

A unique observance in the history of the Church of the Sacred Heart was held on Ascension Thursday, May 10, when the pastor, the Rev. Father J. J. Ryan, marked his 25th anniversary as pastor of Sacred Heart.

Father Ryan came to Boone in 1931 from Salix, Iowa, by appointment of Bishop Heelan.

The present assistant pastor of Sacred Heart, Rev. Father Cecil Friedman, and members of the parish planned the anniversary event, all cooperating to provide a memorable day for the jubilarian. Reflecting the high esteem in which Father Ryan is held was the presence of many priests of the diocese and neighboring parishes outside the diocese.

The festivities began with a 5:30 o'clock dinner in the parish hall for the visiting priests. The dinner was served by the members of the Altar Society.

The program opened with a vocal solo, "Bless This Priest," by James Matt, accompanied at the piano by Miss Coleen Bennett, with an introduction by Miss Eileen Ryan. Msgr. McElroy spoke in behalf of the Fort Dodge Deanery, of which Father Ryan is a member; Father C. E. Farrelly reviewed Father Ryan's accomplishments as a priest since

his ordination in 1908; Msgr. C. J. Ivis of Storm Lake, superintendent of schools of the Sioux City diocese, spoke to the group as "a former Boone boy;" others expressing sentiments of the spiritual influence of the jubilarian included Father Robert Phillips, Father Everett Apt and Father Koenig, all former assistant pastors of Sacred Heart.

The selection, "On Wings of Song," was sung by a girls sextet: Misses Eileen Ryan, Sue Casserly, Marcia Day, Beth Fang-man, Mary Kay Keller and Elaine Collins, with Miss Delores Headley as piano accompanist.

Speaking in behalf of the parish, T. J. Mahoney gave a brief history of Sacred Heart's expansion during the 25 years of Fa-




