Seniors Reveal Past, Present, and Future


Boone High class of '57 presented its class day program Wednesday, May 15 to the senior high student body in the auditorium.

Mrs. Zoe Stevens, after 32½ years at Boone, is looking forward with genuine anticipation to an opportunity to enjoy her hobbies, to read, and to take an occasional trip.

Probably more students can say they know Mrs. Stevens than any other teacher since she has been working in a required course area, English. The large majority of Boone graduates have passed through her English 113 (American literature) course.

The respect of students for her as a person and instructor, is demonstrated by the fact that this year's annual, the Scroll, was dedicated to her. Mrs. Stevens, a Grinnell graduate, was for 24 years, Scroll advisor, and for 18 years she was high school librarian. For three years she sponsored Hi-Tri and she has been a sophomore and junior sponsor at various times.

Mrs. Stevens taught at Jordan for two years prior to service at Boone. She was principal there for one year.



Installation of slot machines will take the place of pencil-vending machines in an effort to combat students betting on which color pencil they receive. Also, each table in the library is going to be equipped with a built-in roulette wheel.

Bets on horse races and ball games may be placed at Mrs. Ick's desk and results broadcast over the intercom at 20-minute intervals. 
