### Students Rule City

Once again the students of Boone High had the chance to learn the different functions of the governmental offices in the city. Student government day was set up to take place the afternoon of May 11, with 16 senior high students taking part.

After campaigning for two days, two sophomores, two juniors, and three seniors were elected by their respective classes to serve on the council with the mayor. The council in turn appointed students to fill eight offices in the city government.

Meeting with Mayor Cooper at 1:00 in his office, the student mayor and the council planned a council meeting at 3:00 and two fire drills, one at Boone High School and one at Sacred Heart School. After checking both schools thoroughly for open windows and other fire hazards, the students reported that Sacred Heart was definitely ahead of the high school. On the second floor alone, only three rooms closed all their windows, while at the Catholic school every window was closed. The school was cleared in less than a minute.

The first proposal brought up at the council meeting was to increase the salaries of swimming pool employees. The question was debated and finally referred to the special committee on swimming pool funds.

The display and use of fireworks were discussed and it was decided that a fireworks display should be held on the Fourth of July for the people of Boone. This was omitted last year on the Fourth.

The build Boone bigger and better project was also discussed. The student council asked Mayor Cooper what was being done in this campaign and then gave their views on what could be done to bring more industry to Boone.

### WellKnown Educator Slated

Dr. James H. Jensen, a native of Nebraska, joined the Iowa State College staff as provost on November 1, 1953, coming to the college from the North Carolina State College where he was head of plant pathology.

In addition to serving as provost of the college, a newly created administrative office, Dr. Jensen is also professor of botany.

As provost, Dr. Jensen will be assistant to the president of the college. He will devote a major part of his activity in assisting with matters of curricula, staff personnel, and in institutional organization. He has full authority to act in the absence of the president from the campus.

Dr. Jensen was born at Madison, Nebraska, graduated from Madison High School in 1924. He received the bachelor of science degree in 1928 and the master of arts degree in 1940 from the University of Nebraska. In 1931 and 1932, he attended Columbia University in New York, and in 1935, he received the degree of doctor of philosophy from the University of Wisconsin.

Dr. Jensen has had wide professional experience. He was assistant pathologist with the Cuba Sugar Club experiment station in Baragua, Cuba, in 1930 and 1931. From 1932 to 1935, he was assistant pathologist in the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, Princeton, New Jersey, and from 1935 to 1937, he was plant pathologist and assistant director of the Puerto Rico Experiment Station. In 1937, he became associate professor of plant pathology at the University of Nebraska and remained there until 1944. During 1940, Dr. Jensen was on leave of absence for nine months serving as a member of the Brookings Institution staff conducting an economic survey of the Dominican Republic. In 1945, he became a member of the staff of North Carolina State College as head of plant pathology and served in this capacity until 1948 when he served on leave with the United States Atomic Energy Commission as chief of the biology branch in Washington, D. C. He rejoined the staff of North Carolina State College in 1949 as head of plant pathology, coming to Iowa State College on November 1, 1953.

He is a member of the American Phytopathological Society, Washington Botanical Club, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the North Carolina Academy of Science, the American Botanical Association, and Sigma Xi science research professional society. He is a member of the National Committee on Radiation Protection, and chairman of Subcommittee on Waste Disposal and Decontamination.

He is also a member of Alpha Zeta and Phi Sigma, agricultural honoraries; Alpha Gamma Rho, social fraternity; and the Cosmos Club of Washington, D. C. He was counselor of the American Phytopathological Society in 1945-1948; editor of the journal in 1949-1951;

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

The boys will play a game of soft ball at this time. All members may attend this year-end picnic if they wish.






