11 New Teachers Named for 1958-59

Eleven new teachers have been hired for the 1958-1959 school year which will commence in September. Following are those teachers who have been hired:

Robert G. Anderson, who has been doing graduate work at Iowa State College, will teach math in the senior high. He graduated from Augustana College, located at Sioux Falls, South Dakota, where he majored in math and physics and minored in chemistry.

Miss Rosemary Hall will also teach math in senior high. She is now a teacher, high school principal, and girls' basketball coach at Dayton. Miss Hall, whose home is at Clemons, is working on her Master's degree at Iowa State College.

Edwin L. Morgan, who now teaches at Keosauqua, will teach junior high social studies and coach ninth grade sports. He is a graduate of Parsons College at Fairfield, and holds a master's degree from Drake University. Mr. Morgan is married and has a family.

Miss Margaret Elwood, who will also graduate from Iowa State this June, will teach home economics. Her home is Williamsburg.

Ten Seniors Awarded College Scholarships

Several Boone High seniors have been awarded college scholarships for the coming school year. These scholarships were awarded on the basis of scholastic records, activities, test results, and financial need.

Lois Hicks has been awarded the Fisher Foundation Scholarship to Iowa State Teachers College. This \$200 scholarship covers books and tuition.

Janet Guenther has also received a scholarship to Iowa State Teachers College. Her scholarship, which amounts to \$80 a semester, is renewable for four years as long as she maintains a 'C' average.

The Younker Academic Achievement Scholarship was awarded Bob Musser by Grinnell College. This scholarship amounts to \$700 a year and is renewable each year provided the required scholarship standards are maintained. Plus the scholarship is an employment of \$200 a year which is also renewable.

Karen Mustapha was awarded an American Cancer Society Scholarship. This \$500 scholarship is to be used in any three-year school of nursing in Iowa. Karen plans to attend Mercy Hospital School of Nursing at Des Moines this fall.

A Rockford College scholarship of \$1,000 for two years (\$500 each year) has been awarded Laurel Rans. The award was given in recognition of Laurel's high scholastic achievement and activities record. She will enter Rockford College at Rockford, Illinois, next September.

Anna Longhenry and Karen Williams were awarded Student-Aid Scholarships to Iowa State College. These scholarships amount to full tuition of \$231 for one year, but are renewable upon application and maintaining the required 2.5 grade average.

The following scholarships were announced but further information is unavailable at this time: William Herman (Grinnell), Donald Flockhart (University of Iowa), Howard Rogers (Iowa State College).

Mike Gleason has received an appointment to West Point.

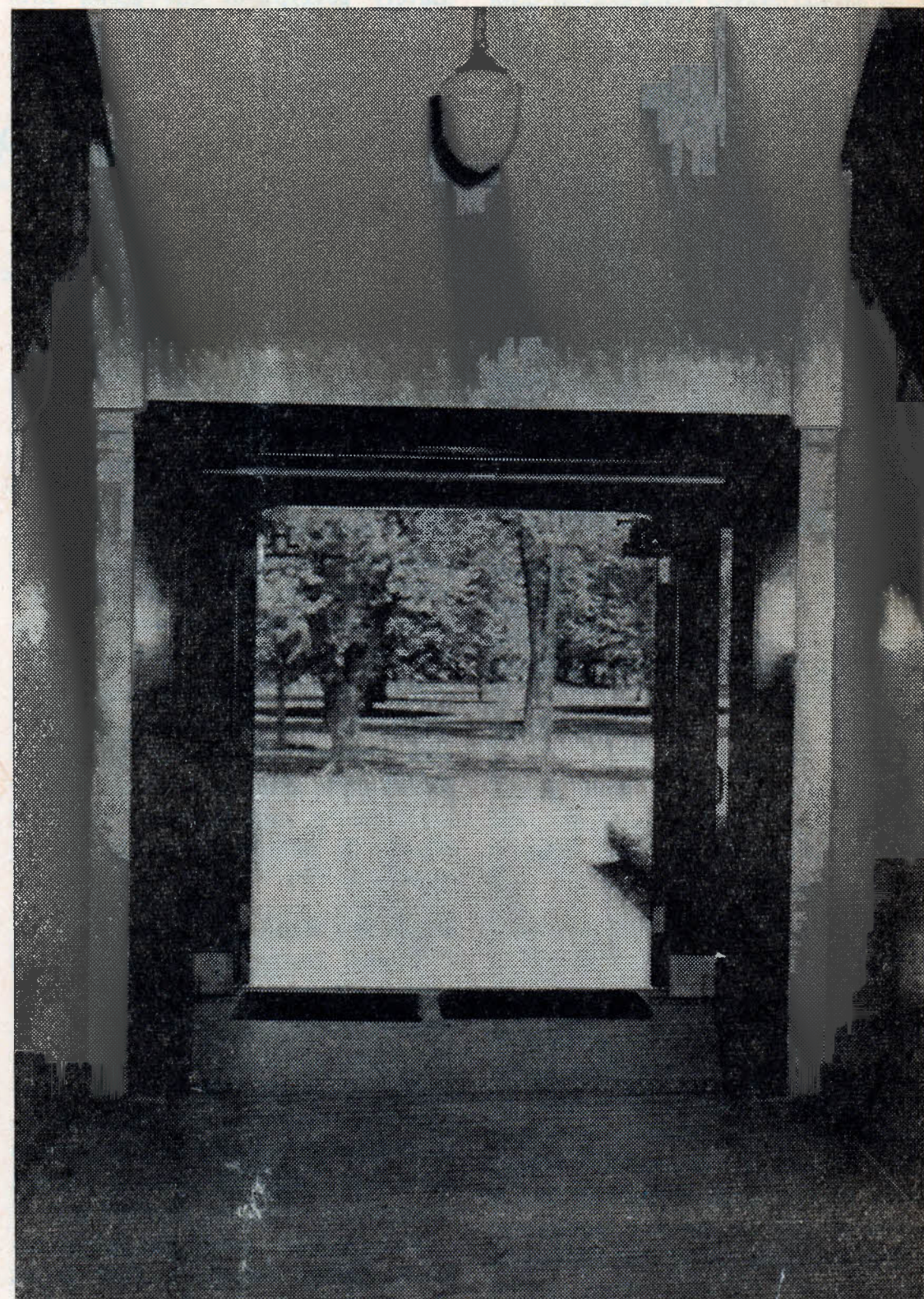
William Herman has received the D.A.R. award for scholarship in American history.

Lawrence Parr, who has been teaching at Dallas Center for the last five years, will be the assistant football coach, sophomore basketball coach, and will teach social studies. He is a graduate of Simpson College. Mr. Parr is married and has a family.

Longhenry Rates I in Poetry Contest

Anna Longhenry, a senior at Boone High, received an I rating in the Iowa Poetry Association's 1958 contest for schools. Anna's poem, 'Deer Season,' will be printed in this year's edition of 'Lyrical Iowa' and she will also receive a certificate.

Dr. Grace Hunter, of Grinnell College, judged the contest, which consisted of 640 poems submitted by 509 students in 52 Iowa towns. Entries showed a 30 per cent increase this year over last year.

Policy Adopted for Fall

On May 13, the seventh, eighth, and ninth grades had separate assemblies, during which Mr. Moore discussed the new policy that will go into effect next year.

Next year the students will pay their book rental fees a week before school starts. The seniors and ninth grade will pay August 26, the juniors and eighth grade, August 28. The total cost for the ninth grade will be \$12.50, for the eighth and seventh grades, \$8.50. The total cost includes: book rental fee, towel fee, activity ticket, and locker fee.

Next year the students may choose anyone they want for a locker mate. Everyone in senior high must buy an activity ticket, while the students in junior high must buy a separate junior high activity ticket costing \$1.25.

Fort Dodge

Boone's No. 2 golfer, Jim Moore, shot a 39 Thursday, May 8, to earn medalist honors, but the Toreador linksmen were defeated by Fort Dodge, 164-172.

Bruce Nelson and Jerry Beck led Fort Dodge with 40's.

Other Boone scores were Brian Knezevich, 42; Ralph Patterson, 45; 'Chuck' McGriff, 46; and 'Chuck' McCubbins, 48.

Roosevelt

At this point, the position of the golf team doesn't seem to look too promising as they lost their fifth straight match, this one to Roosevelt of Des Moines, to whom they handed a one-stroke defeat early in the year. Roosevelt had a score of 166 to 180 for Boone.

Boone's best score was turned in by 'Chuck' McGriff, who carded a 43.

There were two meet medalists, both of Roosevelt: Jim Haffer and Jeff Stanley, both with 40's.

Other Boone scores were Jim Moore, 44; 'Chuck' McCubbins, 47; Brian Knezevich, 46; and Dick Hamilton, 52.

Defeat Perry

The Boone linksmen carded a 166 to match the lowest score of the year as they defeated the Perry Bluejays, 166-169, at the Boone Golf and Country Club on Tuesday, May 13.

Brian Knezevich won medalist honors with a two over par 38, one stroke better than runnerup Jim Moore.

Perry's district meet medalist, J. D. Turner, had a 40.

Dick Hamilton led Boone's reserves to a 183-198 victory over Perry's reserves as he fired a 41 and had an eagle two on the No. 3 hole.

The six teams finished in this order: Ames 319, Grinnell 320, Boone 333, Oskaloosa 344, Marshalltown 346, and Newton 355.

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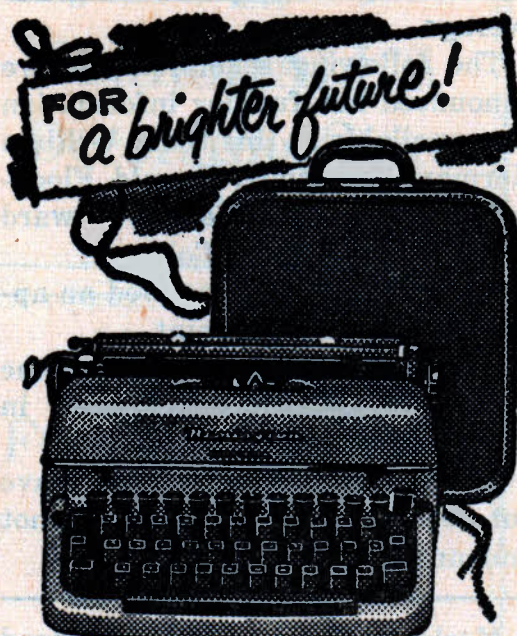
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Seniors' Expectations

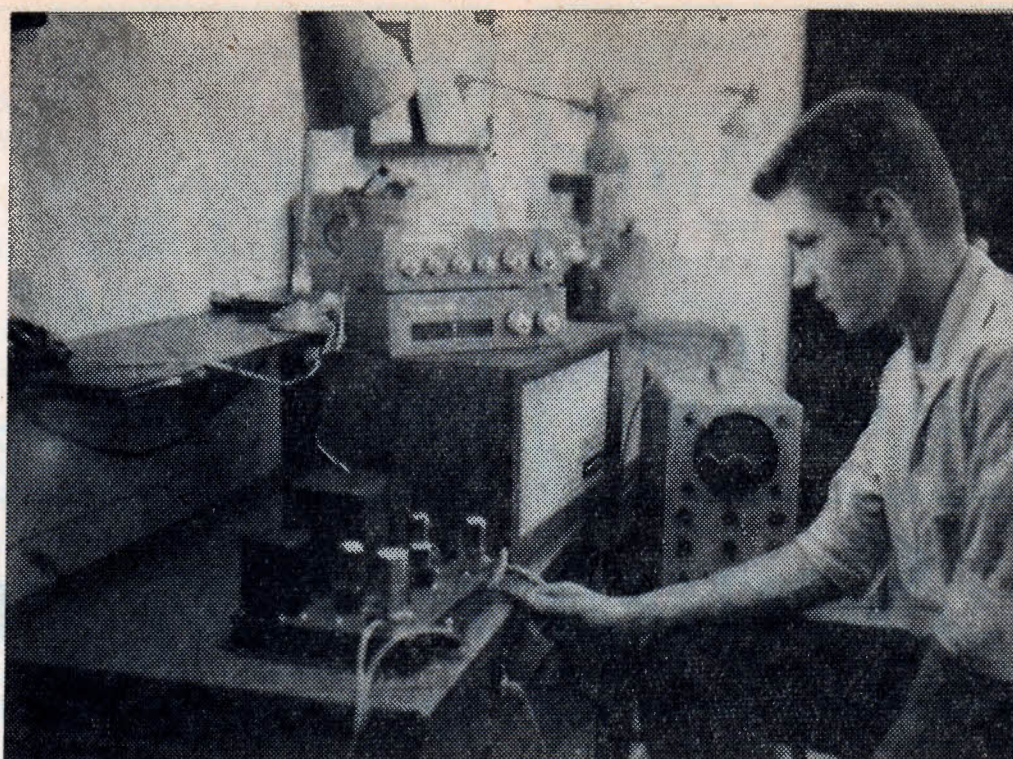

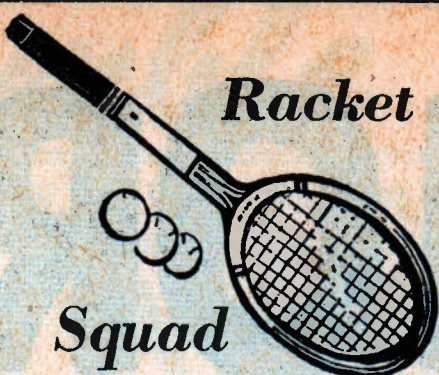
yard dash Cross took a third place win.

H.S. Band Marches in Veishea Parade

The Boone High School band marched in the Veishea parade Saturday morning, May 17. This was the first time that the Boone band has been represented at Veishea in recent years. The parade theme for this year was 'Century of Progress' with the parade being divided into four 25-year periods. The Boone band marched in the last period—1933 to 1958—and played the selection, 'Band Jive.' A dance routine was a part of Boone's marching performance.

Veishea is an annual affair of Iowa State College. The title was derived from the first letters of the five main departments of Iowa State—Veterinary Medicine, Engineering, Industrial Science, Home Economics, and Agriculture. It has grown to become the largest student-managed festival in the world with over 175,000 visitors each year. Its purpose is to display the achievements of the college to the people of Iowa and the nation, especially the high school students.

This year's Veishea festival was a special one, since 1958 is Iowa State's Centennial year. Some of the featured events besides the parade were canoe races, dances, career day, horse show, 'Stars Over Veishea' (an outdoor student musical production), and 'Vodvil' (variety talent show).

The Veishea parade contained 80 floats and 35 bands and traveled a three-mile route.

Seniors of Boone High enjoyed a 'skip day' Friday, May 16. This allowed them to attend Veishea, although it wasn't required.

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
