Veishea celebrations were held at Iowa State College on May 10, 11, and 12. Boone High seniors were excused from school to attend the Career Day festivities on May 11.

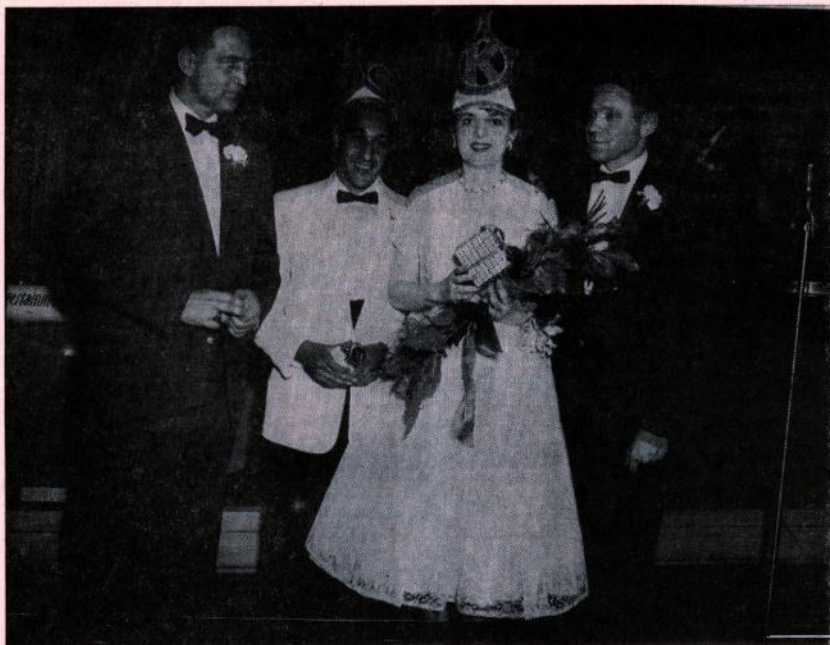
Open house was the Career Day attraction, but several other events were of interest to the visitors.

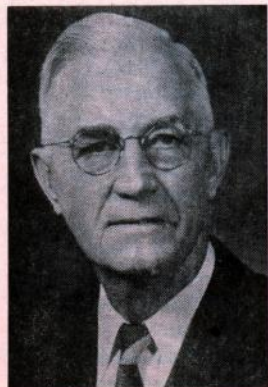
### Journalism Scholarships

Mr. Thorngren came to Boone in 1925. He received his training at Drake University with additional training at Iowa State College. He was appointed to the position of Dean of Junior College and held this position for 25 years.

While he was Dean, he taught history, economics, sociology, American government, and Bible.

This is the second retirement for Mr. Thorngren. Two years ago he retired from the position of Dean of the Boone Junior College. He is the first man that has ever retired from Boone schools.

His future plans are indefinite.

Shari Sowle: As far as I know I will keep on working at the library, then attend J.C. After that—who knows?

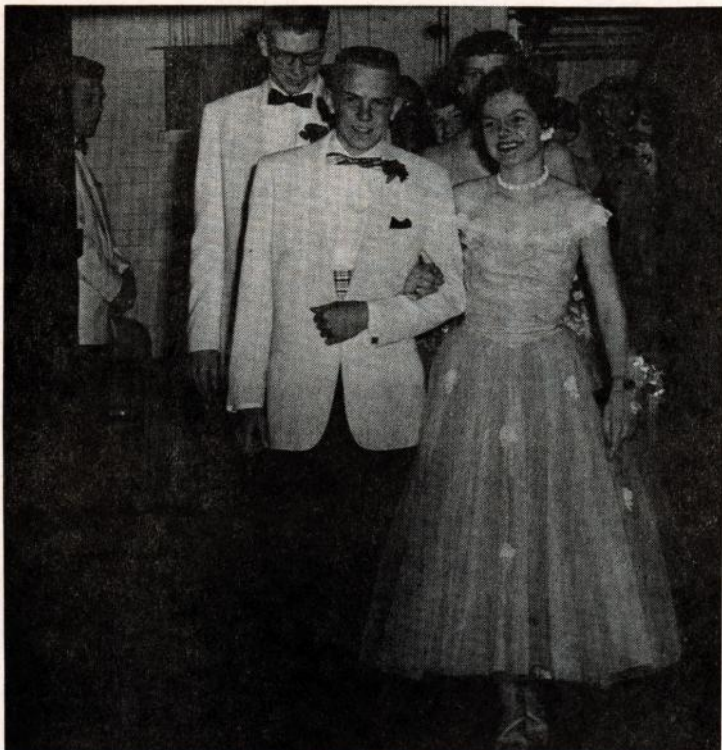
Harold Steffy: This is a difficult problem, because I am not sure.

In district prep golf play, Boone was the top team in the Fort Dodge pairings. The Toreador linksmen carded a team score of 335 points; Carroll was second with 342 points, and Perry finished third with 343.

Bob Appenzeller had scores of 39-39-78 which tied him for medalist honors with Ronny Powell of Pierson. In the playoffs the Toreador golfer won over Powell.

For the first time, the Iowa Girls' High School Athletic Union will sponsor the district golf tournament this year, Saturday, May 19. Twenty-one schools are entered in the districts.

Boone's only entrant in the meet is senior Ann Clausen, unless other Boone girls enter at a later date. The I.G.H.S.A.U. sponsorship of the program may intrigue more girls to become interested in the sport.
