FATHER RYAN BECOMES MONSIGNOR AT GOLDEN JUBILEE CELEBRATION

In 1908, John J. Ryan received a special dispensation from the Catholic Church to be ordained to the priesthood in New York. Although only 22 years old he was granted this privilege because of his outstanding scholastic record and religious zeal.

After fifty years as a faithful and devoted priest, Father Ryan observed his golden anniversary, May 6, 1958. The most Rev. Bishop Joseph Mueller and about 100 priests from the Sioux City and neighboring dioceses attended this great event. Nieces and nephews of Father Ryan were present as special guests, and hundreds of parishioners took part in the festivities. Those who could not attend in person sent telegrams and letters congratulating Father on this wonderful accomplishment. Among the congratulatory notes was a telegram from the President of the United States, Dwight D. Eisenhower.

This day of days opened at 11:00 with a solemn pontifical Mass celebrated by Father Ryan. The sermon given by Rt. Rev. Monsignor Newman Flanagan was based on the name, John; and what it has meant since Biblical times to the Christian people. The Mass of the Infant Jesus was sung by the Girls' glee club and choir. After the Mass a banquet was held in the school hall for the visiting priests and special guests. During the course of the afternoon's activities, the Most Rev. Bishop announced the elevation of Father Ryan to membership in the Papal Household and the title of Right Reverend Monsignor.

Climaxing the day's activities was a special program presented that evening. Mr. Robert Mahoney acted as master of ceremonies and introduced Mayor Earl Senholz of Boone who gave

his best regards to Father Ryan. Father C. T. Flannery, Father E. F. Casey, Father C. E. Farrelly, and Father R. M. Fangman were also introduced and commented about the day's activities and reminisced over past occurrences in Sacred Heart parish. The High School Glee Club sang two numbers, "The Jubilee Song" by Sister Mary St. Clare BVM, in honor of Father Ryan and "Glory, Praise, and Honor." A special purse from the parishioners was presented to Father by Mr. Richard Jordan as a token of appreciation. At the end of the program the 500 attending guests enjoyed refreshments provided by the PTA.
