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Boone Trounces Grinnell

Girls Surprise Farnhamville

On January 21, the Boone girls handed the Farnhamville six their second defeat of the season, with 48 points to the opposing 44. Boone led 14 to 13 at the quarter and after trailing by three points at halftime, came back to tie the count quickly. However, at the start of the final period Farnhamville led 37-36. High scorer for the game was Judy Malcom with 22 points. Bendickson, of Farnhamville, came in second place with 19 tallies, and Ann Clausen hit for 18 to come in third.

Newton Attack Fails

The Boone High Toreadors kept on the winning road by handing the Newton Cardinals a 59 to 56 loss for a three win, two loss Central Iowa Conference record which gives them sole ownership of third place. Boone seemed to control the action for the biggest share of the first half as they went back to the dressing rooms with a comfortable 37 to 25 lead over the Cardinals. Bad passing helped the second half rally by Newton as they almost ousted the Toreadors from the C.I.C. title race. The Cards narrowed the lead to 58-54 with 45 seconds left to play when Merrill Peterson bagged the clinching point on the charity line. A dribbling exhibition by Dave Gustafson ate up 25 seconds, but Newton gained control of the ball and a drive-in jump shot by Ron Morris found the mark to narrow the lead to three points. A traveling violation gave the Newton five another chance, but the clock ended the game before they could tally.

A 79 to 67 victory for the Boone Toreadors left Grinnell in the cold Friday, January 21. Leading by as much as 13 points in the first quarter, Boone had the Tigers well in a rut. Some changes were then made in the Orange and Black lineup and they began to gain on the Toreadors. With both teams retiring at the half time, Boone led with a slim margin of 39-34. Merrill Peterson then took charge, making a long shot and two free throws. From that point on the Boone five seemed to pull away, keeping at least 15 points ahead of Grinnell. The final score turned a 79-67 conference win for the Toreadors. Collis was high point man with 21 points and his competitor, Pearson, tallied 17 points.

Girls Fall to Roland

The third quarter proved fatal to the Boone Toreadorettes as they fell to a powerful Roland squad by the score of 63 to 54 January 14 on Boone's home floor. The Toreadorettes outplayed the Rockettes in the first half of the game but were unable to cling to the lead in the third quarter as the Rockettes iced the game by outscoring Boone 17-9. The biggest difference in the game was a 49-32 Roland lead at the close of the third quarter. Ann Clausen paced the Boone offensive attack with 28 points but was unable to cope with the Roland forwards. A fourth quarter rally by the Boone six failed to cover the damage done in the third quarter.

A CLUE by SUE

In the first round of the Boone County boys' basketball tournament, the local club came through in fine fashion to down the Boxholm crew 61 to 52. Featuring a balanced scoring attack and fine floor work, the Boone five took a late first period lead and never relinquished it. Don Schroeder led the Boone scoring column with 14 points, followed by Gary Grabau and Bob Harder with 11 points each. Jim Lawless tallied nine, Jerry Johnstone nine, Tom Miller six, and Dave Gibbs two, to complete the Boone scoring. Merlin Muench, besides being a rugged defensive player, wrapped up all scoring honors of the game, totaling 17.

Unable to overcome their opponents' early lead, Coach Dave Honeck's squad was defeated at the hands of Ogden, the defending tournament champs, 61 to 52. At the halftime Boone left the floor training by 18 points, but they came back with 25 counters to Ogden's 19 in the third quarter. Boone's chances diminished when Grabau, Schroeder, and Harder fouled out in the final minutes. Gary Grabau and Harry Kruse shared scoring honors for the evening with 16 points each. Don Schroeder and Bob Harder contributed 15 and 11 points respectively.

The Madrid Tigers gained consolation honors in the Boone County tournament by rolling over Boone 68 to 59. Ken Bregar and Joe Gosset were the outstanding players for Madrid both offensively and defensively. Don Schroeder again led the Boone scoring with 13 points, followed by Tom Miller with 11, and Gary Grabau with 10. At halftime, Madrid led the locals by eight points and from that point on the Tigers were never in serious trouble, although several times the Boone J.V.'s narrowed the margin to five or six points.

Being subdued by a strong Ames five earlier in the season, the Boone Toreadors will be striving to down their traditional rivals on their home court, Friday, February 4. Wolf and Krocheski seem to be the major threats to Boone, but if the Toreadors are playing the brand of ball that they are capable of, it will be an undecided ball game until the final buzzer.

"Boone has an outstanding team this year and we are going to the State Tournament." This is a definite statement made by Kenny Sparks as to the improvement of our boys' basketball team. As most people know, Kenny is on the first string of our basketball team—and it is also his favorite sport. Coming from Newton after the first nine weeks of his junior year, we thought it might be hard to play against his former teammates as he did two weeks ago. But, being a loyal and true fan to Boone, he was playing all-out for the local five. While he was going to school at Newton he was out for track and basketball just as in Boone. Outside of the regular school sports in which he participates, Kenny likes to swim and play baseball. After graduating, college is his ambition. So far he hasn't decided whether to go to Cornell or Drake. Sports are going to be part of his activities, at least in his freshman year. Besides being outstanding in other ways, Kenny Sparks, pictured above, also excels in height. As the picture shows, Kenny is just about of equal height with the basket, which is 10 feet from the floor.
