At 8:00 o'clock the parents, following Tuesday's schedule, went through a typical school day. Here they met the teachers of their children. From 9:30 to 9:45 the teachers remained in their classrooms so the parents could talk further with them.

## Enrollment Grows by 100 Pupils

At the beginning of the 1959-60 school year, Boone Senior High had an enrollment of 535, with 187 in the 10th grade, 169 in the 11th grade, and 179 in the 12th grade. The junior high enrollment is 645, making a grand total of 1,180 students in the Boone Junior-Senior High School.

The seventh grade this fall contains 263 students. This means that there will be 100 more students in the building this year than there were last year. There are 60 teachers on the staff, eight of them having been added this year.

In the last four years at Boone High School many changes have taken place. Three advisors have been added, a director of testing, two math teachers, an assistant principal, a homemaking teacher, an extra art instructor, and an additional vocal music instructor. Boone High has an inter-com system, a modern cafeteria, a new chemistry room, new Scroll quarters, a brand new music department, and an enlarged art department.

The school day has been lengthened in order to permit a tenminute homeroom before the school day actually begins.

Extra-curricular activities include speech, dramatics, band, orchestra, chorus, Bumble 'B,' Scroll, Quill and Scroll, Pep Club, Student Council, Future Nurses' Club, girls' basketball, Dolphin, football, basketball, baseball, track, golf, tennis, and swimming.

One of the most useful things Boone High has added in the last few years is the Code of Conduct. Through the help of the Student Council and the Family, it has been well enforced.

In order to graduate from Boone High School, 25 credits are required, all based on academic courses, not extra activities.

At Boone High a student may quit school if he has completed the eighth grade or is 16 years old. A few years ago the P.-T. A. wanted the faculty to change this age limit to 18 years. However, school authorities and faculty felt that it would be detrimental to the other students in school if they were held back by students who simply could not learn. However, a student may be suspended if he fails two of four subjects in a semester.

Ten years ago, in grades from seventh through 12th there was a 7% dropout. Last year a study was made of the graduating class and there was less than a 4% dropout. This proves that by raising the standards there are fewer dropouts.

George Hannum captured a Perry fumble on the Blue Jay 16-yard line only two plays after Boone gave up the ball. The Blue Jays were penalized half the distance to the goal to the nine-yard line. Terry Ferry dug a hole in Perry's defense to go the nine-yard distance for the touchdown. Dave Adams' kick was headed through the goal posts but Perry's Ludwig blocked the ball.

Neither team was able to break the heart-breaking tie in the few remaining minutes of the game.

The tie ended a string of eight straight Boone wins over Perry. Perry won in 1938 by a score of 12-6.

Boone can now hope for a 5-2-1 record for the season with two games remaining.

## Next Grid Foe, Newton

Boone High Toreadors play the Newton Cardinals October 23 at Newton, with game time at 7:30.

Newton was seriously hurt by graduations last spring as it lost 18 of 27 lettermen. Of those remaining, only seven reported for football practice. Newton's senior guard, Ken Johnson, has not been able to pass a physical. The other, letterman has moved.

Thirty-four boys reported for varsity football practice and 27 reported for sophomore practice at Newton.

The Boone High Toreadors had 29 boys report for varsity football practice. Five lettermen were lost by graduation last spring. Nine lettermen returned.
