

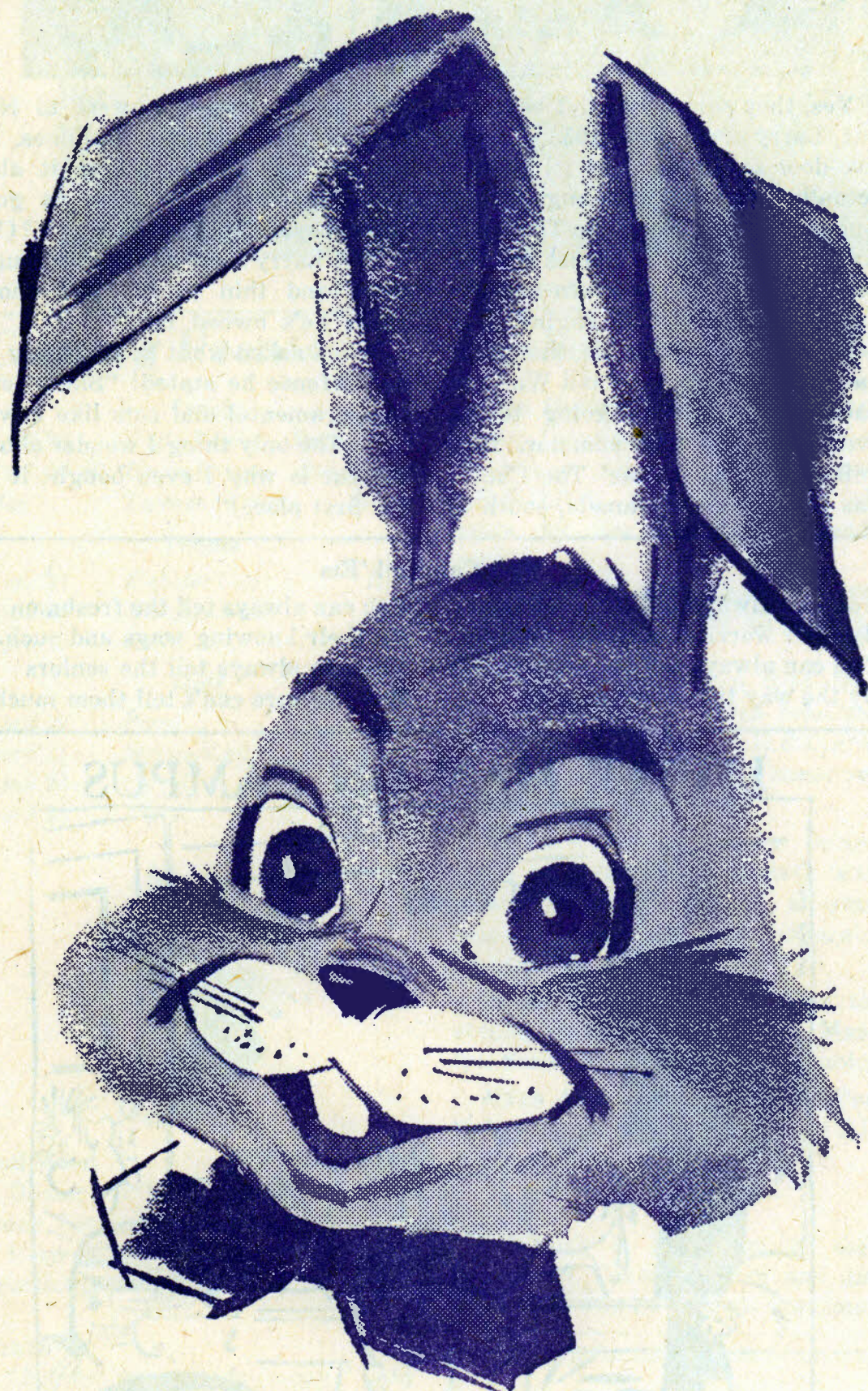


Appoint Senior Class Committees

I.S.U. Sponsors Career Day

So you're going to college? Career Day, sponsored by Iowa State University in conjunction with Veishea, will answer questions about courses of study and life as a college student.

On Friday, May 6, the entire University will be on display and at the students' disposal. High school students will be shown the educational programs and facilities available to Iowa State students. In addition, the students will see the non-academic side of college life. The day is filled with many activities geared to the seniors, such as Kick-off and seminars in the morning, the barbeque-luncheon at noon, and the open house tours in the afternoon.

Scholarships Given

In connection with Career Day, Veishea provides scholarships for students who will be freshmen at Iowa State in the fall. This year six Veishea scholarships will be given for a total of \$2,310. Their breakdown is as follows:

- One four-year tuition \$924.
- One two-year tuition \$462.
- Four one-year tuitions \$231 each.

The scholarship application blanks were due March 31. Karen Hubby, Gail Nystrom, Janet Smith, Carol Peterson, Charlotte Ashbaugh, Nancy Westfall, and John Clymer, all seniors from Boone, applied for the scholarship. Fifteen outstanding seniors from Iowa will be selected from all the applications on the bases of scholarship, leadership, character, and need. The 15 will be the school's guests during Veishea.

Many Boone High Students Shot

Contrary to student rumors that vaccinations cause fainting and other ill effects to relieve them from classroom duties, the deluge of shots administered to Boone High students disproved this theory.

On March 17 some of the 250 students started the series of triple toxoid. Small pox and tetanus vaccinations were also given. Mrs. Downey was assisted by the grade school nurse and by the members in Future Nurses Club.

The next vaccinations will be given in April and May. Mrs. Downey says this has been one of the largest group of students participating in the program since the school started giving vaccinations. The shots were given free of charge because the doctor donates his time and the state furnishes the vaccine.

Art Show to Be Held April 24

Sunday afternoon, April 24, is the date set for the Boone High School Art Show. All students, faculty, and parents are invited to attend this show which will be held in the gym and the art room. The show will be put on by junior and senior high art students under the direction of the art teachers, Miss Osborne and Mrs. Frazier. 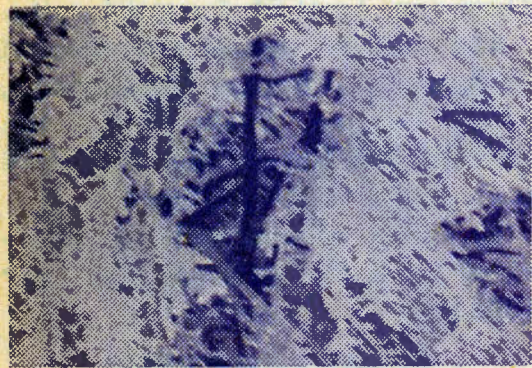

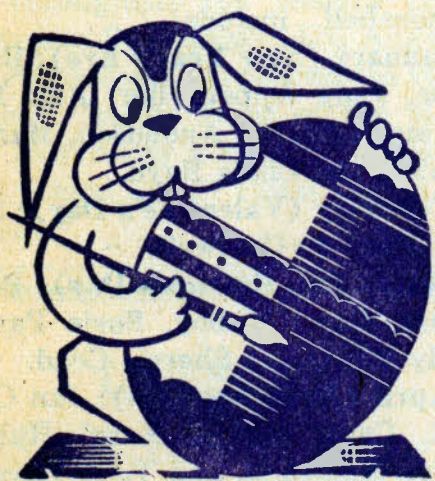
*"I swear to the Lord I still can't see

Yes, Larry's car has been through thick and thin in the two short years he's owned her.

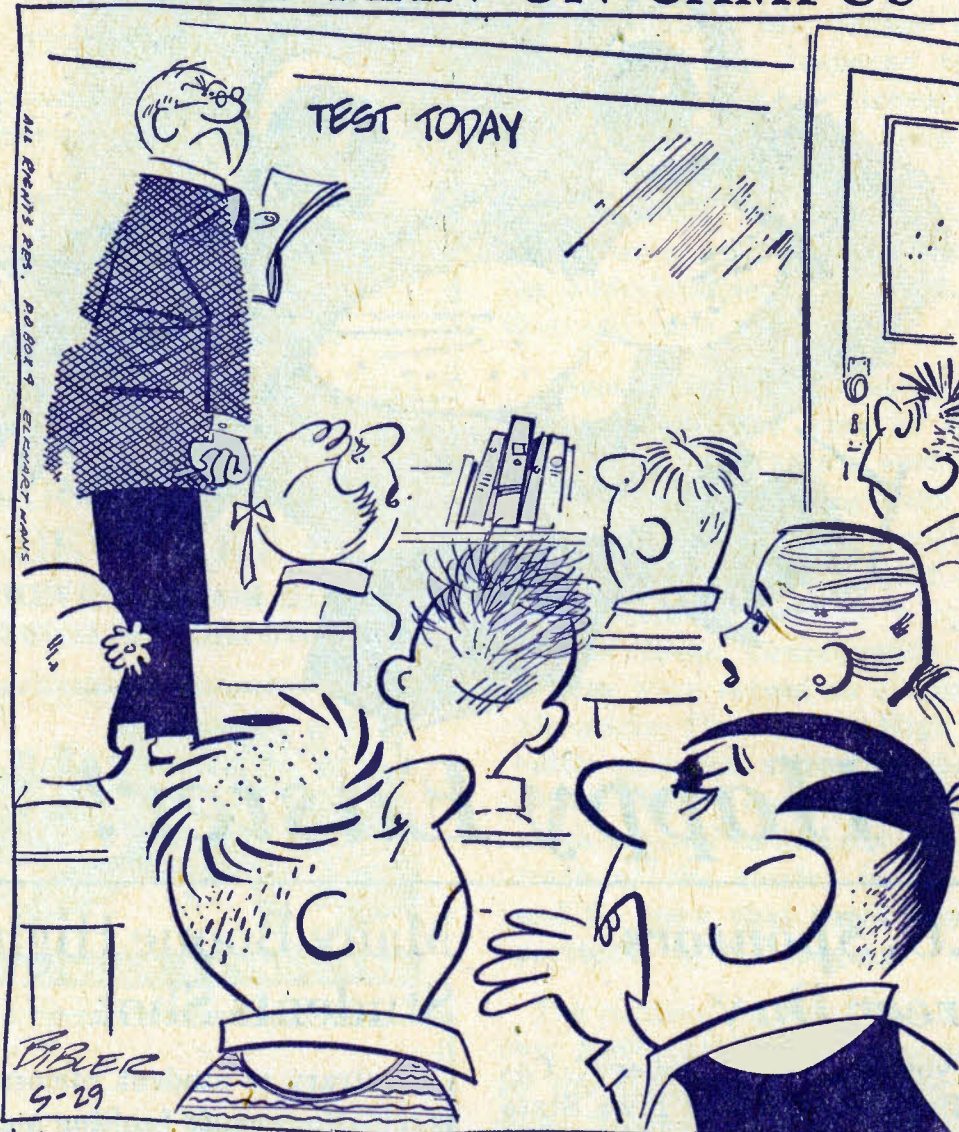

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Trackmen Finish First in Triangular Meet

Boone Places in AA Track Meet

IOWA CITY, March 26.—Boone's eleventh place tie in the state AA indoor track meet topped all To-reador efforts in the last eight seasons. Tying with Ottumwa and Newton, Coach Gordon Brookhart's trackmen scored seven points.

Boone was unable to score a first, but Darrell Richards vaulted 10 feet 6 inches to get a second place tie with Cedar Rapids and Davenport.

Terry Ferry, Ed Blaess, John Malcom, and Mike Cornelius made up the 880-yard relay team that placed third with a time of 1:37. Des Moines Tech and Keokuk finished before them. Ames was unable to recover the lead they held in the 880, when one of their runners dropped the baton.

The two-mile relay team consisting of Gary Highland, Brad Beckett, Roger McCoy, and Terry Ferry, took third place and a clocking of 8:50.3.

In the individual events Ferry took fourth in the 50-yard dash and Cornelius placed sixth in the open 440.

Other events entered were the mile relay, and the individual mile run. Gary Highland entered the 880 open, Joe Reedholm failed to place in the shotput with a 39-foot throw, and Bill Guenther scratched four times in the broad jump.

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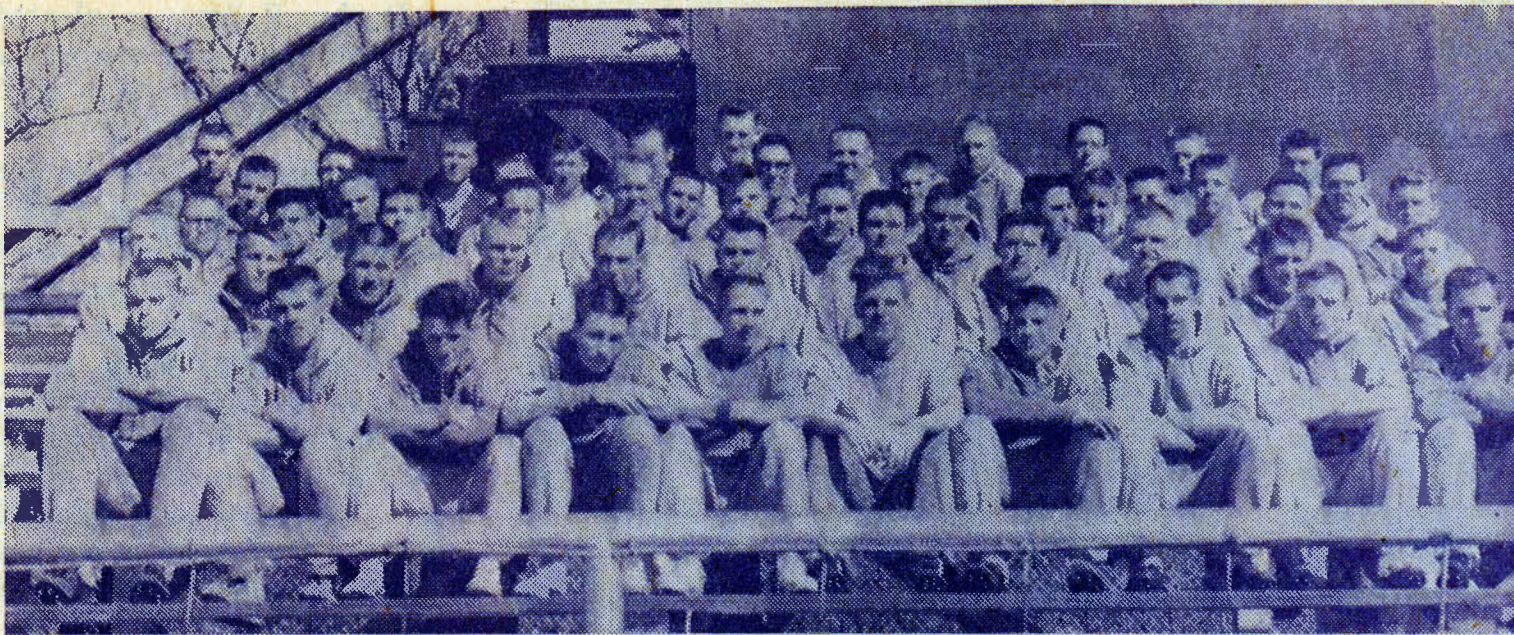

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Coach Gordon Brookhart's trackmen captured 10 of 18 firsts in a triangular track meet at Fort Dodge with Webster City and Fort Dodge participating on April 8. Boone totaled 86 2/3 points for first while Fort Dodge snagged 62 1/3 and Webster City 32.

John Malcom and Steve Trulin shared Boone's half of first place tie in the high jump with Fort Dodge's Tom Mabe, jumping in 5' 4", the only meet tie.

Junior Ron Long sprinted 100 yards in :10.6, with a helping wind at his back. Ron also ran the anchor leg of the 880 relay.

Mike Cornelius finished first in the 220-yard dash in :24.6. Boone nabbed first in the one-mile run with Larry Paulsen giving the effort.

In the field events the Toreadors finished first in the football throw, George Hannum throwing 190 feet; Bill Guenther leaped 19' 9" in the broad jump. In the pole vault Darrell Richards went 10' 6".

John Malcom's other individual effort came in the 180-yard low hurdles for first in :23 flat.

Boone relay teams took first in the mile, medley, and 880. Malcom, Guenther, Ron McDowell, and Cornelius in the mile; Jim Stumbo, Ed Blaess, Glen Forester, and Brad Beckett in the medley; Terry Ferry, Blaess, Richards, and Long in the 880.

The Toreadors meet Carroll and Nevada here in the next meet.

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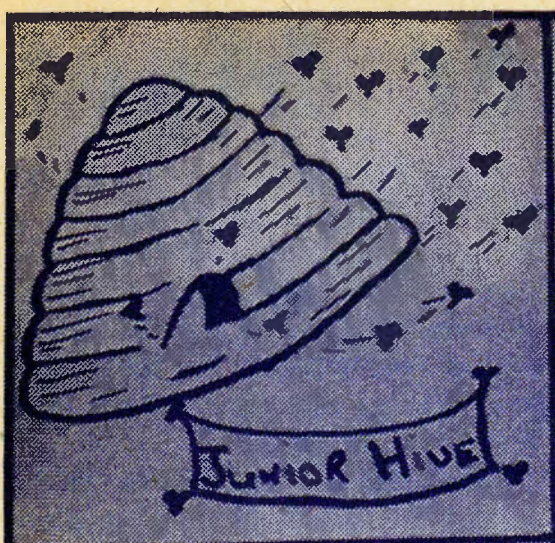
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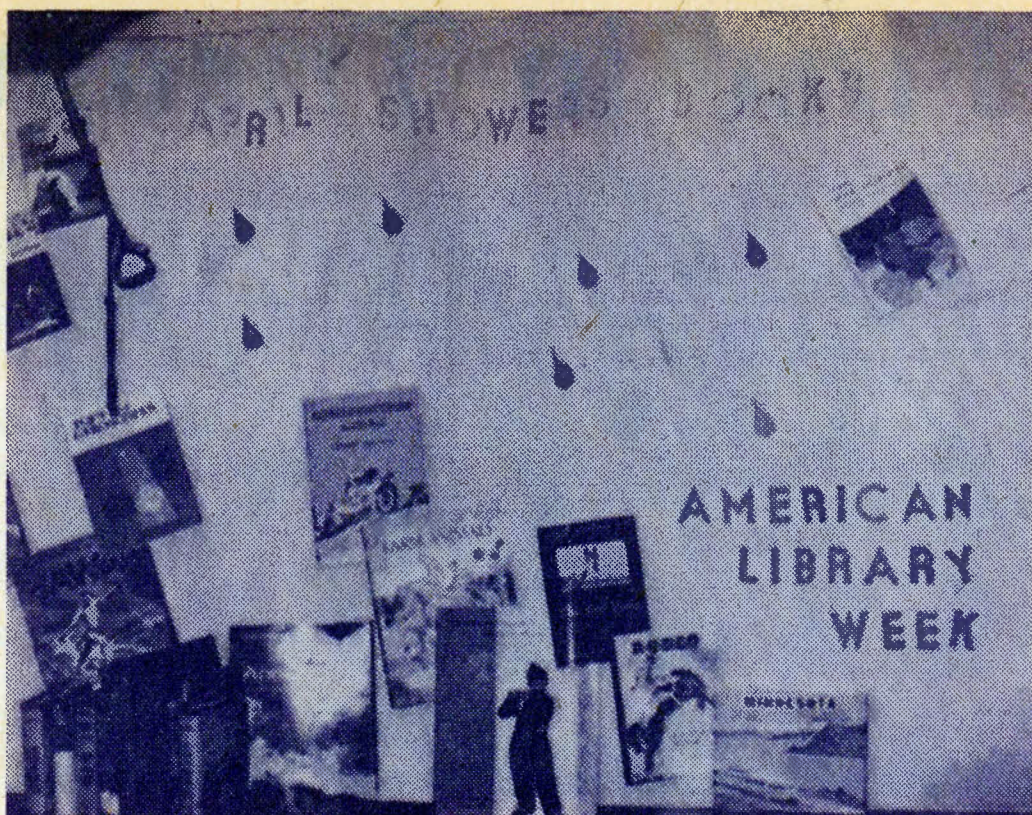
