'I Love Lucy' seems to be more popular nationally than it is here, because it is usually either first or second nationally and it is fourth here. Neither 'Alfred Hitchcock' nor 'Bob Neither 'Alfred Hitchcock' nor 'Bob Cummings,' both rated third here, showed up among the national top 10. Two of our third places, 'Robin Hood' and 'Father Knows Best,' are seldom mentioned among the national favorites.

How Junior High Spend and Save

Should I get a job? Should I ask my parents for a raise in my allowance? Am I spending too much money on one certain item? If you have been asking yourself these questions, read the following article to help you solve your problems.

Because it is harder for the seventh grade students than for the eighth and ninth graders to find a job, 65% of them receive an allowance and 46% work. 57% of eighth graders receive an allowance are

graders receive an allowance and 50% work. In the ninth grdae 53%

50% work. In the ninth grdae 53% have jobs and 48% receive an allowance. Some junior high students work and receive an allowance also.

The tabulation showed that the average allowance per week for seventh grade is \$1.10; for eighth grade \$1.40; and for ninth grade \$1.75. (If your allowance is more than this, don't show this article to your mother!)

The most common jobs which jun-

The most common jobs which junior high students have are baby sitting jobs, household jobs, paper routes, and store jobs. (One junior high student seams to have the high student seems to have the unal job of 'borrowing money from

Dad'.) The Dad'.)

The ninth grade students earn the most money per week, for their average earning is \$4.20. The eighth grade's average weekly earning is \$2.60, and the average weekly earning for the seventh grade is \$1.50.

Most of the money the junior high students earn is spent for clothes, the movies, church, food, and school supplies.

Every week a seventh grade stu-

clothes, the movies, church, food, and school supplies.

Every week a seventh grade student spends on an average of 15 cents for candy and gum; 25 cents for church, dues, and haircuts; 30 cents for books, magazines, and school supplies; 40 cents for food; 45 cents for the movies; \$1.00 for hobbies; \$1.10 for school lunch; \$1.90 for new clothes; and for just anything else 40 cents.

The eighth grade's biggest expenditure is for clothes. An eighth grade student spends an average fo \$2.00 for clothes every week. He spends \$1.35 a week for hobbies; \$1.25 for school lunch; 90 cents on a date; 60 cents for movies; 45 cents for food; 35 cents for books; 30 cents for church and school sup-

cents for food; 35 cents for books; 30 cents for church and school supplies; 25 cents for haircuts, and 20 cents for candy, gum, and dues.

A ninth grade student spends 30 cents for candy, gum, books, magazines, and school supplies; 75 cents for the movies; \$1.70 on a date; 35 cents for church; 50 cents for food; 25 cents for dues and haircuts; \$1.35 for school lunch; for hobbies \$1.05; \$2.35 for clothes; and \$1.00 for miscellaneous items.
