A.I.B. Offers Business, Secretarial Training

This week's featured college is the American Institute of Business in Des Moines. A.I.B. is a non-profit co-educational school accredited by the Accrediting Company of Business Schools, Washington, D.C., as a two-year business school. The National Association and Council of Business Schools also holds A.I.B. as a member.

The purpose of A.I.B. is to provide high school and college graduates with specialized training in business and to assist them in securing a position with a future.

School Provides Activities

Students enjoy a varied school activity program. The American Room in the A.I.B. building is the center for parties throughout the year. Students also participate in many different activities such as bowling, golf, softball, dancing, and other kinds of recreation. Alpha Iota, International Honorary Sorority, founded in 1925, and Phi Theta Pi, International Honorary Fraternity, both had their origin at A.I.B. and now include about 250 chapters in leading business schools throughout the United States, Canada, and Hawaii.

A.I.B. aids out-of-town students to secure comfortable living accommodations. There are four girls' dormitories within walking distance of the school—Esther Hall, Young Business Women's Home, St. Catherine's Hall, and the Y.W.C.A. The school also maintains a list of approved private homes for women and men.

Various Courses Offered

The curricula of A.I.B. is composed of 13 courses. They are: advanced junior secretarial, automation accounting, court reporting, executive secretarial, junior accounting, junior secretarial, office machines, clerk typist, salesmanship, accounting, business management, and stenographic.

Marlene Bancroft Wins Homemaker Test

Marlene Bancroft was named Betty Crocker's Future Homemaker in Boone High School. She achieved this honor by receiving the highest score in the test taken on December 2. She will receive a medal for her accomplishment and it will be presented at an assembly.

Her test score will be sent to compete in the state contest with other scores. The winner in Iowa will receive a \$1,500 scholarship to the college of her choice. She will go to Washington, D.C.

Here, she will try for the national award which will consist of a \$5,000 scholarship to a college of her choice.

B.H.S. Offers Journalistic Opportunities

Boone Junior-Senior High School offers opportunities in newspaper journalism to all students from grades seven through twelve.

Junior high students are accepted with their counselor's recommendation on news staff when they enter the ninth grade. Candidates should carry a 'B' average English grade since they write most of the copy for the fourth page of the Bumble 'B' under the supervision of high school page editors. The page is called Junior Hive. On the Thursdays of publication this staff sells the paper in classrooms during the sixth period. The class meets regularly sixth period every Monday. Volunteer stories, poems, and pictures from seventh and eighth graders are frequently accepted for publication.

Merit Determines Membership

Those who consistently submit material that reaches print are sought out for future staff membership. Such items are submitted on one side of a sheet of paper, double spaced, to Mr. Stock, Room

308, or to one of the junior high page editors, Diane Ball and Karen Anderson.

Tenth graders register for fifth period journalism. This extra-curricular activity introduces prospective journalists to the high school staff, the workroom, and procedures used in producing the Bumble 'B.' They act as 'legmen' for staff reporters, running down leads and doing odd jobs. These cub reporters may submit stories to the editors, and assist in photography. They sell advertising space, fold and address mailers.

Cub Reporters Investigate

Cub reporters spend their first year investigating journalism as a prospective high school extra-curricular activity. Their merit and value to the staff is also being measured by the sponsor and editors.

Juniors register for first semester journalism class for credit toward graduation. Their class, also open to seniors, teaches the fundamentals of news writing and copy

producing. Members of this class become editors and staff members upon completion of the course.

Seniors Publish Paper

As seniors, staff members publish the Bumble 'B' bi-weekly. Editors assign, edit, and produce copy and pictures. They copyread, proofread, plan page make-up, and do the final paste-ups. They train in every phase of newspaper journalism with the exception of the mechanical aspects of newspapering. Normally two or three staffers are employed by the local Boone News-Republican as staff writers. Each summer two journalists attend a special one-week course at Iowa City as guests of local newspaper.

Outstanding events of the year for Bumble 'B' staffers are the Iowa High School Press Association convention and the Quill and Scroll banquet. Editors receive 30 extra-curricular credits; co-editors or page editors receive 20; staff members get eight points toward a school letter award.

The ninth grade homemakers have also finished their food unit and have prepared breakfast and two luncheons. Mrs. Brunner states that the food unit has been revised this year with the addition of a freezer.

The classes make refreshments and take turns serving at the monthly faculty teas.

These two classes have now started the home furnishing unit in which the girls will plan a kitchen, dining room, and their own bedroom.

The second year girls have also started home furnishing and are studying color and designs.

Homemaking students in their third year started the clothing unit where they may make anything they wish according to their ability. Their garments will range from formals to coats to sports outfits.

Equal Credit for Equal Work

"I didn't receive an activity letter," exclaimed Jane, a member of Dolphin Club, a librarian, an office helper, and a participant in a class play and extemporaneous speaking.

"Oh, I did," replied Jim, a member of Student Council.

Is this fair? No, the point system needs revision!

Some activities, such as class plays, Dolphin Club, and speech work, involve much proficiency. Students must try out and are chosen from a number of hopeful pupils. However, they receive only a minimum number of points. If a student has a particular talent and is qualified to participate in a certain activity because of his ability, he warrants more points than one who is chosen by reason of circumstance.

Although Student Council is very important and has much prestige, its members are not always chosen because of competence but often because of popularity. Fifty points are not in proportion with other areas.

Announcement readers should be chosen from students who try out, and selected because of skill. Perhaps many students are interested in radio and television work; reading announcements would give them experience. Because little preparation or practice is needed for this position the number of points should be lowered.

Several actions must be taken to insure a fair point system:

1. Sponsors of each activity listed below should meet together and prepare a revised system.
2. If a student is participating in an activity because of his talent, he warrants more points.
3. The amount of time and practice necessary for a successful activity should be considered.

Perhaps a revised schedule of points would result in a renewed interest in such areas as class plays and speech work. Students are proud to receive an activity letter but would be much prouder to feel that they had really earned it.

We hope to be able to print the revised system soon.

Hi gang,

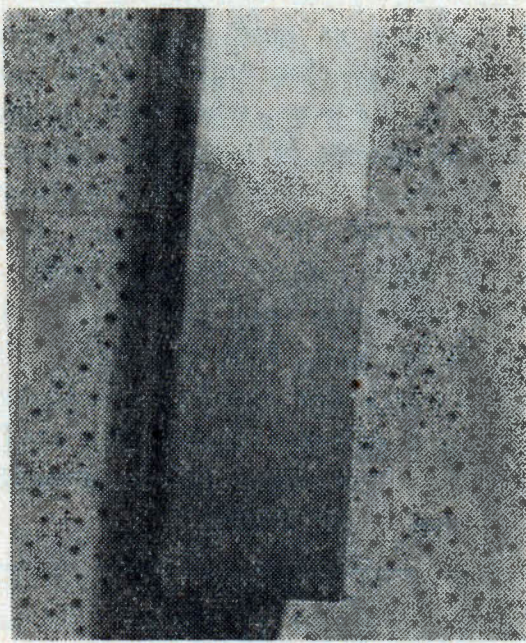

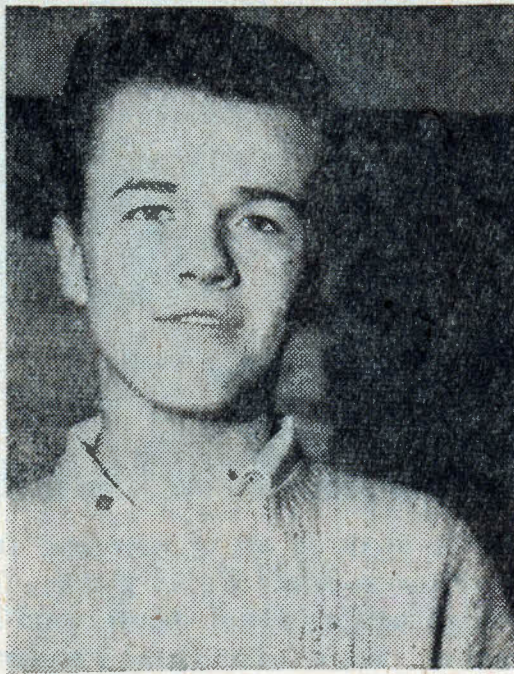

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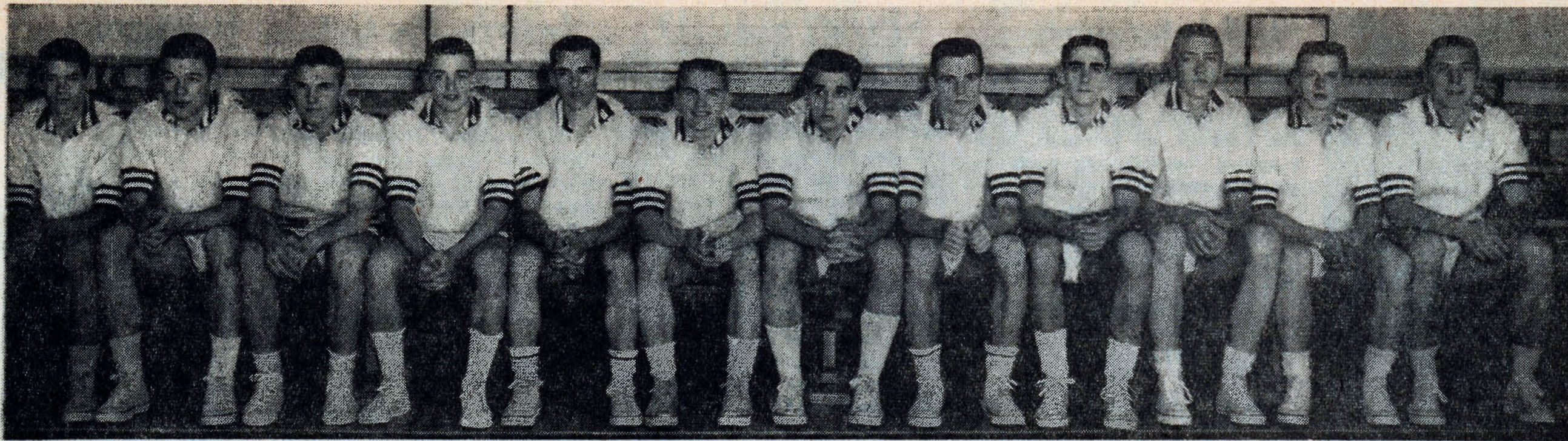

OSKALOOSA, January 8.—The Boone sophs ripped the Oskaloosa yearlings, 58-31, here Friday night.

Joe Reedholm hit the points register for 12 markers and Steve Hilts had 11 for Boone.

Claude Shurts and Jerry Sparks each had six for the losers.

The Tiny Toreadors led at the quarters with margins of 8-6, 23-19, and 37-26.

AMES, January 15.—Coach Larry Parr's sophomores breezed past the Ames yearlings here Friday night, 50-36.

Steve Trulin pumped in 17 points while Joe Reedholm added 13 for Boone. Jim Klingseis had 20 for Ames.

The Tiny Toreadors held only a 23-22 half time edge, but came back for a 35-29 third quarter cushion.

NEVADA, January 16.—The Boone sophomores dropped a 49-45 decision to Nevada here Saturday night.

Steve Trulin led the Boone attack with 16 digits and Joe Reedholm flicked in 14 markers. Mike Valline bagged 20 for the Nevada sophomores.

Nevada held quarter margins of 8-4 and 24-15, while Boone bounced back for a 31-all third period score.

The Boone High Tiny Toreadors romped to a 63-49 victory over the Newton sophomores here Friday night. Boone now has a 7-5 win-loss record for the season.

Jerry Thompson popped in 16 points while Joe Reedholm had 12 for Boone. Newton's Fred Dimon had 15 markers for the losers.

Boone held a 52-16 half time cushion with a 57-29 third cantor margin.

Swimming Results

Marshalltown

On January 19, the Toreador tankmen were downed 46-40, even though they set three of the four meet records broken.

Those who set the records for Boone were: 100-yard backstroke by Jay Pieper in 1:10.6; 100-yard breaststroke by Tony Riker in 1:20.1; and the 160-yard freestyle in 1:26.5 by Carl Saubert, Max Highland, Robert Carlson, and Basil Hicks.

Others who placed first but did not set records were 40-yard freestyle in 0:20.4 and 100-yard freestyle in 0:59.9, both by Ken Carlson. The tankmen also captured two seconds and four thirds.

North Des Moines

North Des Moines beat Boone 57-29. Boone had seven seconds and two thirds.

First for the Toreadors was captured in diving by Carl Saubert with 40.6 points, and the 100-yard freestyle relay team in 1:27.1 by Ed Lynn, Max Highland, Basil Hicks, and Jim Lynn.

On Tuesday, January 12, Boone competed against North High of Des Moines. North High has a record of seven wins and two losses. The final score was 57-54 in favor of North.

Fort Dodge

Boone was beaten by Fort Dodge on January 21, by 65-21. Jay Pieper captured Boone's only first in 1:09.4 in the 100-yard backstroke. Boone had six seconds and four thirds in this meet.

Gordon Brookhart's Toreador tankmen have lost to Fort Dodge, 65-21; Marshalltown, 46-40; and Des Moines, North, 57-29.

Toreadorettes Post 11-1 Record

Toreadorettes Beat Eldora

Revening their only loss of the season, the Toreadorettes blasted Eldora, 55-42, here Friday night, January 15. Earlier this year Eldora handed the Boone girls a 48-45 defeat.

The visitors held the edge only briefly in the first quarter. The score at the end of the opening session was tied 13 all. Boone was ahead 26-33 at the half, and moved into the final session with a 43-31 lead.

Shooting 23.1% in the first half and making 50% of their shots in the second half, the Toreadorettes shot 37% for the game.

Sharon Jones registered 25 points, Marilyn Smith marked up 20, and Barb Wilhelm added 10.

Jackie Parrish, Ginger Roby, Mary Walker, Myra Aspengren, and Barb Fetzer put in good performances in the defensive court.

Ruth Steinfeldt finished with 19 points for the losers.

Cyclones Rally, Beat Toreadors

Once holding a 13-point lead over Ames in the second quarter, the Toreadors were finally brought down in the third by some fancy Cyclone shooting. For the over-all game the boys from Ames shot a 41% accuracy, with a final score of 71-66.

Boone, though losing its lead in the third, held a 15-11 first and 33-20 second quarter lead. Dave Childs yanked the game out of the fire for Ames by cutting the Toreadors' 13-point lead to a 5-point lead after dropping five straight jump shots.

Don Dutton rallied for Boone with 25 points and Darrell Richards collected 17. Childs was high scorer for Ames with 18 points.

Boone's well co-ordinated floor play could not quite match the sharp shooting of Ames. Though Boone had failed to topple the Cyclones on their first and second tries the Toreadors will have a final chance at the district meet coming up at Des Moines.

Boys to Play Tough Marshalltown Team

Friday night Boone will be on the scene here with the second rated team in the Central Iowa Conference (C.I.C.), Marshalltown. The Toreadors themselves are rated third in C.I.C.

Marshalltown's leading scorer, Lowe, who is fourth in C.I.C. scoring, will match shots with Don Dutton, first in C.I.C. with 101 total points so far this season.

The Toreadors' probable line-up will be Dutton, John Malcom, Phil Sherbon, Darrell Richards, and Jon Gustafson.

Boone, with four wins and three losses in conference play, will be a hardened foe for the Marshalltown boys who have lost to Ames twice by a good margin. The Toreadors have lost twice to the top C.I.C. Ames team by scant margins of seven and five points.

Boone Girls to Meet Lohrville

Boone High's Toreadorettes' next opponent is Lohrville, January 29, at Lohrville. Lohrville has an 8-4 win-loss record. In the Calhoun County tournament they were knocked out in the first round by a strong Cedar Valley team, 65-61. Last year the Toreadorettes beat them twice, once at home by 54-41, and there by 58-51. They lost to Grand Community by 56-52. Susan Seek is their outstanding forward. They feature a very unusual zone defense.

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Coach Ralph Carroll's Boone Toreadorettes walloped Winterset, 77-57, there last Friday night for the 11th win of the season in their 12th game.

This was the first time since last season's 77-40 win over Winterset that the Boone girls have scored that many in a single try.

The Toreadorettes hit 50% of their shots from the floor. During the second half they shot 43.8%, but were shooting 57.1% in the first half.

Marilyn Smith, hitting 62.5%, took scoring honors for the game with a total of 31 points. Sharon Jones shot 57.9% from the floor and contributed 26 points for the offense. Barb Wilhelm marked up 18 points.

Boone led 27-17 at the quarter, ended the half with 44-26, and entered the closing session with a 66-39 lead.

Shirley Griffith scored 29 points for the losers and Barbara Bennett assisted with 21.

Boys Wallop Newton

With even scoring and a second half shooting splurge the Toreadors walloped Newton, 61-48. Boone now owns a 4-3 record in the Central Iowa Conference and is in the third place.

Don Dutton again held the scoring lead with 16 points. Darrell Richards flicked in 13 markers while Jon Gustafson and Phil Sherbon added 11 each.

The Toreadors held quarter margins of 14-10, 28-27, and 43-36.
