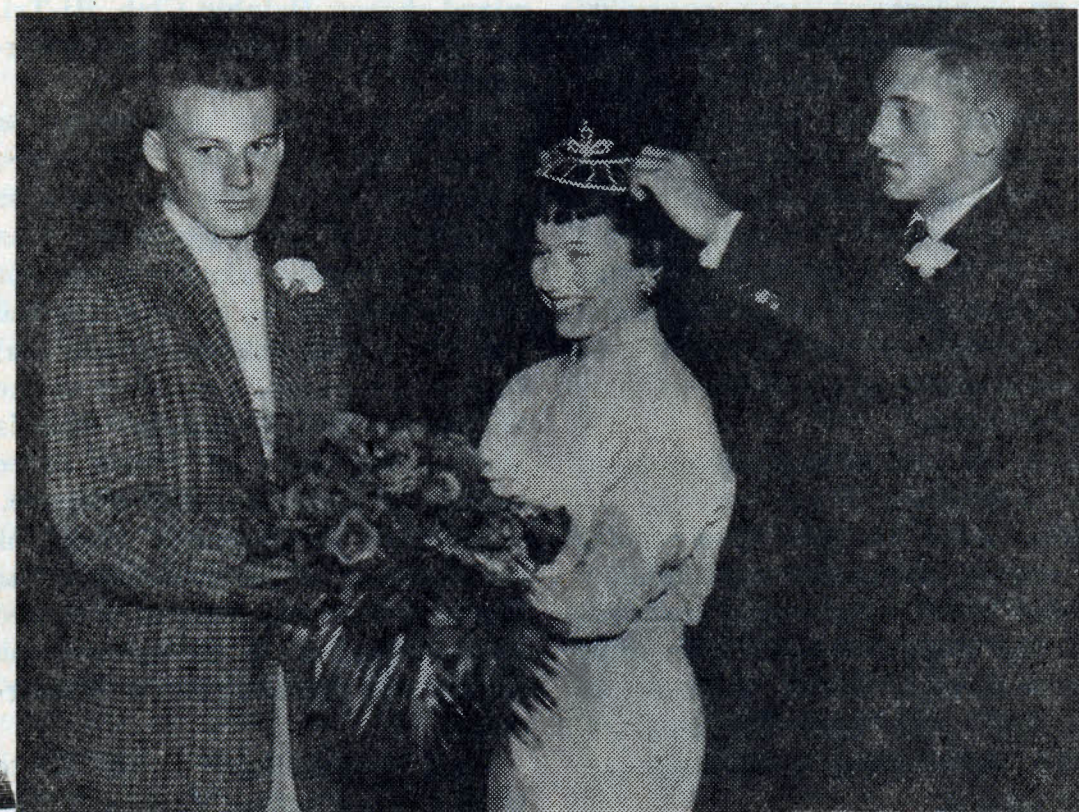

A fellow can learn a lot in school. But he can also learn a lot in the woods. This world might be better off if everyone spent some time in the woods, except then, there would be no peace and quiet in the woods.

The speaker of these words was Jim Hartley. He sat in one of the many nondescript gray enameled chairs which seem to float around Boone High and show up almost anywhere. This one happened to be backstage in the auditorium, and the flaming yellow of the maple tree out beyond the flagpole seems to flow around his square-jawed silhouette. Against this background of translucent yellow were the glasses, quiet eyes, and brown hair combed back.

Jim has been in Boone High since his sophomore year. Now in his senior year, he has been named as one of the 10,000 semi-finalists in the Merit Scholarship program, the top 10,000 of some 470,000 of the top high school students in the U.S. who took the National Merit Scholarship qualifying test last spring.

Before Boone, Jim lived in New Ulm, Minnesota. Before that his hometown was a little town in southeastern South Dakota. There's not even much use in telling the name of the town. You've probably never heard of it. Not many have.

Jim now lives with his half-sister in Ridgeport. His father has been dead some nine years.

The future—maybe it holds work next summer in Oregon or Washington, then studying at Oregon State next fall. After that, maybe a career in wildlife management with the U.S. Forest Service. Possibly he will do a little writing on the side—novels and short stories.

These seem to fit in with Jim's present interests at the time. They are reading and especially squirrel hunting. So far this season he figures he has taken some 44 squirrels. Also developed this year along this line is a recipe for squirrel burgers.

In Boone High, Jim has spent a year in mixed chorus and Bumble 'B'. In New Ulm he was on the basketball and track squad.

One of the symbols of success in these United States is the number of committees a person is a member of and the organizations he belongs to and is an officer of.

In this light let's have a look at Lynn Anderson. Lynn, president of Pep Club, is in band, orchestra, mixed chorus, Dolphin Club, Hi-Tri, and is past president of her home-room.

This, with little else means a pretty full schedule. But there have been a few honors for her over the years. In ninth grade she was on the alternate team for the State Fair quiz derby. In tenth grade she was a Goeppinger Award candidate; in eleventh grade, a member of the Scholastic Honor Society. She is one of the class of 1959's three holders of a straight 4.00 average.

And now she is one of 10,000 of the top high school students in the United States who have been named as semi-finalists in the competition for the 750 National Merit Scholarships.

Next summer Lynn would like to work in Yellowstone Park, and then next fall go to the State University of Iowa to study medical technology, a course in medical testing of specimens.

The 1958 Homecoming was a sad one for the Boone eleven. The big weekend was upset at Newton nosed out the Toreadors 18-3.

Queen of the Homecoming Dance and game was 5-foot one-inch Dee Eldien. Little Dee added color to the festivities.

Boone played one of the rawest games in many years at Grinnell on September 26. The contest was played from the point of Bill Monen's touchdown with 1:30 left in the third period. Although Grinnell went on to defeat the Toreadors 25-6, the score will be 13-12, the Tigers' way with Boone kicking for the point after.

Top offensive honors for the Boone-Newton game go to Bill Monen, the little 5-foot 7-inch, 130-pound ball of fire who turned October 3 into a 'Roaming Holiday' as he scored two TD's, one on a pass from Bud Munson.

Defensive honors go to junior linebacker Brad Beckett, who came in for the injured Larry Ford. Brad started the North game as line-backer.

Junior end Keith Ablett was the offensive standout in the game with North last week, snaring three of Munson's passes for 83 yards, and for two TD's.

The middle man on defense is always underrated, but not this time. From my sideline seat I think 5-foot 10-inch, 167-pound Ron Rosengreen did a great job of stopping North's running game up the middle and blocking a piont after touchdown.

One of Boone's steadiest backs has been little Bill Monen. He has gained a net yardage of 141 yards in four games, caught 11 passes for 158 yards and three TD's. Although small, Bill makes it up with great speed.

The hardest working Toreador is Herm Ferry, 5-foot 9-inch, 156-pound sophomore, who plays on Monday night for Coach Ralph Carroll's undefeated sophs and Friday takes the field on defense for the Toreadors. In the next 10 days, he will play in five games.

Sophs Take Third Straight

The Boone Sophs ran their winning streak to three here Monday night, October 6, as they handed Fort Dodge a 19-6 defeat after trailing 6-0 in the second period.

With about 9:03 left in the second period, the Fort Dodgers scored their only TD of the evening. Their try for th eextra point was no good.

Aftr the kickoff return of 24 yards by Terry Ferry, the little Toreadors began to move steadily. The drive was climaxed by a pass from Larry Paulsen to George Hannum, who bowled over a tackler at the Fort Dodge 20 and raced into the end zone untouched. The extra point was no good, and the score at the half stood at 6-6.

Early in the second half Fort Dodge drove to the Boone 36, but at this point Hannum intercepted a Dodger pass and raced 55 yards for the touchdown, even though he was nearly tripped up after the interception. This time Ferry took the ball and ran for the extra tally, and Boone led 13-6.

Late in the same period Boone once again took charge of things on their own 44 and climaxed this drive with a one-yard plunge by Phil Ingersoll. For the second time in the evening, Boone missed its try for the extra point, and after a scoreless fourth period, Boone captured its third victory of the season, a 19-6 triumph over the Dodgers.

Paulsen's passing and the running of Hannum, Ferry, and Ingersoll sparked the Boone attack. Ferry lugged the pigskin 11 times for 80 yards and a 7.2 average, and Ingersoll carried it four times for 61 and a 15.25 yardage.

Boone's defensive attack was sparked by Gary McLeod, Ken Walters, and Tom Burke; and Roger Dennis and La Verne Ivis showed great offensive blocking.

Cards Nip Toreadors

The Boone Toreadors fell short a foot of winning their 1958 Homecoming game, but a Boone fumble cut short any hopes of victory for the Harrismen, and the final tally was 18-13, Newton.

Boone has been using a variety of offensive tactics this year, but they ran a number of plays from the single wing against the Cards. Even in losing, the Boonemen have shown considerable improvement, both in offense and defense.

When the game started, it seemed to be all Newton, but after the Cards took a 12-0 lead in the second quarter, Bill Monen returned the Newton kickoff 24 yards and ended the drive by sweeping into the end zone from the five. Denny Ferry's first attempt for the point after went between the uprights, but a penalty nullified this, and his second try was blocked. The score at the half was 12-6, Newton.

Neither team was able to score in the third period, but early in the fourth quarter Newton romped 48 yards to run up their third tally. The point after was no good.

About a minute and a half after this, the Toreadors scored their second TD, as Monen took a pass from Munson and raced 49 yards, cutting and dodging would-be Card tacklers, and made it into the end zone. Ferry's P.A.T. was good, making the score 18-13, with 5:54 remaining in the game.

After the Toreadors kicked off, Newton took the ball but ran out of downs; and on an attempted punt by Jerry Meador, Gary McVicker crashed in from his defensive right end spot to block it, and Boone took over on the Newton 24. Monen then romped 13 yards to the 11. After three downs the pigskin rested on the four.

On a flat pass to Monen, he was grabbed by the noseguard, and for this infraction, Boone was given the ball on the one-foot line. At this point, the fatal mistake occurred.

Tackle Gary McVicker and end Darrell Richards turned in excellent performances on defense. The other members of the line on defense were Ron Rosengreen, Keith Ablett, Larry Ford, 'Chuck' McGriff, Harley McCoy, and Terry Ferry.

Monen was outstanding on offense for the Toreadors, averaging five yards per play, and gaining 60 yards altogether.

Boone gained 148 yards to Newton's 320. As far as statistics go, the Toreadors led only in yards gained passing (64), punt average (seven for an average of 27.6), a ndreturned four kickoffs for a total of 52 yards, compared with two for 37 for the Redbirds.

George Kingery was the outstanding performer for the Cardinals, gaining 148 yards in 23 tries for a 6.4 agerage.

North High Stops Toreadors, 41-20

After being down 21-0 at half-time and 41-7 at the end of the third period, the Boone Toreadors picked up two touchdowns and narrowed the margin to 21 points, but that is all they were able to get, and the Harrismen lost their fifth straight game of the season, 41-20, at the Lincoln High field, Friday, October 10.

Although they were outweighed 31 pounds per man on offense and nearly 50 pounds per man on defense, the Toreadors never gave up. In the first half it was all North, as the Polar Bears romped for three TD's and a safety on a blocked punt, but after the boys had rested, they came out a more determined group than in the first 30 minutes, and they showed it on their first offensive drive of the third statnza, as they covered 56 yards.

Bud Munson threw a strike to Bill Monen for 17, and a 15-yard penalty against the Polar Bears aided the Boone cause. With 8:45 left in the period, Munson fired a pass to Keith Ablett, who made a leaping catch between two North defenders in the end zone for the first Boone score. Denny Ferry's conversion made it 21-7.

North took the kickoff and drove 84 yards, capped by runs of 30 and 33 yards by Nathaniel Craddock and Al Collier, and quarterback Bob McCauley scored from the Boone seven. This made it 27-7, North, but the Toreadors were not ready to call it quits, and after the kickoff, Monen twisted and turned his way up to the Polar Bear 29, a 41-yard scamper. Denny Ferry then romped to the 14, and here the threat ended as a Munson pass strayed into the enemy hands of Gary Lewis, who outdistanced the Boonemen 85 yards for their fifth TD of the game. McCauley's kick made it 34-7. With 31 seconds remaining in the third period, North scored its sixth and final TD of the evening, and once again the try for the extra point was good, and as the third period ended, it was 41-7, North.

After the kickoff, it was all Boone as the Toreadors unleashed a 73-yard drive capped by a 34-yard pass from Munson to Ablett, to Denny Ferry for 11, and the final 28 yards to Ablett, who was all alone on the five. Again Ferry's kick sailed true, and it was now 41-14.

A few seconds later, Munson made up for the pass taken from him earlier by picking off a North aerial and scampering 21 yards to the North 42. After advancing to the North 17, the Toreadors sent in Bill Monen, gained 15 yards on a single wing power sweep, and Ferry powered over from the two. His try for the point after was blocked, and that's the way it ended, 41-20.
