The Education Division will offer two major sections: one for students interested in teaching kindergarten, elementary, and junior high school; and a second for those considering teaching in a secondary school.

The two groups will participate in many activities together, but each will examine subjects, methods, and materials as related to each area of interest.

Students will take part in working in the recreation program on the Evanston community playgrounds.

Three Activity Groups

In addition to its academic program, the Division's activities will be divided into three groups: (1) Those of a professional nature, such as observations of school systems and trips to libraries, museums, and other places of educational interest; (2) Those related to the social and cultural advantages of the Chicago area, and (3) Those associated with the experience of living wit hstudents on a university campus.

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


