Scholarship Opportunities Announced

As the end of the semester approaches, all those seniors who are seriously thinking about attending college and are interested in financial aid should be checking into available scholarship programs. Many scholarships of all kinds are available and should be investigated thoroughly by contacting Mr. Abbott. Also, a student planning to attend a specific college should either write to the college or refer to the catalog (which can be found in Mr. Tillson's office) of that school concerning available scholarships.

All students planning to enroll in college should check into the matter of restricted enrollment and determine whether an entrance exam is required. A number of colleges

throughout the nation require a student to take the Scholastic Aptitude Test set up by the College Entrance Examination Board. This exam consists of a three-hour Scholastic Aptitude Test which is given in the morning, and a series of onehour Achievement Tests which are given in the afternoon. The tests are administered on several scheduled dates during the year at testing centers throughout the country and overseas. Candidates taking these tests register for them in advance, take the tests, and have their test scores reported to any college or university. The scores may also be reported to sponsors of scholarship programs. The tests will be given on the following dates and centers in Iowa: February 8, March

15, May 17, and August 13, in Cedar Falls, Cedar Rapids, Davenport, Des Moines, Dubuque, Fort Dodge, Mason City, Mount Pleasant, Sioux City, and Waterloo.

BOONE JUNIOR COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS

Any student planning to attend Boone Junior College who is interested in a scholarship should contact Dean Heyen or Mr. Abbott. Application blanks can be obtained in Mr. Abbott's office.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR NURSES

A great number of scholarships are available for those persons interested in nursing as a profession. One of these is the program offered by the American Cancer Society, worth \$500.

IOWA STATE SCHOLAR-SHIPS FOR FRESHMEN

Prospective freshman students at Iowa State should also check with Mr. Abbott on available scholarships. Iowa State College offers many scholarships in nearly every field a student might enter. Applications for these scholarships should be made as soon as a student completes his seventh semester of high school.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM FOR IOWA, STATE TEACHERS, IOWA STATE COLLEGE

A committee made up of men from the three state schools of

higher learning in Iowa each year organize the Iowa College Scholarship and Placement testing program. This program was set up for two basic reasons: The first of these was to provide Iowa colleges with objective test data for admissions, placement, and scholarship purposes. The second is to provide in one program the necessary testing that is now being carried on independently by several different colleges. All seniors who are planning to attend one of the state schools should plan to take this exam on either Tuesday, April 1, or Wednesday, April 2, 1958. For further information on this program students should contact Mr. Abbott.
