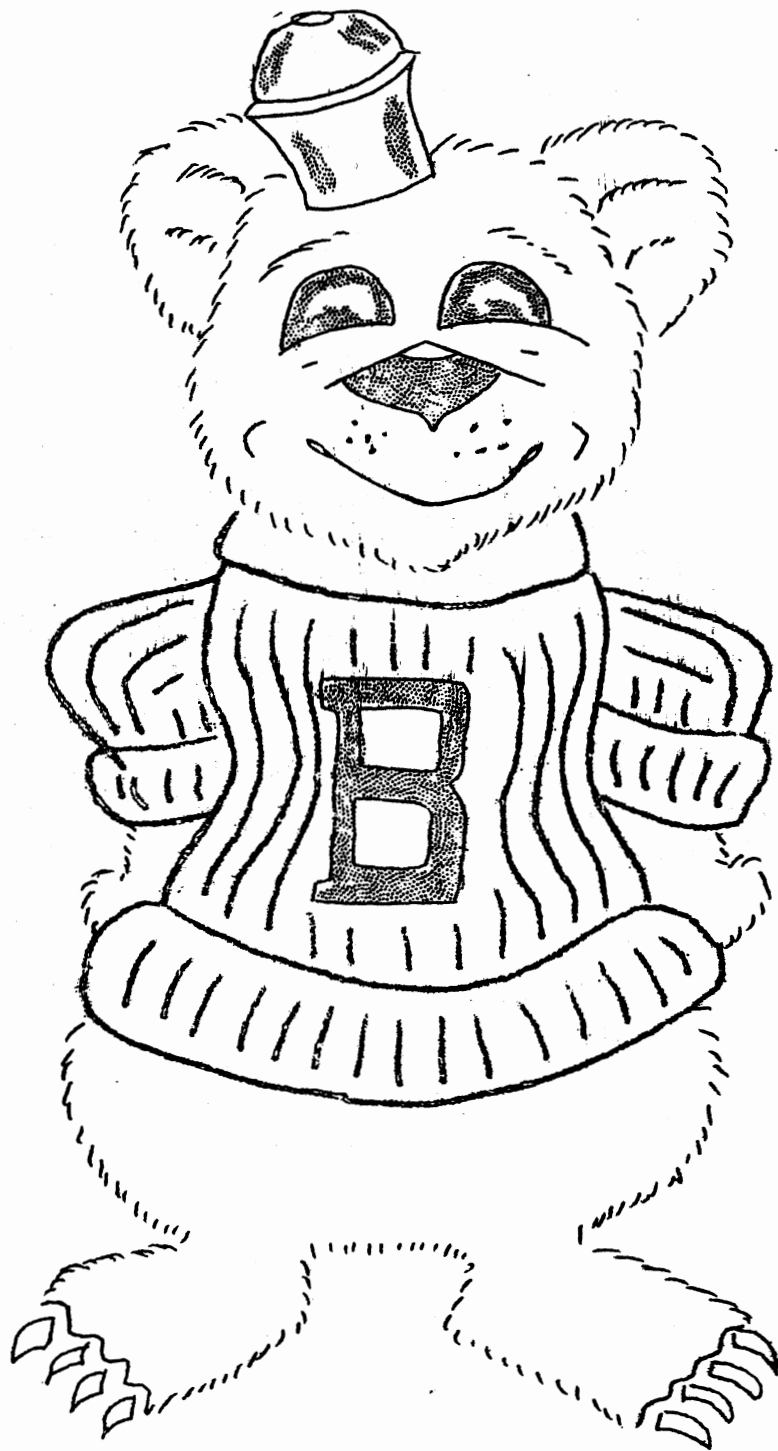

Meet Mr. McCargar

The plans and specifications for the new Junior College building are now completed and will be sent to the Housing and Urban Development Administration in Chicago this week to be reviewed for approval by the federal government. This is necessary because of the grant of funds promised by the U.S. Office of Education under the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963. After the plans and specifications are reviewed in Chicago, they will be forwarded to the U.S. Office of Education in Washington D.C. where final approval will be forthcoming. It is understood that these two reviews may take several weeks but it is hoped that everything will be completed in time for mid-summer contract letting.

The Area XI Community College Board and the Boone Community School District Board met in West Boone on April 24 and reached a formal

agreement concerning the operation of this years Boone Junior College. Sometime was spent discussing the agreement of Boone Junior College as an attendance center during 1967-68, but both boards felt that nothing definite could be decided until the present legislature makes a decision on the merged area districts after July 1, 1967. There was general agreement, however, that Boone Junior College would definitely continue to operate as an attendance center of the Area XI Community College unless the legislature should enact some law making this impossible.

Mr. McCargar, the French instructor at Boone Jr. College, was born in Wolsey, South Dakota, lived in Oskaloosa, Iowa and graduated from high school in Newton. He received his Bachelor of Art degree from William Penn College in Oskaloosa and his Masters Degree from the University of Wyoming. He has done additional graduate work at Central Connecticut State College. Mr. McCargar served as a member of the Air Transport Command while in the Armed Forces and visited many interesting places including New Caledonia, Australia, New Guinea, and the Philippine Islands.

Mr. McCargar has been teaching for eighteen years and started his career at Dayton High School in 1949. He taught English at Boone High for eight years and has been teaching French at Boone J.C. for the past three years. Mr. McCargar is affiliated with the following professional organizations: BEA, ISEA, NEA, Iowa Association of Teachers for French and Central States Modern Language Teachers' Association.

Mr. McCargar's special interests include reading, golf, and traveling. He will be attending a four week French language institute this summer at the State College of Iowa. After completing this he hopes to travel possibly to California, Minneapolis, and St. Louis.

Mr. McCargar and his wife are the parents of three children. Ronald is a student at Boone J.C., Rick is a senior at Boone High and Cheryl is a sophomore at Boone High.

Mr. McCargar hopes it will be possible for him to attend a language institute in Mexico sometime in the future.

Iowa City, Iowa -- "The Psychology of the Left and Right" is the theme of the Big Ten's annual Inter-Religious Inter-Collegiate Conference to be held at The University of Iowa Memorial Union Friday and Saturday (April 14-15).

Students from most of the Big Ten universities, as well as other Midwestern colleges and universities, are expected to attend the conference. Keynote speaker on Friday evening will be Dr. Richard Flack of the University of Chicago's sociology department.

Representing the Left will be Everett Frost of SDS, U of I graduate student from North Coventry, Conn., and Walter Gornley of Mt. Vernon, a pacifist who publishes Newsman's Gadfly for distribution to columnists, editors, and reporters.

The representatives of the Right will be announced.

On Saturday morning Big Ten students will discuss the extremist factions at their schools, and Dr. Flack will comment. Discussion groups will then be set up under the direction of U of I faculty members William Erbe, sociology; George Bedell, internal medicine; and Peter Noerdlinger, physics.

Tom Renquist and Ray Barnes, president of the U of I Inter-Religious Council, are Coordinating the conference.

Spend a Summer With Washington Lobbyists

Iowa City, Iowa -- Four Iowa college students will have an opportunity to spend the summer in Washington, D.C., working with special interest groups.

The Iowa Center for Education in Politics, with headquarters at the University of Iowa, is again sponsoring a Summer Internship Program with National Interest Groups.

The students will work full-time for two months in the Washington offices of the American Bankers Association, National Coal Policy Conference, and the National Education Association.

Students from all four-year Iowa colleges and universities are eligible to apply for awards. Application forms, available from the political science departments on each campus, must be returned to the ICEP office by April 17.

The interns will receive a fellowship grant of \$750 from the ICEP and the organizations involved.

In addition to working at duties assigned by the interest groups, the students are expected to earn academic credit for research projects or other programs conducted in connection with the internship.

Summer Internships are awarded on the basis of the students' academic records and the academic merit of their proposals for research.

"The Summer Internship program provides a unique opportunity for students to study the current inter-relationships of interest groups, political parties, and personal influence in the legislative process," said Prof. George B. Mather, ICEP director.

The ICEP is a cooperative effort of the political parties and the colleges and universities of the state to promote more active, and better informed, citizen participation in politics. The Center is supported entirely by grants from Iowa foundations and individuals.

Faculty Attends Meetings

The State Junior College Speech Festival

Several Boone Junior College instructors have been attending state meetings for teachers.

Mr. McCargar attended a weekend meeting at Cornell College. This was the Annual Foreign Language Conference and he listened to French speakers and watched movies in French.

Mrs. Hartley attended the Iowa Conference of Political Scientists in Decorah. This meeting represented two and four year colleges. Two papers were read dealing with civil rights and they also discussed Viet Nam and the American position there.

Mrs. Porter and Mrs. Hamilton went to Ames to the Iowa Council of Teachers of English meeting on the Iowa State University campus. University and Ames High School teachers co-hosted this meeting. There was a luncheon meeting on Friday with guest speakers, Dr. Robert Carlisle and Dr. Farnner, both from the State University of Iowa. They spoke on English curriculum from kindergarten through twelfth grade. The rest of the meeting consisted of special interest and sectional groups.

The State Junior College Speech Festival was held on April 20, 1967 with twelve Junior Colleges participating. Those attending were: Boone, Emmetsburg, Mason City, Keokuk, Eagle Grove, Muscatine, Ellsworth, Webster City, Clinton, Burlington, Fort Dodge and Centerville.

The areas open for participation were Expository Speaking, After-Dinner speaking, Extemporaneous speaking, Interpretative reading, and Group discussion.

Among those attending from Boone was Judy Smith, who gave an expository speech on handwriting analysis, Jackie Morris gave an after-dinner speech entitled, "Don't Just Do Something, Be There!" Ron Olson entered the Expository Speaking division. In this section the speaker covers his topic an hour before time to give the speech. Ron drew "Air Pollution" for his topic.

There were two Boone entries in the Interpretative Reading section. The students selected their own reading of either poetry or prose. Lynn Snedden chose "The Blue Flag in the Bog" for her reading. Bernie Hohanshelt chose "Four Preludes on Playthings" and "Oryndias" for his readings.

The Group discussion was divided into three sections, each drafting a resolution concerning U.S. Policy toward Communist China. The resolution that passed was an amended form of group one's resolution. It was as follows: Be it resolved---- (1) that we (United States) should not continue our policy of isolation toward Communist China; and (2) that we should extend diplomatic recognition to Communist China; and (3) that we should drop the trade embargo on those goods that could not be used for the military advancement of Communist China; and (4) that we should increase cultural exchange; and (5) that Red China should be admitted to the United Nations; and (6) that Taiwan be recognized as a separate state in the United Nations.

Those participating in the Group discussions were Barbara Rand, Vicki Routh, Harold Cantonwine, and John York.

At 3:30 there was an assembly of all the participants for critiques. Bernie Hohanshelt, selected as the outstanding oral interpreter at the meet, read his selection before the assembly. John York was named by the critics as an outstanding discussant in the group discussion division.
