There will be 28 contestants participating in oratorical declamation, 37 in dramatic declamation, 40 in humorous declamation, eight in original oratory, 13 each in extemporaneous reading and radio reading, and five contestants in the one-act plays.

Pep Club Point **System Outlined**

Plans for a point system for the Pep Club have been completed.

A Pep Club girl can get one point for an excused absence from a game by wearing complete outfit the day of the game and at the game; and for doing odd jobs, such as selling season tickets, handing out programs, and ushering; and one per meeting for being an officer or for attending a meeting.

She can get two points for attending each required game, wearing complete outfit to out-of-town game, attending a swimming meet, working in a stand, being a checker at a game, and for being on the Executive Board at a meeting.

A girl can obtain five points by attending out-of-town games and for being in the Pep Club Drill Team each month the drill team is in operation.

Members get no points for an excused meeting or game. They lose one point for unexcused games or meetings and one for each required article not worn. The largest penalty is the loss of five points, for not coming to the aid of an officer.

At the end of the month Pep Club member may have five points under the highest possible required total. She must make up the required number of points during the past month, or be dropped from Pep Club.

In addition to this point system, a Pep Club member, in order to be excused from a required event, must present a written excuse and date of day which she is to be absent. She must deliver it to Mr. Riemenschneider's office by 2:15 p.m. of that day.



Kenny is generous and shares the car with his sister, Karen. They have solved the problem of lost car keys-each has two sets!

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

Mike Herman turned in Boone's best performance in the 200-yard freestyle, with a clocking of a 2:08.5, and placed second in the event. This was Boone's best performance in the last ten years.

Jim Cross had his best 100-yard freestyle clocking, :54.4, yet did not place.

Jay Pieper, Tom Riker, Bill Cramer, and Kenny Carlson did their best of the season with a 1:40.5 timing in the 160-yard medley relay.

Ken Carlson, Basil Hicks, Tom Grasso, and Mike Herman did their best time of 1:27.4, but did not place in the 160-yard freestyle re-

Max Highland did his best in both the 40- and 100-yard freestyle races with timings of :22.7 and 1:04.8.

Bill Cramer tied his best time in the 100-yard butterfly with the time of 1:15.7, and placed second.

Jay Pieper had his best time in the backstroke event with a 1:16.9, placing third.

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


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Boone Host to Speech Contest


