**Carolyn Herman  
Receives Merit**

In an assembly Friday, October 29, in the high school auditorium, Carolyn Herman will be presented with the Certificate of Merit. She has been awarded this by the American Red Cross for saving the life of George Parker, Jr., from drowning in the Boone Municipal Pool last June 7. At the time the accident occurred Carolyn was employed as a life guard. Ten-year-old Parker had gone to the deep end of the pool where the water was over his head. He could not keep above the water and became unconscious when he went under. Carolyn immediately noticed the boy and pulled him out. She administered artificial respiration for about 10 minutes on the side of the pool. By the time the fire department arrived, Parker had revived.

The Certificate of Merit is the highest honor given by the American Red Cross. There haven't been more than 20 people in Iowa to receive it.

With a very active extra-curricular schedule, Carolyn has been very busy during her three years of senior high school. Playing the cello in the Orchestra, she is in ensembles and goes to state contest every year. Besides being a life guard at the municipal pool, she has taught swimming to the younger generation in the spring swimming classes for three years.

Carolyn belongs to Dolphin Club and has held several offices in it. She is active in Pep Club and in Y-Teens. Church choir and mixed chorus are also among her activities. The Goeppinger Award and membership in the Honor Society are scholastic honors she has achieved. She participated in speech in 10th grade and last July she attended a state workshop of speech.

## Students on KWBG

If you tune your dial to KWBG every other Wednesday night, you will hear a radio program presented by high school students. With the entertainment varied, the programs are always different. The purpose of these radio programs is to give sophomores and many other people, who would not otherwise have a chance, an opportunity to gain experience in speech through radio speaking.

The program following was a variety with music, songs, speeches, and accordion music as the entertainment. A part of 'Fog Island' was also broadcast. Directing this were Kenny Sparks and Charles Jensen. Mr. Fitzgerald is the sponsor.

Obtaining a large number of students to participate is another purpose. About 15 have been taking part per program. Generally these students are drawn from the Speech Activities Club.

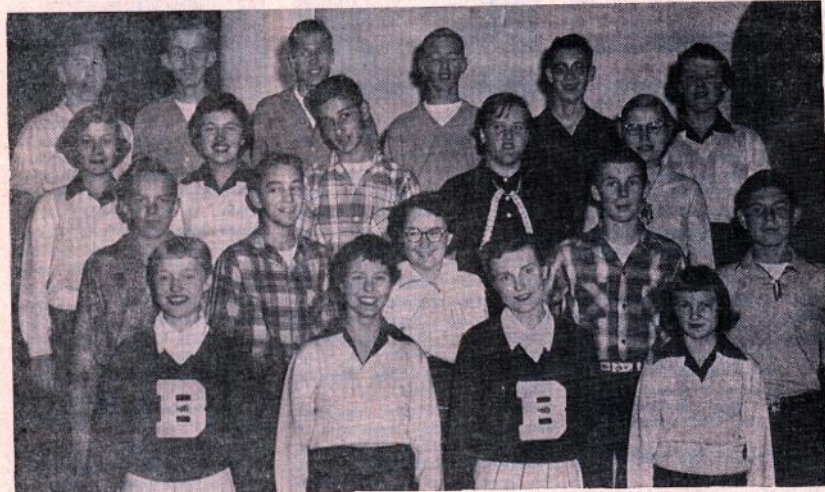

Marilyn Pesek, Carolyn Kirk, Keith Josephson, and Darryl Trulin in today's assembly, at 12:40, received the highest honors a junior high graduate can earn. Mr. Clair Abbott, assistant principal, in charge of junior high activities, presented the awards.

Due to the generosity of the Mr. Louis Goeppinger will, the awards are presented every year to students who have completed their ninth grade work. These awards are made to improve scholarship and conduct.

To be eligible for the awards the students must have attended Boone Junior High for at least four semesters.

In making the awards the student's general attitude and conduct toward the school are considered by all of their former teachers. Two boys and two girls receive these awards at the beginning of their sophomore year.

The selected candidates are from the upper 10 per cent of the boys and the upper 10 per cent of the girls. This is based on scholastic ability only. They are judged on the services they have performed for the school and community.

Some of the services and activities are: participating in school and church drives, serving in church choir, helping in offices, taking part in Sunday school and Bible school, working on committees; joining athletics, band, orchestra, journalism; or being home room officers and patrol boys.

## Orchestra Will Feature Soloist

Young, but very accomplished, Phyllis Jenkins from Springfield, Ohio, will be the featured soloist on the program for this year's orchestra concert in February. Phyllis, 14, and a freshman in school, will be flown to Boone during the week of the concert and will rehearse and then perform with the musicians.

Playing the 'Concerto in A Minor' by Grieg isn't easy for an advanced performer, so Miss Jenkins will, indeed, achieve a very great accomplishment in playing it.

Orchestra sessions are busily under way, practicing for their appearances. Small groups are constantly performing for different organizations, besides playing during Character Education assemblies, Christmas programs, annual concerts, contests, and, as last night, providing music for school plays.

Cards Recover For Revenge

In a terrifically hard-fought battle, the Newton Cardinals downed the Boone eleven 24-0 on Newton's home ground.

A combination of a hard charging Boone line, penalties, and Newton fumbles foiled every effort of Newton in the first half. As a result of the Toreadors' defensive unit, Boone picked up 35 net yards rushing to the Cardinals' 17. In the air, Newton connected for 56 yards to Boone's 31. Each team had three first downs.

Boone's only major threat in the first half was ended when John Shearer intercepted a pass thrown by Gary Barry to Manriquez; however, time ran out before Newton could move the ball down the field.

The Newton eleven started the second half with a bang by recovering a fumble after a pitch out from Barry to Larson on Boone's 37.

Crisp blocking by the end and halfback ushered Dave McCargar into the clear on the first tally of the game. J. Peterson broke through and blocked Brazelton's attempt for the extra point.

Again things looked bad for the Toreadors when Keiller's low hard spinning kick got away from two Boone men and was recovered by the Cards on Boone's 15-yard line. Norris put the ball on the six in

three tries; left halfback Jack Harter swept around right end and ran unmolested into the end zone. Brazelton's conversion failed, and the Cards led 12-0.

Boone took over but fell short two yards of a first down. Schroeder was forced to punt with the pigskin coming down on the Newton 38. The Cards moved the ball to the 23-yard line of Boone, but a bad center put Newton back on the 42. In the next play Harter took to the air and hit McCarger with a 41-yard touchdown pass. Harter's extra point attempt failed and the Cards led 18-0, with two minutes remaining in the third period.

One of the better runs of the game was seen when Harter sprinted into daylight, but fell on the Boone 11-yard line after a 77-yard gallop.

The final tally in the game came after Schroeder's punt went out of bounds on the Toreadors' 44-yard

line. Barry and Bowie traded pass interceptions, the Cards getting the ball on Boone's 23.

McCarger sped to the 11 and fullback Ronald Morris picked up nine yards, then two more for the final touchdown. Again the conversion failed.

Boone found target with three good passes just before the game's conclusion, to move the ball 30 yards to midfield.
