## Industrial Training Apprenticeship

The boys at Boone High School taking industrial training under Mr. Lein have an opportunity in their hands that not many other high schools in the state can offer. This is a chance to be an apprentice at a given job during the school course. Then when they graduate they can go right into the job at top wages, without having to take the apprenticeship training.

Many boys in the past have taken advantage of this course and are now carpenters, painters, etc., and making very good wages.

If any boy is interested now in taking this course here are the requirements:

1. All mechanical drawing offered.
2. Either machine shop or wood shop to go with the drawing.

When these requirements are met, Mr. Lein will be your next step. He will provide you with a questionnaire blank on which is required your parents' signature, employer's signature, and the principal's signature. When this is done your schedule will be changed so as to fit your working hours.

In the questionnaire are the facts about your working period. Following are only a few of them:

1. A six-week trial period will be taken. At end of six weeks the employer can either keep you or dismiss you depending on your attitude and work.
2. A suitable wage will be paid to the student during his work.
3. Student will deposit 50% of his weekly earnings in the bank.
4. Parent or guardian shall be responsible for the conduct of the student while in training in co-operation with the school.

# Golf Team Meets Roosevelt Today

The B.H.S. golf team will play its second meet of the 1952 season today when they encounter the Roosevelt of Des Moines linksmen on the local course at 4:00 o'clock. They played their season opener Monday with Marshalltown on the latter's course.

A near-record squad of 15 boys greeted Coach Gale Johnson's call for golfers at the start of the month, as four lettermen and 11 other aspirants came out to try for the team. The four lettermen are Dick Canady, Paul Harder, Duane Du Bois, and Perry Spies, while the other members of the squad as follows: Bill Curran, Harold Kost, Bill Ackerman, Lloyd Courter, Charles Gruening, Darrell Dickey, Bob Hammond, Gary Weston, John Seaton, Jim Brunner and Dick Longworth.

Only one letterman, Rollie Wiley, graduated from last year's squad, which was one of the most successful Toreador teams in recent years. The locals, besides winning all but

one of their dual meets, took both the conference and the district meets, and took third in the state meet, although their score was five strokes lower than the winning score of the previous year.

Early practice, which began on April 7, before being cut short by the weather, consisted more of practicing on certain types of shots than on playing all nine holes. With all members of the team split into groups of two, the golfers would hit the balls back and forth at each other, thereby gaining accuracy.

A tentative seven-meet schedule has been set up by Coach Johnson and Mr. Stutzman, with the meets as follows: April 17, Marshalltown, there; April 24, Des Moines (Roosevelt) here; May 1, Marshalltown, here; May 8, Perry, here; May 10, Conference meet, Marshalltown; May 17 District meet, site to be decided later; May 24, State meet, site to be decided later.

One of the top surprises in the Valley Relay was the showing of sophomore miler Joe Smith. Unheralded in that event before the meet, Joe raced home in third place ahead of some of the outstanding milers in the state. His performance was especially outstanding considering that it was the first time that Joe had competed in varsity competition.

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# Toreadors 6th At Relays

Working against some of the toughest competition in the state and against the unpredictable weather man, the Boone High Toreadors trudged through the mud and rain to capture sixth place in the annual Valley Relays at Des Moines, April 12.

The Toreadors, in collecting 20 points, came within one and one-quarter points of rising into fifth place above the defending champions, East High, who racked up a total of 21 1/4 points. Ames took the event by tallying a grand total of 62 points.

Boone ran four third place events and one fifth. The two-mile relay team: Bill Davis, Pat Ferry, Bill Mondt, and Charlie Hancock, along with the mile medley: Bill Davis, Charles Bridges, Jim Cowhick, and Charlie Hancock, placed third in the separate events. Ken Knowles and Joe Smith gained individual third place honors in the 120-yard low hurdles and the mile run respectively.

The 880-yard relay team, Jim Cowhick, Jim McAlpine, Ken Knowles, and Charles Bridges, ran just 2.3 seconds slower than the winners of that event, to place fifth.

An assembly for junior high school was given on April 25. The film 'God of All Creation' was shown. The paid assembly for April 28 has been canceled.

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Look for several new faces when the golf letters are handed out this year. With the graduation of Rollie Wiley, a spot on the starting five was left vacant which could be filled by any number of promising Toreador linksmen.
