'The Farmer's Daughter' Presented

J. C. Instructor Chosen as Judge for Debate Tourney

On April 18th, Mr. Charles Schaeffer left by plane for West Point, New York, to act as a judge for the thirteenth National (college) Debate Tournament. The colleges participating in this tournament are the outstanding college debate teams from the eight sections of the United States. Last year's topic was, 'The Right to Work Laws.' The winners debated before the members of Congress as well as before the nation on television.

Mr. Schaeffer received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Culver-Stockton College at Canton, Missouri, in 1947, and his Master of Arts in Speech and Dramatic Arts from the University of Missouri in 1957. He is now working on his Ph.D. in public address at Northwestern University. He is a member of the Speech Association of America and holds the Degree of Debate in Pi Kappa Delta, a national forensic honor fraternity.

Mr. Schaeffer taught in Missouri until he received his master's degree. Last year he taught public address at Dartmouth College, where he filled a one-year leave of absence.

While at Dartmouth he served as debate critic-judge on Eastern campuses from Temple University in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, to The University of Vermont.

J. C. Trip Planned

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Folk Singer Performs in Boone

On April 1st the students of Boone Junior College and the citizens of Boone had the opportunity to witness the talents of a folk singer, Guy Carawan.

Carawan's two-hour program included ballads of love and courtship, work and play, blues, spirituals, hoe-downs, and other old ballads. He was ably assisted by his guitar, banjo, and Chinese flute. He took us on a tour of Russia, China, Israel, and America by way of their national folk music.

Carawan said of his U. S. travels: "I have sung for and swapped songs with all kinds of people in the U. S. . . . Country farmers and mountaineers as well as a whole new generation of city singers who have turned to their country's rich folk song heritage and are keeping it alive in their own way."

Guy Carawan holds a master's degree in sociology (U. C. L. A., '52). He has been traveling around the United States for the last four years, singing and collecting folk songs. However, thanks to his travels in the British Isles, Russia, China, and Israel, he does not have to lean so heavily on the American Southland for his repertoire. He sings in Russian, Hebrew, and Chinese.

His vocal ability has been given acclaim at Columbia, New York, and Boston University. In this area he has appeared at Carthage, Culver-Stockton, and Keokuk Community College.

[*Editor's note:* Because of the favorable impression Mr. Carawan created, he has been invited at popular demand to return to B. J. C. on November 2, 1959. At this time he will appear in the junior college instead of the high school auditorium where he previously presented his program.]
