Ida is the sandwich lady in the school cafeteria. She lives at 528 Cedar Street and is the mother of three children, two boys and one girl. Vacations when they will be home are her most looked forward to events. Although she is 62 years young and eligible for retirement, Ida plans to keep working. When asked what she liked so well about the cafeteria, she promptly replied, "The kids."

Are you satisfied with the way the cafeteria operates? It is run for your own well-being. A lot of hard work goes into it for your comfort and health every day.

The cooks come at 7 o'clock each morning and work until 4 o'clock every afternoon. Into this time they pack the work of preparing the day's meal, serving that meal, and starting on the next day's meal. These are just the main divisions of their work. But in each there are many technicalities to be paid attention to. For instance, the supervisor must watch the work of the others to see that everything is sanitary. Also she must plan meals that are balanced.

Many students complain about the menus, but they don't seem to realize that a certain diet must be met to get state aid. Also there are complaints about the price, but the amount and quality of this food for 30 cents excels by far the food for that same price downtown.

In other words, the cafeteria lunch is a bargain that only the uninformed and thoughtless students fail to appreciate.
