Of special interest was in the 100-yard breaststroke where Bill Herman came in second to Terry Tinan of Sioux City. Terry's time, by the way, 1:04.9, is fast enough for him to have an all-American rating for prep schools.

In the 200-yard freestyle Mike Herman came in first with a time of 2:14.8, a highlight for Boone. Also a first was obtained in the 160-yard freestyle when Bill Herman, Alan Norton, Lee Cook, and Freddie Vitt came through with a time of 1:22.

Seconds were gained for Boone in the 100-yard freestyle by Dave Nelson, 40-yard freestyle by Fred Vitt, and the 100-yard backstroke by Jim Cross.



Boone Sophs vs. Osky

Bowing to the Oskaloosa Sophomores, the Boone sophs were beaten by a margin of 25 points.

Never getting off the ground, the Boone sophs were behind 11 to 2 at the first quarter, 19 to 10 in the second quarter, 34 to 14 in the third quarter, and finally 48 to 23 in the last quarter.

Our top scorers were 'Chuck' McGriff, Carroll Claybaugh, and Steve Shaler, all scoring four points.

Lanning of Oskaloosa led with 23 points.

Sophomore Games

Grinnell's sophomore basketball team was defeated 50-37 by Boone on December 7. Tim Croxen and Carroll Clabaugh were Boone High point players, with 16 points each. 'Chuck' McGriff's rebounding work was also a great help. Boone spurted from a 10-all first period tie to a 25-19 third period bulge and led 34-28 as they started the fourth act.

Boone Girls Lose

Coach Carroll's Toreadorettes lost a third game a week ago Tuesday to the McCallsburg Eagles. It seemed as though it was just a bad night for sextet as they were not able to maneuver the ball adequately which killed Boone's bid for a 3-2 record.

The Toreadorettes were behind only eight points at halftime. During the third quarter McCallsburg led 48-22 and Coach Cliff Christenson's Eagles finished with 27 points over Boone.

Only twice during the fourth period of the game did Boone get as close as 25 points. At one time the Eagles led by 31 points. Rita Howard was Boone's leading scorer who totaled 21 points.

The final score was 62-35.

Sophomore Webster City Game

Playing good ball all the way, the Sophs came in with a 45-43 victory over Webster City.

Lose to Grinnell

Playing a losing game against Grinnell, ranked second in the pre-season ratings, the Boone Toreadorettes were defeated, 63 to 47, a margin of 16 points. An excellent display of basketball ability was demonstrated by Larry Land. He led the Boone scoring with 17 points followed by 'Chuck' Musser with eight points.

Boone was really in the game only during the first half when the score at the first quarter was 13 to 12, our favor.

Coach Clifton took out the regulars in the third quarter as both Bob and 'Chuck' Musser had four fouls. This gave the regulars a rest before the last quarter.

Beating Oskaloosa in an aggressive, fast-moving game, the score for Boone was 67 to Osky's 64.

During the first quarter Boone allowed Osky to get a 6-point lead (21 to 15), but the tables were turned at the end of the second quarter when Boone lead by five points (37 to 32).

Larry Meyers led the first half scoring with 12 points, closely followed by 'Chuck' Musser with 11 points. Jack Robertson also did a fine job as starting center.

Letting up a little in the third quarter, the Toreadorettes allowed the Osky Indians to close the gap in the score. At the end of this quarter the score was again tied (46 to 46). Boone finally shook Osky off the trail in the fourth quarter and won with a final score of 67 to 64.

In the second half 'Chuck' Musser made eight points for a total of 19 and Larry Meyers, our top scorer, made nine points for a total of 21 points. Osky's top scorer was their forward, Groves, with 24 points.

This gives Boone a one win, one lose in the conference and Oskaloosa a no win, two lose record in the conference.

Travels by Bus and Boat

Miss Connie Larrew, a former Boone High seventh grade student, left Wednesday, December 5th with her mother and five little brothers and sisters for Lisbon, where they will meet her father.

They left Boone for Chicago at 6:35 p.m. by Greyhound, and had a two-hour stop-over between busses. From Chicago they went straight through to New York, arriving there Friday, December 7th, at about 7:30 p.m. They stayed overnight at the Picadilly Hotel in New York, and saw the Statue of Liberty.

Boat Leaves at Noon

They left at noon the next day, December 8th, aboard the liner 'Vulcania.' This ship has five decks, a sunroom, gameroom, ballroom, and a swimming pool, to mention only a few items. The Larrews had two large cabins, and were going by tourist passage.

The boat trip took a week, and they arrived in Lisbon, Portugal, on December 14th, where Mr. Larrew met them. They will live on the sixth story of an apartment building there, complete with new furniture and a balcony. Connie was worried about the balcony, and said she only hoped that "the kids wouldn't throw each other from it."

The family car is an eight-passenger Volkswagen that resembles a small bus. The doors open in the middle of it, instead of from either side. The little Larrews had their first day at an American private school December 19th. They will live in Portugal for four years. Mr. Larrew is employed by the Philco Company.

Connie said, "I'm excited about going, of course, but I'd rather stay here with my friends." She has promised to write a letter to the Bumble 'B' after she's been over there awhile, and will describe the climate, the people, their standards, habit, and manner of dress, and her impression in general. She would enjoy hearing from Boone friends.
