Defense was the whole story in the first quarter as both teams were held scoreless.

Preceding a Boone punt, which had fallen dead on the 12-yard line, it was Jennings again who found an opening over right tackle and strutted 88 yards to pay dirt, ending the half with Boone trailing 0 to 12.

After a scoreless third quarter, Jennings opened up the last quarter by carrying the ball from his own 40 through the Boone line for another Marshalltown touchdown.
