Toreadors to Clash with Bobcats

The Boone High Toreadors will play hosts to the Marshalltown Bobcats here Friday night, February 2, in a Central Iowa Conference basketball tilt. The Bobcats will be out after the Boone team because in the first meeting of the two teams this season Boone came out ahead 43-35. Boone, who is in fourth place in the conference, will try to improve their conference standings after losing two straight conference battles, one to Grinnell and the other to Oskaloosa. The Bobcats are in fifth place. Earlier in the season when the two teams first met Floyd Ballard was high scorer for Marshalltown with 10 points, while Dick Bechtel did the honors for Boone with 16 points. The Boone sophomores, who lost to the Marshalltown sophomores in their first meeting, will try to redeem themselves in the opener of the doubleheader.

Valley Trips Boone 62-48

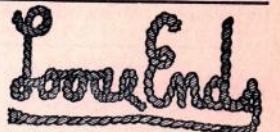
Valley of Des Moines needed past the Boone girls 62-48 on the home floor January 23. Valley led throughout the game, and had a slightly better shooting average.

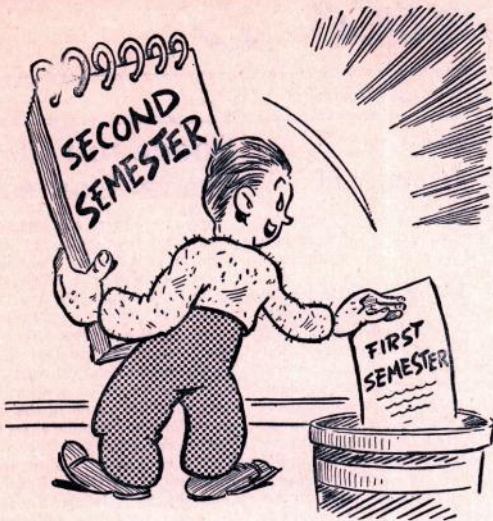

Boone Cagers Fall to Carroll

A frigid nineteen per cent shooting average and a tight Carroll defense brought the Boone High Toreadors their third consecutive cage loss Tuesday night, January 23, with a score of 47-41, on Carroll's home floor.

The first quarter found each team netting six points, but Carroll outscored the Toreadors ten points to six in the second period to lead at the end of a very slow-moving first half 16-12.

The Tigers widened their margin of victory in the third period by outscoring the Boone quintet fifteen points to twelve, to take a seven-point advantage 31-24.

A futile rally in the fourth period netted the Toreadors seventeen markers to Carroll's sixteen, but the Tigers' previous margin won them the game 47-41.

Sparkling the Toreador offensive in the second half was Milo Huddleston, who slugged in 13 points for the Boone cause, followed by Dick Bechtel with 10 points. Other Boone scorers were Harder with 5, Wiley with 4, Knowles with 1, and Seaton, Johnstone, Musser, and Cowhick, who tallied 2 points each.

Heuton and Bock led the Carroll five with 14 points and 12 points respectively. The four cagers who left the game via the foul route were Bechtel, Wiley, and Cowhick of Boone, and Heuton of Carroll, all in the final stages. The game was a non-conference contest, so will not affect the C.I.C. standings. The seasonal record of the Toreadors is eight wins and five losses.
