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Toreadors Fall to Indians in Conference Opener

Osky scored twice in the second quarter, in the opening minutes on halfback Steve Lewis' left end skirt. Conversion attempt was good.

Oskaloosa recovered a fumbled Boone pitchout on the Boone 32 and marched for their second TD of the contest, the drive ending as Lewis broke into paydirt once more, this time slashing across tackle. Monen deflected the try for point attempt.

The final Osky score came on a 38-yard run around his own left end by fullback Larry White. The conversion was good, and the scoreboard showed the final total, 20-7.

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Grinnell Score Final?

The final decision as to whether the Boone-Grinnell football game will be replayed was not announced at the time the Bumble 'B' went to press.

With the score standing 7-13 with 1:30 left to go in the third period of play, Bill Monen picked up a Grinnell fumble on his own one-yard line and streaked 99 yards to paydirt.

Official Wayne Coolie ruled the touchdown did not count on the grounds that the rules do not allow a defensive team to pick up a fumble and run.

However, Coolie later announced that this decision was not correct. The final decision now rests in the hands of the Iowa High School Athletic Association.
