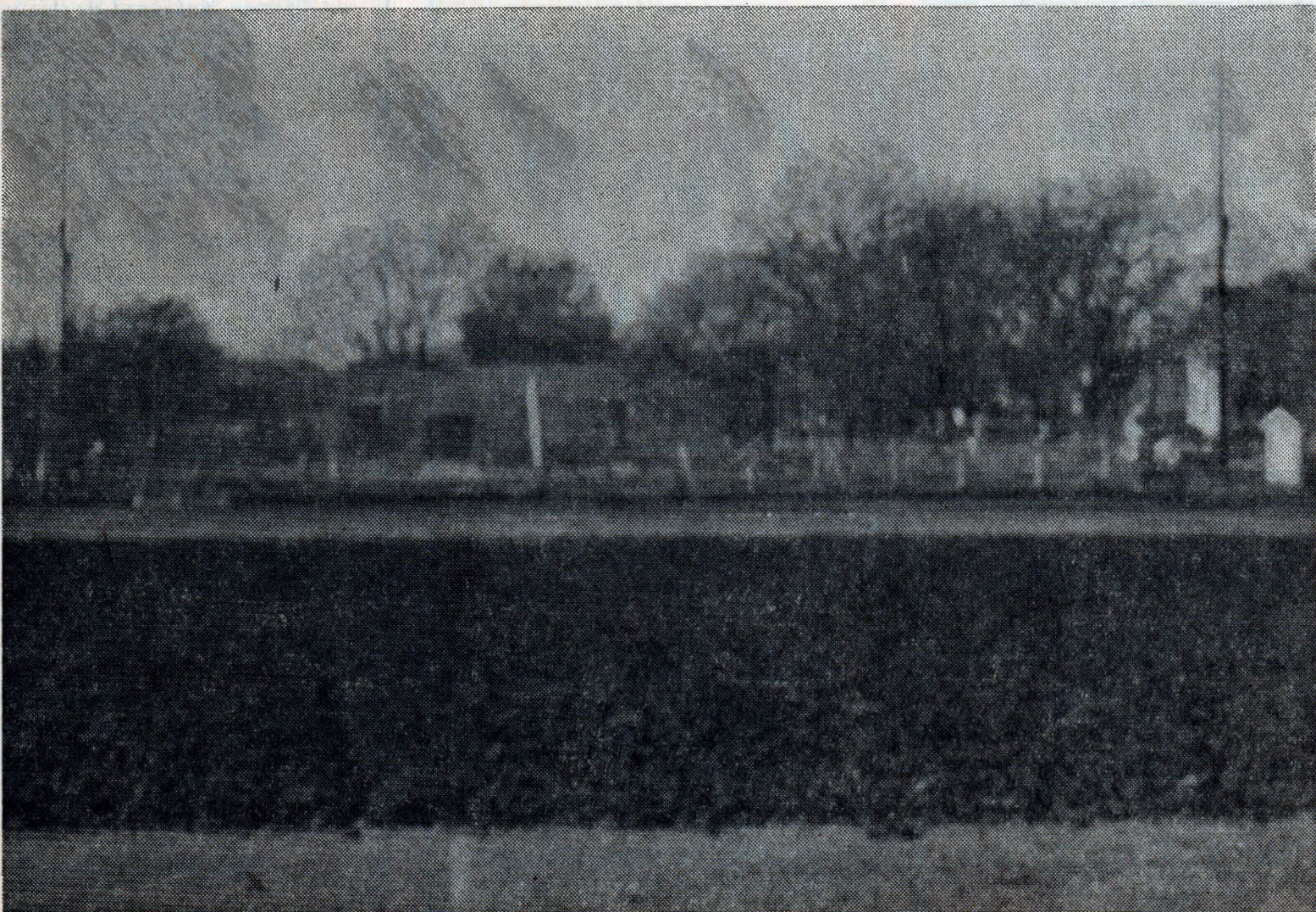

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Ames Hands Boone Low Blow; 63-12

Once again the Boone Toreadors met the Little Cyclones of Ames. This year it was Friday, October 31. Although Boone lost, it was the first time that the Toreadors have crossed the Ames goal line since 1953.

Ames extended the school's consecutive string to 25 over Boone. Only two ties block an otherwise perfect Ames record against the Toreadors since 1933.

The Little Cyclones scored two touchdowns in each of the first three periods; and in the final quarter they scored three touchdowns. Boone made six points in each of the first and fourth periods.

The Little Cyclones, splitting their ends wide and flanking one or two backs, got tremendous effectiveness from wide pitches around the ends.

Boone had 11 first downs to Ames' 23.

Ames outgained Boone on the ground, 391 yards to 128. In rushing the margin was 381-79 net.

The final score was Ames 63, Boone 12.
