Junior College Begins New Session

New surroundings and the usual first day turmoil opened the beginning of another year of study for the Boone Junior College. For various reasons, such as possible confusion with the high school first day activities and the need for further preparation at the new home for the college, school opened a day later than planned, on September 7. But at 8:30 in the morning on that date, some 107 students reported for their classes at the Franklin building, a former elementary school.

New Dean

A new dean, Robert Heyen, took over business and administrative details with the coming of the new college season. Besides his office duties, Mr. Heyen teaches government classes.

Due to the expense that equipment for laboratory courses would bring about if held in the Franklin building, some of the classes are being held in the high school building. Those classes and the other ones not taught at the college are mathematics, physics, general science, American government, music, art, psychology, chemistry, engineering drawing, speech, and physical education classes. All other subjects are being taught at the new college residence on Twelfth and Carroll Streets.

F. T. A. Meeting Held

The first meeting of the Future Teachers' Association was held on Friday, September 9. Second year education majors joined first year members during their 2:20 class. Meetings from now on will be held during the third period Fridays.

Racing Driver To Speak

A veteran racing driver, Duane Carter, will point out the good driving practices necessary for highway safety in a talk before Boone High School students in general assembly, September 30.

His appearance at Boone High School is a part of the educational highway safety program sponsored by Champion Spark Plug Company, Toledo, and has been arranged for Sieg-Metz Co., a local business firm.

In a career extending over more than 20 years, Mr. Carter has driven in nine of the Memorial Day 500-mile races at Indianapolis, has raced in New Zealand, Argentina, and France, and has participated in the Pan-American Mexican Road Race, speed trials at Daytona Beach, and a number of economy and other test runs.

In addition to his talk before Boone students, Mr. Carter will make a visual safety check of students' cars for those requesting it. Following is a schedule telling the different places where Mr. Carter will visit in Boone High on Friday, September 30.

From 9:00 to 9:30 a.m. he will meet with the Student Council. From 9:30 till 10:15, he will present the assembly program for the senior high. At 10:30 he will meet with the Drivers' Education instructor and class until 11:30. From 12:15 to 1:00 he will make visual inspection of cars of those students wishing it. At 1:00 until 2:00 Mr. Carter will visit the auto mechanics class, and at 2:00 will again visit a drivers' education class.

New Cafeteria

This year at B.H.S. the students are getting acquainted with the hot lunch program. The lunches are inexpensive and are nutritionally planned.

At first, the lunch program was upset because more students ate there than were expected. Now, each morning the lunch count is taken during first hour to aid the cafeteria helpers.

Lunch tokens are sold for 30 cents each, and a lunch ticket may be purchased for \$3.00. This ticket will buy 10 lunches. There is no saving in buying the lunch ticket but it prevents the morning rush for tokens.

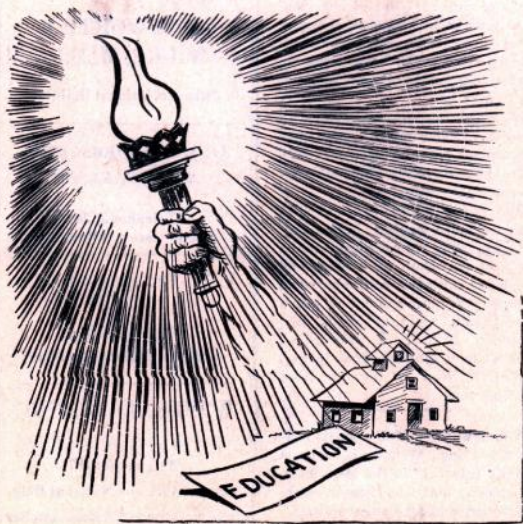
Harrington Wins Award

4. Anyone leaving the dance may not return.

5. There will be no smoking in the building.

6. There will be a charge of 15 cents a person or 25 cents a couple if records are played. An all-school orchestra will play for some of the school dances and then the admission will be 50 cents a couple or 25 cents a student.

Toreadors to Meet Oskaloosa

Boone Loses First Two Games To Webster City and Denison

To open the 1955 football season the Boone High Toreadors traveled to Webster City Friday, September 9, and met defeat, 20-0. The Lynx were continually breaking through the Toreador line to gain vital yardage.

The first big break came in the first quarter when one of the Webster City 11 fell on a Boone fumble on his own 20-yard. A smash over the right side of the Toreador defense proved to be good for six points. The conversion was not good.

Poor punts kept the Lynx within scoring territory. With just 1:14 remaining in the half, a Toreador pass was intercepted by Bill Jackson and returned 13 yards. This put the Lynx on the Boone 15-yard line. Ron Blue carried the ball over right guard for the second touchdown. The extra point try was good.

Again a Webster City gridman recovered a Boone fumble in dangerous territory. Three plays later the score was 20 to 0, after a pass connected between Burnett and Dyvad, who then made the extra point.

Although x-rays showed no broken bones, an ankle separation will sideline sophomore Glen Lee for several weeks. Before his injury Lee was doing an outstanding job on defense. Two other sophomores Jerry Lind and Ron Von Krog, showed up well in the tilt. Bob Harder threw key blocks and engineered effective tackles to pace the Toreadors.

Led by the explosive running of halfback Bob Brandt, the Denison Monarchs defeated the Boone Toreadors, 19-14, Friday night at Goeppinger Field.

On the first play from scrimmage Brandt broke through the line and galloped 71 yards to pay dirt. The conversion failed. Minutes later, Jerry Lind took a Denison punt on the Monarchs' 37 and handed off to Rich Byerly who twisted his way through the Denison defensive for the first Toreador touchdown of the year. Jerry Johnstone's kick split the uprights, putting Boone in front, 7-6.

Then Brandt, taking Johnstone's kick-off, raced up the sides to the Boone 30, where Von Krog, the last man between him and the goal, forced him out. The official ruled he had hit the chalk at the Denison 44, and the threat of the Monarchs scoring was ended.

In the second quarter a pass from Schroeder to Brandt was good for 68 yards and another touchdown for Denison. The extra point try again failed, making the score 12-7. Brandt grabbed a Boone punt and scrambled down the sidelines where Von Krog, in trying to force him out, was blocked by the official, and it was another Denison touchdown.

In the fourth quarter, Jack Robertson raced off-tackle 18 yards for another Boone score. Johnstone's kick was true and the score stood at 19-14. Boone had the ball twice after that, but they could not succeed in scoring again.

First Conference Tilt For Boone Team

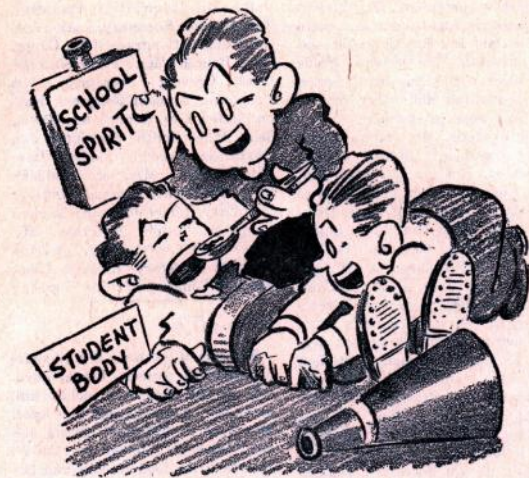
A much improved Toreador team will travel to Oskaloosa tomorrow night to partake in their first conference game. The Oskey's won over Belle Plaine last week 20-0, while the Toreadors were defeated by Denison, 19-14.

Oskey has a new coach this year. Boone coach McIntyre states that it is one of the finest teams he has seen this season. With two outstanding backfield men, Halfback McDonald and Quarterback Prine, along with 12 lettermen, the Indians rate high in the C.I.C. this year.

Clifton Named Varsity Coach

The only new addition to the Boone High coaching staff is a young man already familiar to many of the students and teachers. 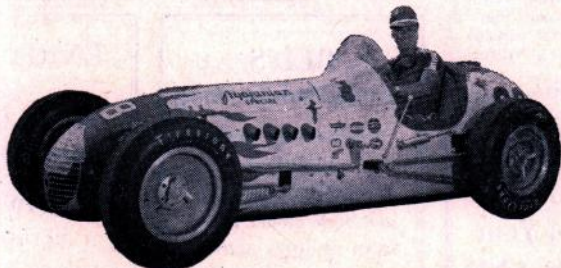
