A frigid nineteen per cent shooting average and a tight Carroll defense brought the Boone High Toreadors their third consecutive cage loss Tuesday night, January 23, with a score of 47-41, on Carroll's home floor.

The first quarter found each team The first quarter found each team netting six points, but Carroll out-scored the Toreadors ten points to six in the second period to lead at the end of a very slow-moving first half 16-12.
