

Mr. Lania was born in Russia in the days of Czar Nicholas II and was reared in Vienna. There he went into journalism as a profession. He became the assistant to the editor of the newspaper for which he worked, Benito Mussolini. Later, under false credentials, he managed to interview and actually live with Adolf Hitler for ten days. That was before World War II. As a result of his associations with these two men, he was able to expose their vicious plans to the world by his writings.

In addition to being foreign correspondent for newspapers and magazines, Mr. Lania has written several plays, both American and European. One of these starred Hedy Lamarr, whom he discovered in a Berlin dramatic school.
