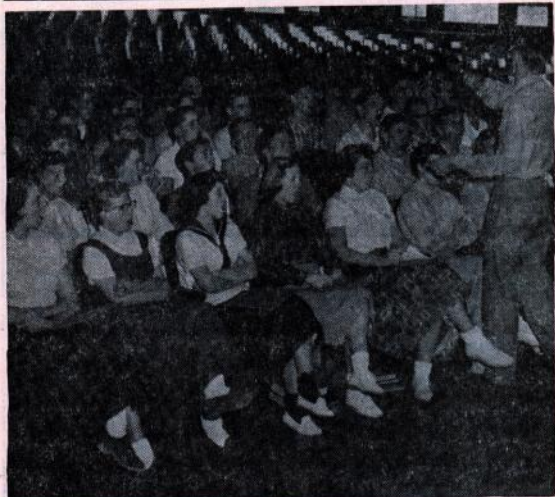

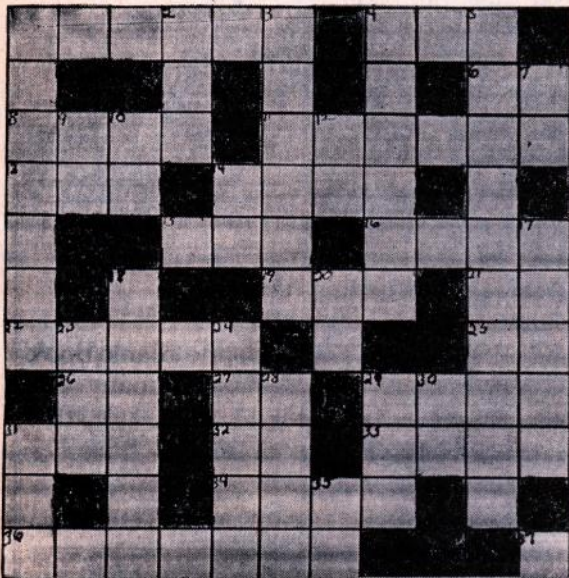

A Belated Introduction

The first, fifth, and sixth dates each year have been left open for non-conference opponents.

The Toreador schedule for the first five years as far as conference play goes is as follows, with number of game in parenthesis:

1957—Ames at Boone (2), Boone at Marshalltown (3), Boone at Oskaloosa (4), Grinnell at Boone (7), and Boone at Newton (8).

1958—Oskaloosa at Boone (2), Boone at Grinnell (3), Newton at Boone (4), Marshalltown at Boone (7), Boone at Ames (8).

1959—Boone at Marshalltown (2), Boone at Oskaloosa (3), Ames at Boone (4), Boone at Newton (7), and Grinnell at Boone (8).

1960—Boone at Grinnell (2), Newton at Boone (3), Marshalltown at Boone (4), Boone at Ames (7), Oskaloosa at Boone (8).

1961—Boone at Newton (2), Ames at Boone (3), Grinnell at Boone (4), Boone at Oskaloosa (7), and Boone at Marshalltown (8).

Starting in 1962 the scheduling will be the same as in 1957 except the games will be played at the opposite school.
