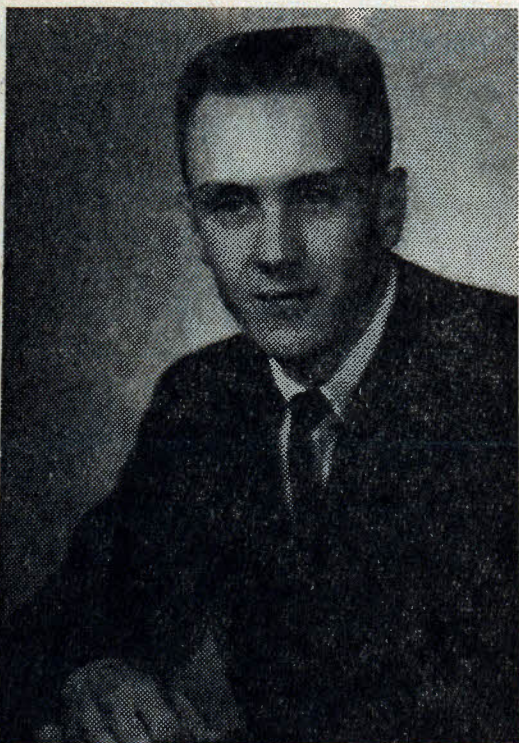
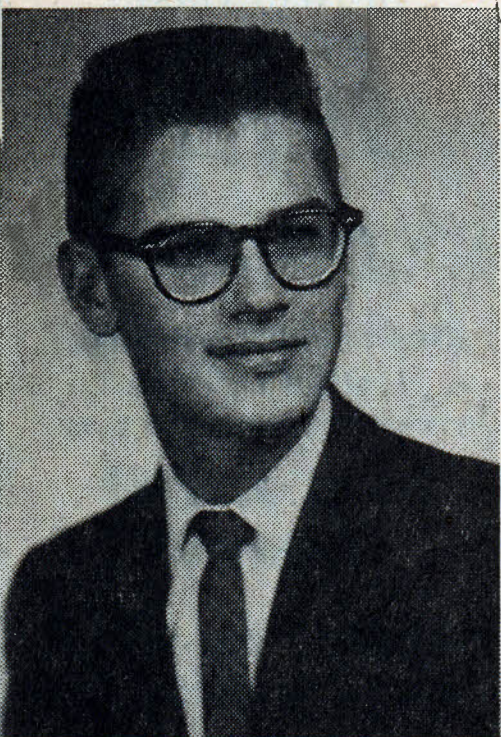

Poll Shows Students Less Prejudiced

American teen-agers are apparently less prejudiced than adults about the religious affiliations of possible presidential candidates. This is indicated by a comparison of results between a poll of students conducted by the Institute of Student Opinion last November and December, and a Gallup poll of adults conducted in the fall of 1958. The results of the Institute of Student Opinion survey of 10,763 secondary school students in 48 states were announced today by Scholastic Magazines, which sponsors I.S.O.

The wording of the questions differed somewhat between the student and the adult polls. I.S.O. put the question this way: "If your political party nominated a generally well-qualified person for President who was (a Catholic, a Protestant, a Jew, not a member of any established religious faith), what would be your reaction?"

Students had three choices:

- (a) "I would be favorably disposed to the candidate's election."
- (b) "The candidate's religious beliefs would make no difference, if he were qualified for the Presidency."
- (c) "I would be opposed to his election."

Among senior high school boys, for example, 1.3% opposed the election of a Protestant; 14.9% the election of a Catholic; 19.1% the election of a Jew; and 37.8% the election of a 'non-affiliated' candidate.

Teen-agers View the Politician

In another part of the Institute of Student Opinion poll, students were asked to express their attitudes toward men and women in politics. Results indicate that boys tend to be less favorably disposed toward politicians than girls. However, the general teen-age image of the politician is essentially a good one.

"Most men and women in politics put party loyalty ahead of human and social welfare, and they compromise with their convictions more often than men and women in other careers."

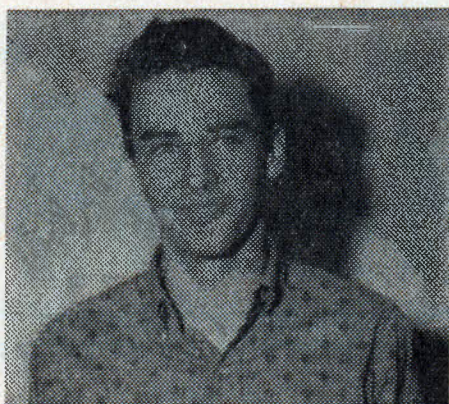

Business discussed at the meeting concerned a foreign exchange student program to be started in Boone. In this program, American students, in their junior year, can either go abroad for a summer program of three months or for one school semester. This program is under the direction of the American Field Service, started in 1942 with fewer than 100 students; now there are over 1,500 students from 47 countries. There are 51 foreign students in Iowa from 22 countries. Their goal is to get 5,000 foreign students in this country.

A chapter of the American Field Service recently organized in Boone by the Boone Rotary Club, will sponsor it for this first year.

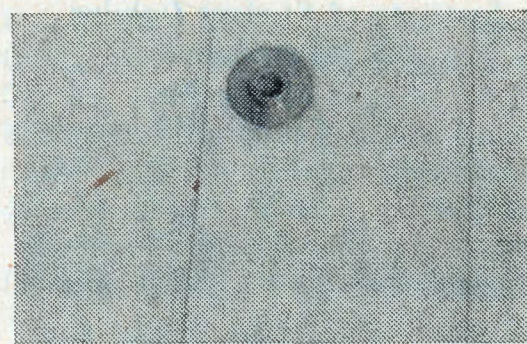
People who are continually using the word 'Fauuu-neee' are Janna's pet peeve.

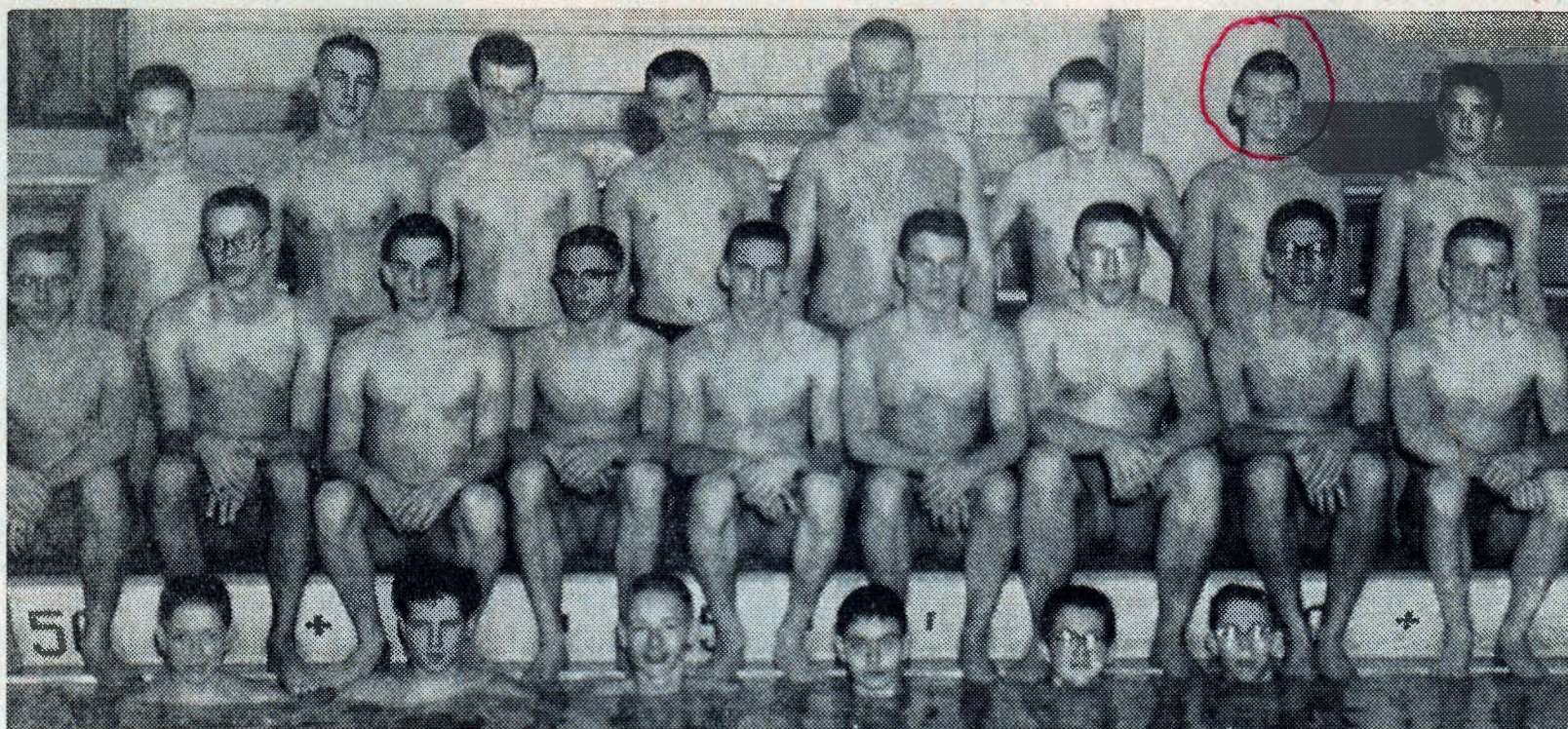
Sophs Edge Grinnell in Final Seconds

Boone Belles Defeat Lohrville Lassies

Firing at a scorching 55 per cent, the Boone belles trounced the Lohrville Hawkettes 79-65 in a basketball victory January 29.

Sharon Jones hit her career high by sending home 43 markers. She connected in 20 field goals, with a 69 per cent accuracy.

Marlyn Smith, shooting at a 43.8 per cent efficiency, finished with 19 counters for the winners.

Barb Wilhelm finished with 17 points.

Defensive honors went to Barb Fetzer, key defender; Myra Aspengren, outstanding post guard; and fast-moving Jackie Parrish.

Losing Lohrville bagged just 17 field goals, but missed only six of 37 attempts from the charity line.

Connie Burke was high scorer for the game with 44 points.

Boone Loses in Overtime

The Boone Toreadors exhibited a most outstanding game of basketball when they encountered the Bobcats of Marshalltown on January 29. Once behind by 13 points the Toreadors battered down this deficit and replaced it with a 13-point Boone lead.

With the Lambert men now in the lead, the Bobcats began the tedious job of trying to regain the lead. Showing good teamwork and ball handling Marshalltown was able to produce a tie game at the end of the fourth quarter 65-65.

As the three-minute overtime period went into effect Boone grabbed a two-point lead by Don Dutton, who fouled out in the next minute. Marshalltown connected on a free throw of Dutton's foul. John Malcom's two gift shots, with 1:20 left in the overtime, were the Toreadors' last tally. The Bobcats disrupted the Boone lead on a three-point play that ended the game with a score of 71-69.

Though Dutton lost out in the overtime he snagged 29 points and game high scoring honors. Malcom, playing a terrific ball-handling game, collected 15 points.

"It's been a long, dry spell," were the words of Coach Brookhart when the Toreador tankmen won over East of Des Moines by a narrow score of 43-42. Four meet records were broken, and two records were set by each team.

Boone broke the 160-yard medley relay in 1:36.4, which had previously been held by East in 1957. Bill Cramer established a record in the 160-yard individual medley with a clocking of 2:09.8. He also took a first in the 100-yard butterfly with a timing of 1:12.6.

Others who won first for Boone were Ken Carlson, in the 40-yard free style, with a clocking of 20.4, and Ed Lynn who took the honors in the 200-yard free style with a 2:21.8. Boone also took four seconds and five thirds in the meet.

Des Moines East set records in the 100-yard backstroke with Dave Van Sicle clocking a 1:09.1, which had previously been held by Jim Cross of Boone, and Russ Schoch won the 100-yard breaststroke in 1:15.8 to erase the old mark of 1:17 held by Denny Elliott of Boone.

Toreadors to Meet Indians

The Toreadors will meet Oskaloosa here Friday night in a Central Iowa Conference battle. Boone holds the third spot in the C.I.C. while Oskey is in last place.

Don Dutton, conference leading scoring ace, will pace the Toreadors. Dutton has totaled 283 points this season with a 17.6 average. Darrell Richards, Boone's second best, has 191 markers and a 11.9 average.

Leading scorer for Oskaloosa is Dan Sheesley with 137 tallies and a 9.7 average.

Offensively the Toreadors have tallied 57.1 points per game, while Oskey has an average of 42.2. Boone also leads in the defensive bracket with a 51.3 average and Oskaloosa is 58.3. The Toreadors' record is 10-6 while Oskey has won four and lost 11.

Probable line-up for Boone will be Richards, Dutton, John Malcom, Jon Gustafson, and Phil Sherbon.

Judy Stanislav, JoAnn Pestotnik, and Connie Mondt will play in a trumpet trio. One other special group will be a brass quartet. Its members are Keith Bloomquist and Charles Cross on cornet and Craig Lewison and Dennis Nelson on the trombone.

It was once the custom to draw lots to decide which young men and women should be each other's valentine for the coming year. Couples exchanged gifts and sometimes became engaged.

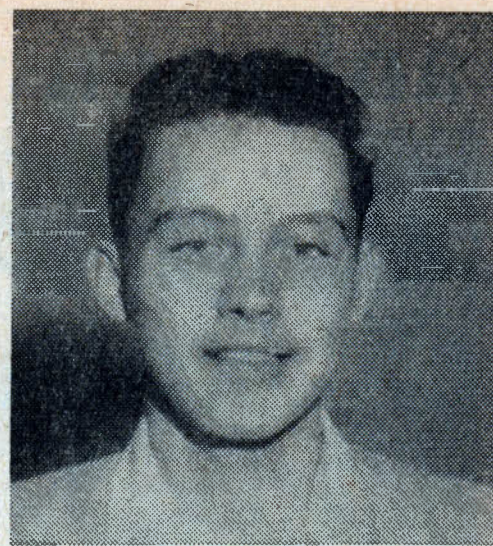
Sentimental valentines and gifts of flowers and candy are still commonly given by men and women in celebration of Saint Valentine's Day in the United States.

The assembly was closed by singing 'Loyalty.'

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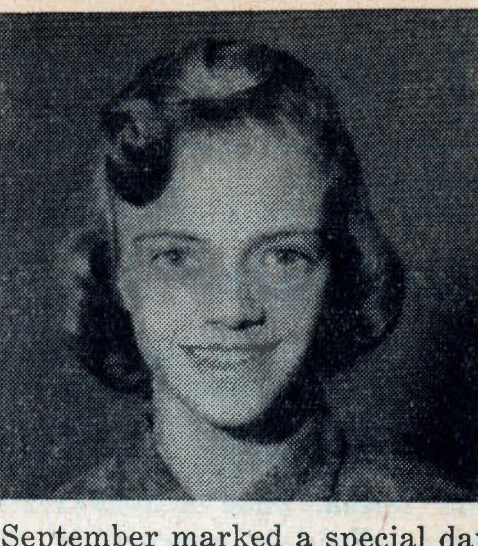
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September marked a special date in the life of this girl, Beth Emerson. Not only is it the month of her birthday, but also this September she started to junior high.
