# Ruth Season Opens Friday

When Boone Babe Ruth league teams open play on Friday afternoon there'll be 29 rookies on the rosters of the four teams that start a drive for a league championship won a year ago by the Boone Banks Athletics.

No team has ever won the championship two years in succession. But Manager W. H. McGriff's Bankers will be out to upset that precedent and they have a strong returning nucleus to do just that.

The Memorial day doubleheader pairs the Wester Furniture-Sturtz Texaco Red Sox against the Boone Banks Athletics at 2 p.m. and the Boone News-Republican - KWBG Yankees against the Fareway-Vogler-Nieman Indians at 4:15.

THREE OF the teams have the same sponsors as in 1957. The Red Sox, who operated without

a sponsor last summer, are being financed by the Wester Furniture Co. and Sturtz Texaco station.

Only 15 players in the league had batting averages over .250 last summer. Seven have been graduated from the program including league batting king Bill Martin of the A's, a .441 hitter. Another boy, Daryl Stabenow of the Yanks, who placed fourth in the bat derby with a .386 average, moved to Colorado.

The returnee who had the highest bat mark last summer is Mike Lacey who hit .306 with the Yanks. He was traded during the off-season to the Athletics.

Only other boy still on hand who hit over .300 last summer is the Indians Tom Burke. He had a .302 average.

A thumbnail sketch of the teams:

ATHLETICS—Manager W. H.

McGriff expects another good contender although graduation from the program took '57 batting Martin, John McIntyre, third best hitter in the league, and Gayle Carlson, who ranked ninth.

"We have good balance, maybe the best in the league," McGriff said. Hitting is the only department which McGriff rates as questionable. He terms his pitching, outfield and infield as "strong."

Jim Mylenbusch will get the opening day assignment. Other Boone Banks hurlers will be John Malcom, Mike Lacey, Joe Reedholm, Roger McCoy and Jim Caldwell.

The infield is set with Bob Herman at first, Tom McGriff at second, Malcom at short, McCoy on third. In the outfield will be Lacey in left, Eddie Blaess in center and Reedholm in right.

Catching duties will be han-

dled by Charles Pratt. He'll be spelled by Ron Keller.

Utility players include Jim Grabau, Bob Lovejoy, Steve Trulin and Bob Lebo.

Cecil Malcom is assistant manager of the Athletics.

RED SOX—"We hope to have better hitting and a fair defense this season and we should win our share of games," Manager Ducky Hilts, said. He took over when Ray Morris, a pioneer in youth baseball programs in Boone, passed away recently.

Three rookies (13-year-olds) figure in the pitching plans of the Red Sox. The boys are Denny Adreon, Joe Geyman and Ricky Barry.

Denny Mylenbusch will get the first pitching assignment. His batterymate will be Tom Sellers.

The infield shapes up like this. Tim Pepper at first, Adreon at second, Barry at shortstop, Steve Hilts at third.

Manning the outfield posts will be Jerry Thompson, Richard York and Leon Anderson from left to right.

A knee injury has Larry Sturtz on the sidelines at present. He's regarded as a probable starter.

INDIANS—The very capable Bill Sapp looks for a general improvement in his club this summer. "Better hitting, team speed, a stronger infield and a pitching staff equal to or a little better than last year are in prospect," he reports.

Larry Paulsen has drawn the first pitching assignment. Behind the bat will be Jon Gustafson who also will do some hurling.

Around the infield it will be Tom Healy at first, Denny Askvig at second, Denny Ellenwood at short and Eddie Myers on third.

The outfield picket line will be manned by Marv Dutton in left, Tom Burke in center and Dave Carlson in right.

Meyers, Healy and Ellenwood and Dan Clausen figure in the pitching department.

Manager Sapp, who will be assisted by Roscoe Fleming, is high on his crop of 13-year-olds. He plans to groom Mark Rasmus for future catching duties and Bob Bush and John Vogler for outfield berths.

A hand injury has slowed John Tannehill, an infielder. Outfielder Jim Veale is slated for considerable action.

YANKEES — The new boss man of the News-Republican-KWBG Yankees has done a shuffling act in getting ready for the season's opener. "We may have some outfielders on the infield and vice versa at the start," George Dutton said.

There'll be three 13-year-olds in the starting lineup. Shortstop Roger Dutton, first baseman Ron Mills and left fielder John Bush were three of the brightest prospects to graduate into the Babe Ruth circuit this year.

Don Dutton, son of the manager and brother of the rookie shortstop, will be the pitcher for the Yanks on Friday. His maskman will be Hank Harris.

Gary Anderson will be stationed at second, Ron Menough at third, Bob Rinehart in center and either Phil Gibbs or John Kueck in right field.

Manager Dutton replaced veteran skipper Johnny Menough.

Ticketed for reserve duty at the start are Cleo Carroll, Eddie Thrap and Gary Grasso, 14-year-olds; and Gene Reihm and Dave Carlson, 13-year-olds.

Asst. manager is Les Mills.
