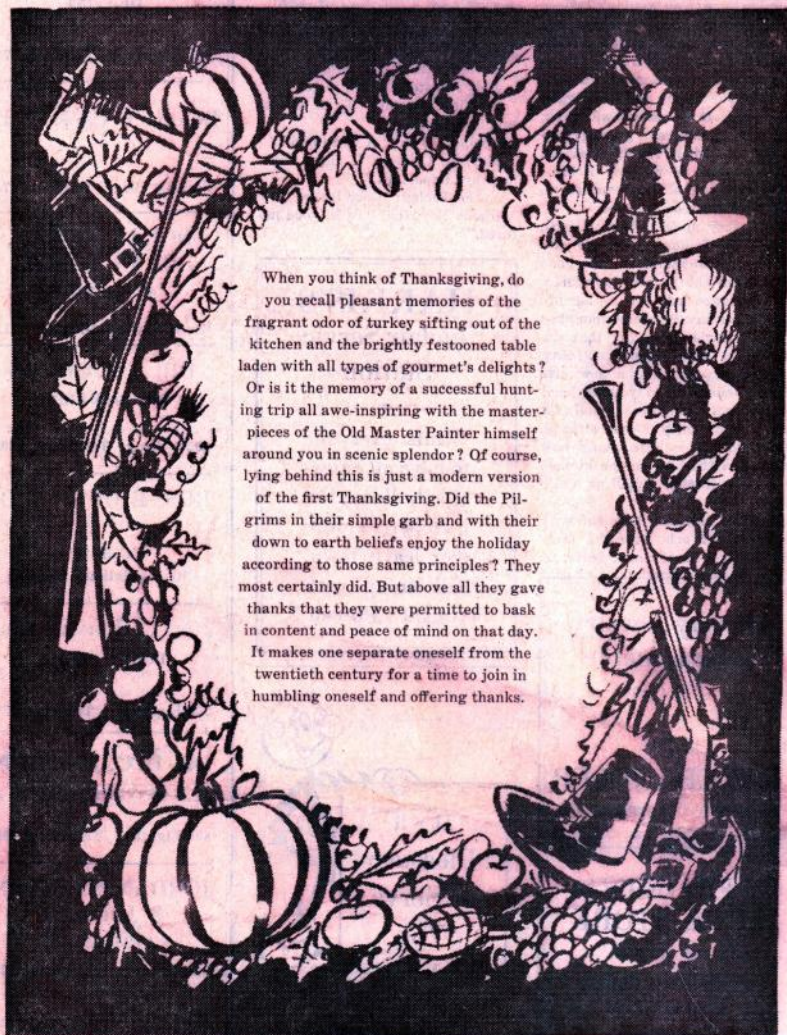


Seniors Head High School Honor Roll
