Tilt Monarchs for
First Victory

The Boone High Toreadors downed the Denison Monarchs Friday night by a decisive score of 39 to 13.

The first quarter saw the Monarchs take an early lead when Jim Kregness cracked the Boone defense and kicked the extra point for a 7-0 lead.

Boone's offensive power got its start when Jack Becker received a punt and galloped 85 yards for their first tally of the game. Becker's extra point attempt failed. The Monarchs were quick to retaliate as halfback Bryant scampered 35 yards to the 10-yard line. After a series of quick opening plays, Bryant carried for the second score for Denison.

The second quarter saw Boone come within a single point when Boone took over after Harder recovered a fumble on Denison's 14-yard line. Becker then writhed his way through the opposing defense for the T.D. His kick failed to give Boone the extra point.

The gun sounded ending the first half with Denison ahead 13 to 12. During the half, the Boone squad got that go-go-go spirit. Jack Robinson returned the kickoff from the 10-yard line to the 50. After a series of plays, Boone was forced to punt. Gustafson kicked to the 15-yard line preceding a fumble recovered by the inspired Toreadors. A pass from Barry to Bergloff gave Boone the lead for the first time in the game. Becker's conversion failed to find the mark.

The Toreadors opened the fourth quarter by completing a pass from Barry to Becker for 47 yards to the 3-yard line where Barry rocked the center of the line for another six points. Becker's conversion was good.

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The Monarchs failed in their offensive drive and Boone took over on downs. Barry again hit Becker with a 30-yard pass to give Boone a 32 to 13 lead.

Denison's come-back attempt was halted again when Stevens intercepted a pass and carried to the 30-yard line. Barry again found the range when he hit Larson for another touchdown. The conversion by Becker gave the Boone Toreadors a 39 to 13 victory over the Denison Monarchs.

Band Acquires New Uniforms

Pupils Find Reading Pleasure Through Teen Age Book Club

More than half a million teenagers, in thousands of unique classroom groups in junior and senior high schools through America, are calmly contradicting those gloomy prophets who saw tv. as the doom of reading among the nation's young people.

During the school year that ended last June this army of youthful readers, through Scholastic Magazines' TEEN AGE BOOK CLUB, purchased a total of 2,400,000 paperback books at 25 cents and 35 cents. Titles ranged from sports, humor, and science fiction through poetry and biography to the classics. T.A.B. Club members dug into their own pockets for them, without compulsion or persuasion—simply because they had discovered that reading is fun.

Parents, teachers, librarians, and community leaders everywhere have hailed the T.A.B. Club's highly successful plan for providing good books to students at low cost. Sixteen selections are offered each month, drawn chiefly from the lists of major paperback publishers. For every four books a member buys, he receives one as a free dividend.

The school year just beginning marks the Teen Age Book Club's ninth year of operation. Its editors, counseled by a selection committee of five prominent educators, seek to provide titles for the whole range of reading tastes from grades six through 12. Because of the great demand for specific titles, especially for younger readers, the Club last year launched its own paperback publishing program; and by mid-1955 it will have issued some 30 books not otherwise available in paper covers, among them Louisa M. Alcott's 'Little Women'; London's 'White Fang'; 'Boy Dates Girl' by Gay Head; and 'Jim Davis: Smuggler's Captive,' by poet laureate John Masefield.

What kind of books do T.A.B. members read? Generally, they split about 50-50 between fiction and non-fiction, with animal stories, humor, mysteries, westerns, and sports among the most popular categories. 'Kon-Tiki,' 'The Great Houdini,' 'A Girl Can Dream,' 'Dennis the Menace,' and 'The Sea Around Us' were on the 1953-1954 list of best-sellers. Younger readers went for 'Your Own Joke Book' and 'Buffalo Bill,' while 'The U.S. Political System,' 'The Diary of a Young Girl' (Anne Frank), 'Beau Geste,' and 'Life on the Mississippi' scored with members in the upper high school grades.

PLEDGE of ALLEGIANCE

"I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation UNDER GOD, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Everyone recognizes these as the words of the pledge of allegiance to our flag, but does everyone realize that there has been a change made in the pledge during the last year? Before last June 14, Flag Day, the words, "under God," were not included in the pledge at all. Just why were these words added?

In spring of 1953, Louis C. Rabaut, congressman from Michigan, received a letter from a man in Brooklyn, New York. The letter asked him to recommend the addition of the words, "under God," to the pledge of allegiance. Congressman Rabaut wrote a bill to add these words. As the idea spread, other congressmen wrote bills of the same nature.

After hearing a Lincoln Day sermon in church last February 10, President Eisenhower also became interested in this change. The minister, the Rev. George M. Doherty, said that the pledge should contain a pledge of faith in God.

Representative Rabaut's bill was passed in June and the bill became a law after President Eisenhower signed it. These were the President's words after he signed the bill:

"From this day forward, the millions of our school children will daily proclaim the dedication of our nation and our people to the almighty."
