Glenda McCambridge Is
Named Local Winner in
National Home Ec. Exam

On December 2, 1958, nearly 350,000 senior girls in 12,000 high schools across the nation took an examination of 'Homemaking Knowledge and Attitudes.'

Glenda McCambridge won the local contest over the 15 other participants from Boone High.

Her test will now be graded with other Iowa entries, and the state winner will advance to all-American competition.

The state winner will be awarded a \$1,500 college scholarship and an expense-paid educational tour of Washington, D. C.; Mount Vernon; Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia; and New York City; and her school will receive a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

In each state, there will also be a \$500 scholarship awarded to the girl who has the second highest rating.

The national winner will be announced on April 10 at a banquet in Minneapolis for the state winners. To her will go a \$5,000 college scholarship; and the second, third, and fourth ranking State Homemakers in the nation will be awarded \$4,000, \$3,000, and \$2,000 scholarships respectively.

This test, sponsored by General Mills, was part of the Betty Crocker 'Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow.'

New Program for Next Year

Six from Boone Attend 'Old Gold Days'

The annual event, 'Old Gold Days', sponsored by the State University of Iowa, was held last weekend on the college campus at Iowa City. The purpose of the activity is to show pre-college high school students what university life is like, and what it offers.

In these sessions the speaker told of job opportunities, salaries, and working conditions connected with his particular field.

Immediately following the careers conferences, administration interviews were held. This question and answer session was conducted by members of the administration offices who were prepared to answer questions concerning student loans, dormitory housing, sorority and fraternity housing, and other academic affairs of interest to future students.

Sports editor Bob Dahlgren is planning to move to Oklahoma very soon, and Dave Tucker will take his place.

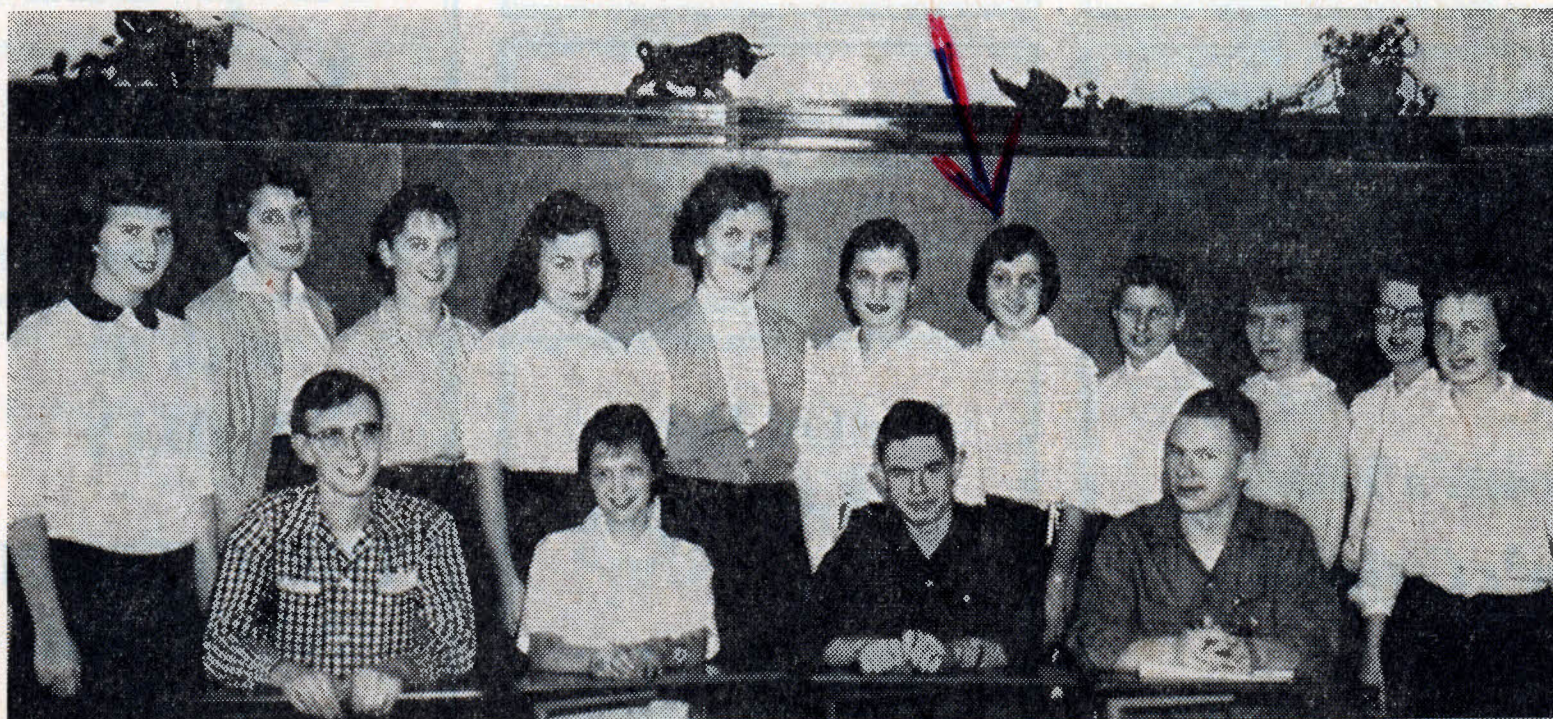

Boone High students registering for their next year's courses will face a revised curriculum. Approved in a recent Board of Education meeting are several additions to courses of study offered. New are:

1. A split level English program for juniors and seniors, with one set of courses for college preparatory students, one for those who do not figure college in their plans.

2. A series of French courses beginning in ninth grade, now aimed at expansion into a three or four-year series.

3. A required world civilization course for ninth graders, replacing the civics course which was formerly mandatory. A follow-up to this will be offered on an elective basis for sophomores, and at an advanced level.

4. An accelerated physics section open to those who hold a B average or above in the math-science group.

5. A second year of art.

Changed are:

1. The requirements for the senior social studies course, Problems of Democracy. In its place will be a required semester of American government, followed by an economics course required only for commercial students.

2. The name and general emphasis of the radio course offered now. It will be called 'electronics' in future years, and will have more attention on principles of general electronics, less on actual radio building and servicing.

In a time of growing criticism of education, these courses are directed toward providing more challenging curriculum for the top student, giving the entire student body an opportunity for better preparation for increasingly difficult college and occupational requirements.

Summer School

The summer school program gets its share of revision, according to plans adopted by the Board. In general the purpose of the summer session has switched from an easy source of credit for students deficient in credits to an opportunity for students to broaden and enrich their course of study.

For students going into their senior year, the American government and economics sections will be available as separate three-and-a-half week units, or together.

American history will be offered to juniors, and taken at seven-week doses only. Biology is open to freshmen; world civilization to eighth graders and freshmen holding a minimum average of B.

Typing and driver education will be open to all students in grades eight to 11. It will be possible to take driver education afternoons in addition to a full morning schedule.

Summer school tuition for all students in the Boone Community School District is \$5.00, and for any from outside, \$50.

Credit Requirements

Of the 24 credits necessary for graduation, four must be gained from sophomore and junior English, two from American history, one from American government, two from science, and one from mathematics, unless the student passes a math course his freshman year. This standard is set by the Iowa legislature. All students are also required to take two years of physical education in their senior high years, unless certified by a physician to be unfit to do so.

Course Requirements

The course requirements also have come in for some revision. In the general course of study, one social studies credit requirement is being removed, replaced by a credit in any field which the student selects, boosting the total of elective credits to 15.

In the college preparatory section one credit requirement has been added to the English total at the expense of one taken from the elective credits. In the vocational program, the credit requirements in social studies have been reduced to three, the elective total boosted to nine. Students in the clerical and selling division must now take three instead of the previous two semesters of typing.

In the department of total elective credits, the stenographic ranks lowest. In this field only two semesters of work can be chosen from any field the student desires. An added requirement of one semester each of typing, office practice, and general business are responsible for cutting the total electives from its previous total of five.

The elective total in the co-operative training branch has also gone down three credit units, which are added in the area of business courses.

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SEARCHLIGHT ON SPORTS

After two early losses to Perry and Webster City, it looked as though the Toreadors and Coach Clifton were in for a dismal season, but just when things seemed on the downward side, Coach Clifton's charges came through with three conference victories in succession, one over Grinnell, another over an Osky outfit, which, even though it was outplayed in every department, definitely showed that they came to play basketball, win or lose.

The big win was the one over the Newton Cardinals in the double overtime sudden death affair, which saw the Boonemen come from behind by as much as seven points late in the fourth act to tie up the contest at 58-58.

At that point Boone took possession of the ball and held onto it for the entire overtime, Jon Gustafson finally taking a shot in the final second and missing.

Once again the Toreadors took possession on the jump, and with less than 25 seconds gone pumped in a beautiful shot from about 12 feet out to give the Cliftonmen a 60-58 decision and enabled them to remain on top of the C.I.C. with a 3-0 record.

In the win over Newton, Walker pumped in 28 markers, his high for the season, and if my memory serves me right, the high for his career.

One of the Toreadors' biggest non-conference tilts was against Al Comito's Roosevelt Rough Riders on our home floor. For the height the Riders had, the Toreadors played a tremendous game the first three quarters, but inability to hit the mesh in the fourth quarter led to a disappointing loss for the Toreadors.

In that fourth quarter, the Boonemen were able to connect on only one of 17 attempts, that one by Allen Walker, who dropped in 23 points for the evening. Boone then proceeded to lose two conference tilts in succession, one against Wally Linn's Ames crew, 52-32, and the other to Ev Cochrane's outfit from Marshalltown, undoubtedly the best squad the Toreadors have come up against this season, 59-44.

Already, the Toreadors have started out the second round of conference action on a sweet note, handing the Grinnell Tigers a 68-48 defeat down at Grinnell last Friday night, the second Tiger loss to Boone this season.

Tomorrow night the Toreadors travel to Oskaloosa to face the Indians for the second time, and this should prove to be an interesting affair, figuring the Indians will fight even harder on their home stamping grounds than they did here in Boone earlier in the year.

Coach Clifton has been shuffling his lineup the last few games to try to get some more outside scoring in Bill Monen. To do this, he has moved Bud Munson to a starting forward position along with Don Dutton, has left Walker at the center spot, and has moved Monen in to share the guard post with Malcom. Still the load seems to ride on Walker's shoulders, but whether it continues to do so, is up to the boys themselves.

Walker, in conference play the first round, has meshed 73 points in five contests for a 14.6 average to lead the team. Munson is second in scoring in conference action with 39 markers in four games for a 9.75 average. Jon Gustafson sports a 5.4 average with 27 points in five games; Phil Sherbon carries a 7.0 average into second round action.

John Malcom has a total of 17 conference points in five contests for a 3.4 game average, Carroll Clabaugh has tossed in 11 markers so far for a 2.2 average; Don Dutton, who has come along very well this year, has a 4.2 average for five contests and 21 points for the first round.

If the Grinnell contest is any indication of things to come in the second round, things could be looking uphill as far as the Toreadors are concerned for the rest of the 1958-59 campaign.

Toreadors Fall to Ames

The Toreadors lost their first game in Central Iowa Conference play to the Ames Little Cyclones at Ames, Friday, January 2. The final score was 52-32.

The loss dropped the Toreadors from a first place tie with Marshalltown to a tie for second with the Little Cyclones.

John Malcom led the Toreador scoring with seven markers. Ames was paced by Jim Stuart with 17.

Preceding the varsity tilt, the Boone sophs dropped a 51-34 decision to the Ames crew. Their record for the season now stands at two wins and six defeats.

Toreadorettes Lose to Story City; Overtime

The Boone Toreadorettes dropped a 59-52 decision to Story City on January 9, at Story City, despite the 23-point assault of Joyce Alsin, and Sharon Jones' 21 markers. Marilyn Smith was the only other Boone player to score, adding 10 points.

Leona Johnson, the big gun in Story City's attack, sacked up 47 points, including 17 of 19 from the free throw line for 89.4%. The score at the end of regulation play was 52-52.

Toreadors Hit Season High Against Nevada

The Boone Toreadors defeated the Nevada Cubs 85-53 here last Saturday night.

Boone took advantage of fast breaks for good lay-up shots and repeatedly stole the ball from Nevada. The Toreadors hit 35 of 78 floor shots and out-rebounded the Cubs 41-19.

Boone Falls to Bobcats

The Marshalltown Bobcats handed the Toreadors their fourth loss of the season with a 59-44 win here Friday, January 9.

Boone's main drawbacks were inability to capture rebounds and poor shooting.

Al Walker led the Toreadors with 16 points, while Bud Munson dropped in 10, and Phil Sherbon eight.

The Toreadors trailed from the beginning. They sank only 16 of

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60 floor shots, which is their poorest shooting of the year. The Bobcats dropped in 24 out of 63.

Marshalltown is probably the best team the Toreadors have faced all year, and if the Bobcats play as well the remainder of the season as they did against the Toreadors, they have the C.I.C. championship in the bag.

Toreadorettes Stop Lohrville, 58-54

The Toreadorettes stopped Lohrville 58-54 at Lohrville on January 16.

Sharon Jones led Boone with 29 points, and Joyce Alsin dropped in 21, 19 of them on free throws. Barbara Wilhelm added eight.

Lohrville was led by Kinnick with 32 and Burke with 21.

Polar Bears Ice Toreador Tankers

On January 13 the Des Moines North High Polar Bears subdued the Boone swimmers, 57-29. In four of the events Boone took first place.

Mike Herman swam the 200-yard freestyle in 2:16.2 and the 150-yard individual medley in 1:50 to take two of Boone's firsts.

In the 50-yard freestyle Jim Cross came in first for the Boone tankmen. Another first was taken in the 200-yard freestyle relay. Swimming in this relay were Ed Lynn, Basil Hicks, Max Highland, and Ken Carlson.

Tankers Lose Opener to Des Moines, East

In their first meet of the new year the Boone tankmen fell to East High of Des Moines, 47-39. Mike Herman grabbed two firsts for Boone, one in the 200-yard freestyle and the other in the 120-yard individual medley.

Other firsts were taken by Jim Cross in the 40- and 100-yard freestyle race.

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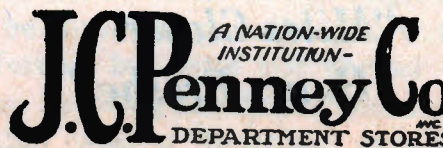
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Tankers Lose Sixth of Season

Despite an :18.7 clocking by senior Jim Cross in the 40-yard freestyle, breaking the old meet record set by Nelson of Fort Dodge with :19.5, the Toreadors lost a dual swimming meet with the Dodger tankers here on Thursday, January 15. The final score was 57-29.

Mike Herman also turned in a fine showing in the 200-yard freestyle with a 2:11.3 clocking for the Toreadors.

In the 100-yard backstroke, Stan Siefer of Fort Dodge not only broke the meet record set by Jim Cross last year, but also tied the pool record with a 1:04 clocking.

In the 100-yard freestyle, a hair-raising event from start to finish, Nelson of Fort Dodge and Boone's Jim Cross both broke the old meet record, with Nelson cutting through the water at a 55.3 clocking. Cross was right behind him, half a foot short, or even less.

A Fort Dodge junior, Bud Beam-er, took first in diving, once scoring a 6 rating on a dive with a 2.1 degree of difficulty for 12.6 points, and another time rated a 5 on a 2.1 for 11 points.

Carl Saubert of Boone took second place in the same event. Bruce Ackerman captured third.

A new meet record of 1:19.5 was set in the 120-yard individual medley by La Calle of the Dodgers. Mike Herman came in third.

Boone's team of Piper, Reid, Hicks, and Ken Carlson turned a 1:40.4 clocking in the 160 medley relay. However, things were different in the final event of the meet, Fort Dodge winning the 160 freestyle in 1:41.9.
