone's victories was over mighty Newton, the state's number one team.

Boone's victorious season may be attributed to many factors. The prime factor was undoubtedly the superb coaching of Jim McLeran and his assistant coaches, Noel Jones and Les McIntyre. Molding a squad consisting of, for the most part, inexperienced players, into a successful, winning team was certainly not an easy job. The coaching staff, however, had the ability to do so, and the players had the vigor and the eagerness to learn. Another contribution to their success was the grueling two-practice-a-day schedule during the two weeks that preceded the opening of school. The spirit of the team was a great factor. It was wonderful from the first day, and it soon spread to the student body. Spirit in both a student body and in a team certainly leads to victory.

The first game of the season was an indication of what the season was to be. Boone, led by the play of Don Jaschke, upset favored North of Des Moines, 14-7. Jaschke was chosen Prep of the Week for his performance in this game.

The Denison Monarchs were the next victims of the Toreadors. The Monarchs were snowed under, 24-6.

The Oskaloosa Indians gave the Toreadors a tussle before succumbing to a fourth quarter Boone drive, 6-0.

Boone suffered its first defeat of the season at Marshalltown in a bitterly fought contest 15-13. The Marshalltown margin of victory was a safety scored during the first quarter. The services of Ted Schulz, speedy Boone back, were lost, as he broke his leg early in the game.

The Red and Green won a homecoming victory over a surprisingly stubborn Grinnell team 25-19. Ronnie Lind scored four touchdowns to pace Boone.

The Toreadors' pass defense proved to be their undoing in the Carroll game. Carroll scored four touchdowns on passes as Boone fell 33-19. Joe Smith was outstanding for Boone.



An inspired band of Treadors snapped Newton's victory string at eighteen games. They outplayed the Cardinals all the way to win 14-7. This was perhaps the state's biggest upset as Newton was the number one team in the state for a two-year period.

Boone couldn't break the Ames jinx, as they lost the final game of the season 33-19.

Varsity Boys' Basketball

THE BASKETBALL SEASON OF 1953-54 will remain in our memories for time to come. We will always remember the drive and the will to win displayed by every member of the squad. This, added with the fine coaching of Mr. Gillespie, head coach, and Mr. Honeck, assistant coach, enabled the team to make a fine showing in every game they played.

Playing a total of eighteen scheduled games, Boone won nine and lost nine. It must be taken into consideration that although the Toreadors' opponents were of the toughest caliber, Boone's record is still very good. After the scheduled games of the Toreadors, they went to the district tournament only to be downed by Ames, conference champions. Boone's standing in the Central Iowa Conference was fourth, a gain of two places over last year.

Battling with a rugged Algona five in a thriller to open the season, the Toreadors came within a one-point margin of winning their first game. The Toreadors went on to win from Nevada and Webster City respectively. Although the Boone squad put up a stiff fight, they were finally subdued by a strong Ames five. A stubborn Newton team marked another notch on Boone's loss column. After defeating Eagle Grove, the Red and Green were downed by a determined Mar-

shalltown string. In a last minute scoring spree Boone won their first conference game by defeating Oskaloosa. Boone won from Carroll only to lose at the hands of Ames. Boone couldn't snap out of a slump in time to defeat Perry, but bounded back to surprise Newton by handing them a defeat which was clinched in the final minutes. Marshalltown couldn't hold Boone as the Toreadors went on to win in the fourth quarter. Boone then lost to Grinnell, but again returned to the winning column by defeating Oskaloosa. Boone's season ended with a disappointment, as Fort Dodge defeated the boys.

While the varsity chalked up their wins and losses, the sophomore squad battled to second place in their conference. Coach McIntyre rounded out a team that was one of the finest in the state. These boys will be of great value in the coming year.

The junior varsity started off slowly, but then showed their true ability as they roared to the finals of the county tournament. Their hopes of victory were dashed by a victorious Ogden five. Under the direction of Mr. Honeck, coach, these boys received the experience necessary for their encounters next year as the varsity.

Track

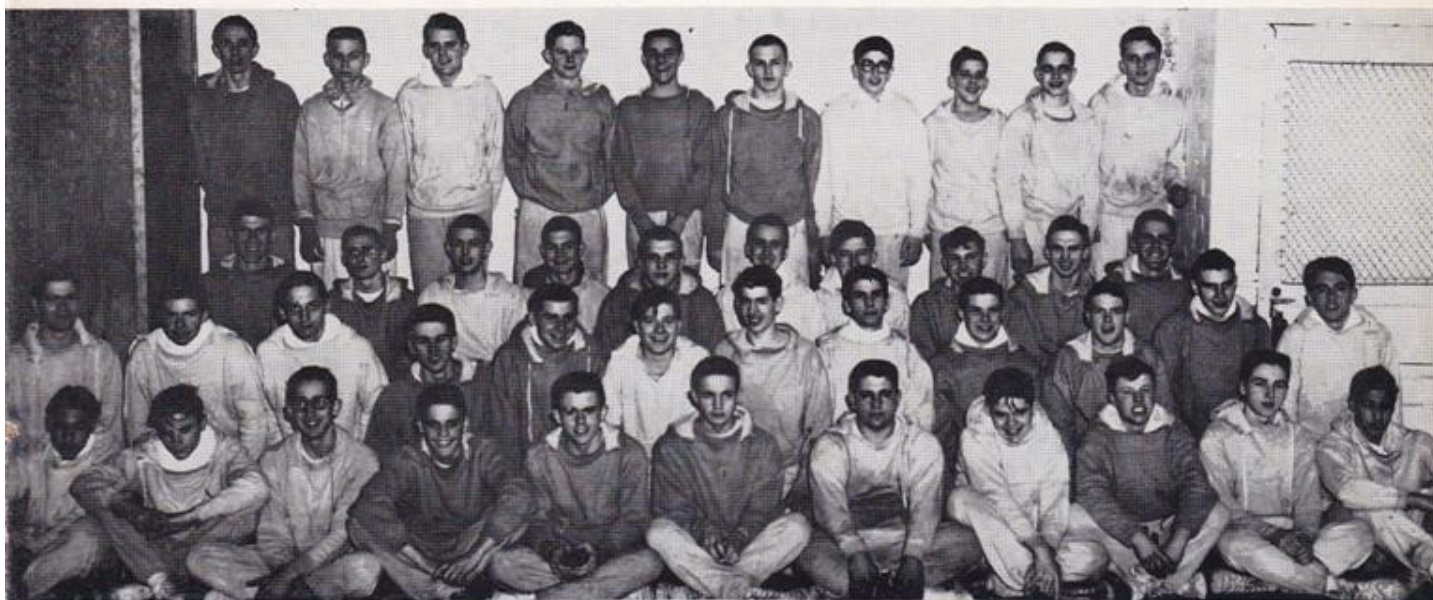
