Also going to this contest will be the play, 'The Six Queens of Henry VIII,' which is a takeoff on Shakespeare's 'King Henry VIII.' Included in the cast are King Henry, Dean Canakes; his six wives, Vera Lindahl, Karen Finley, Gracia Conard, Jo Ann Quantz, Bonnie Carter, and Marilyn Du Bois; and the butler, Mike Bell.

Tom Rinker spoke to the Kiwanis on February 25.

Vocational agriculture classes are divided into four units. They are: animal husbandry, crops and soils, farm management, and farm mechanics. The classes next year will take animal husbandry, crops and soils, and farm mechanics. When the new building is completed, they will take farm mechanics.

At present the freshmen and the sophomores meet together, and the juniors and seniors meet together. They work on projects, such as raising livestock and crops, outside class.

Varied Skills And Interests in Shops Course

Boys of Boone High: If you find academic skills are not just what you prefer as to subjects, perhaps you'll find that some form of shop or mechanical drawing is what you have been waiting for. In these classes boys get a chance to use their hands and their mathematical ability while earning credit in school and learning a potential trade.

Besides the wood-working that is so often associated with shop, there is also metal work. In these metals classes the seventh and eighth grade boys are presently making flour scoops, metal boxes, and candle snuffers.

The mechanical drawing classes are, as always, drawing up complicated-looking precise drawings for different machines and for projects which they will undertake.

Mr. Fischer's wood working class are making cedar chests, footstools, and coffee tables. Mr. Lein's tenth grade class are making magazine tables, utility stools, and end tables.

Boys in the vocational carpentry class have undertaken a large task; they are building teachers' desks for the new Franklin grade school, which is to be ready next year. There are ten of these desks; they are blond and have three drawers down the right side and one in the middle.

"Because the story is the most important dramatic value in the play, we are striving for an authentic suggestion of time and scene rather than an exact replica," says Mr. McCartan. The play is not the movie version but is a condensed adaptation of the novel by Lloyd C. Douglas, containing all the elements which created its indelible impression.

Although the story is predominant, emphasis is also being put on the costumes and staging. Arrangements are being made to rent many of the costumes. Partial sets and drapes will be used in the stage settings.

At the Speech Club meeting on March 10, plans were made to handle the production details of the play. Janice Mondt and Jeannette Stotts were appointed co-chairmen of the costume committee; Barbara Wallace heads the property committee; and co-chairmen on the make-up committee are Betty Reed and Janice Parish. Light and sound crews will be headed by Tom Meyers and stage manager working on the set is Avenelle Eamer. Bonnie Carter was chosen business manager. Prompters will be Rock Severtson and Jeslyn Pearson. Details of ticket sales will be told in the next Bumble 'B.' The play will be presented Wednesday and Thursday, April 28 and 29.

Boys Finish Good Season

Although the Toreadors ended up the season with a 10-9 record, no one who saw the games can say the boys didn't play hard in every game, and both students and faculty of Boone High should be very proud of the Toreadors.

The Boone five lineup consisted of Lind, Smith, Becker, Gustafson, and Collis for the first game against Nevada. The entire team played excellent, scrappy ball, and the Cubs had a rough time holding them down. In this particular game Becker and Gustafson did a remarkable job of stealing the ball away from the Cubs, and Smith was the rebounding 'fiend.' The score ended up 64-53.

The Toreadors gained their second win by defeating Webster City 51-45. High scorers were Smith with 15 and Collis with 12, while Lind collected 11.

The Boone team opened the C.I.C. race playing the Ames Little Cyclones. Up to this point the boys had two wins and one loss—to Algon. Even though the Toreadors did lose the game, they played their best ball of the season. The Little Cyclones had one advantage—height, but Boone came within seven points of defeating the Ames five.

Coming from behind during the fourth quarter, the Toreadors downed the Eagle Grove Pirates 62-57. Gustafson made fools of the Pirates time and time again with his remarkable dribbling. Lind scooped the hoop for 29 points.

One of the most exciting games of the season was played with the Marshalltown Bobcats. Fans will recall Ken Sparks' amazing long-shot that was made right when the horn sounded. But the Bobcats had two free throws to shoot, and they made them both. So Boone was on the short end of the 65-63 score. Smith was high scorer with 25 points. Gustafson had 12 points.

As a fitting close to the Toreadorettes' season, a few of the girls went to Des Moines to view the finals of the girls' State Basketball Tournament. The girls were taken by Mrs. Clyde Reid and Coach 'Chuck' Lovin.

The group took their lunches and went straight to the fieldhouse. They ate supper at Bishop's Cafeteria, then went back to see the remaining games.

The final game of the season was a 63-50 loss to Fort Dodge. Sparks held scoring honors with 22 points. Joe Smith and Ron Lind played their final game with Boone.

No one boy was an individual star, and lots of congratulations should go to all the boys and to Coach Gillespie. Boone will have lots of good material coming up next year, so fans expect to see lots of action in 1954-1955.

Thirty-two times a year, if you tune in your radio at KWBG, you may hear your friends or even yourself talking.
