
#### JUNIOR YEAR. '14, '15.


O yes, we had to give the Seniors a licking-of course, we hated to- And then they had to claim they licked us.

### Foot Ball

The 1915 season of Football was the hardest that Boone High School has experienced, due not only to the strength of the opposing teams, but to the fact that the team had to be developed out of practically new material, there being only three 1914 regulars remaining this year. With our own new gridiron to work on, and with the aid of Captain Schroeder, Coach Dickensheets developed a team that Boone High School may well be proud of—a fast team, excelling in passes and end runs; a team full of "pep" that would not back down before an overwhelming opposition; a line with a "stone wall defense," resisting the plunges of the strongest opponents; a backfield full of speed and strong defense. In all, a team that fought to the finish, bringing home the victory or preventing serious defeat.

The team was called upon to prove its ability by confronting the strong teams of Marshalltown, Eagle Grove, Webster City, Panora, Perry, Ames, Madrid, Nevada, and Denison, making an excellent showing and bringing glory to Boone High.

The first game was played with Madrid and there the team showed that they contained the materials necessary for making a winning team. At Panora they put up a strong fight and were defeated only by a score of 7 to 0.

The next Saturday Boone met Eagle Grove on our own ground. It was the first game to be played on our new gridiron. The team was backed by about 300 rooters and did their best-making one touchdown and holding their fast opponents to one score each quarter. Saturday, Oct. 16, proved to be the real thriller. Ames came over prepared to show us how to play football, but our defenders of the Red and Green were ready for them. The game was a delightful lark in the soft mud and resulted in a tie score, 0 to 0. Only once was Boone's goal in danger and then the team proved itself real heroes by withstanding three successive plunges on our one-yard line-a defense unequaled by any team in the state. At last we seemed to have gotten the habit of winning. Perry came up for a trimming which they received to the tune of 12 to 6. Again the team showed its ability to defend its one yard line by withstanding the three successive plunges by "Roust," one of the best backfield men in the state. On Saturday, Nov. 6, Marshalltown, smarting under their last year's defeat, came over to get even. The first half they were kept out of the territory of our goal, but in the second half Marshalltown came back strong, scoring 20 points. Our team showed some excellent defensive work, but the heavier, well trained team was bound to forge ahead. Our luck, however ,was not changed by our defeat by Marshalltown, for the next Friday and Saturday resulted in our victories over Madrid and Nevada. Madrid came up with a special train and had plans for taking Boone's scalp. But they slipped. Our team was right there with the goods and defeated them 6 to 0. The next day the team went to Nevada and won by a score of 37 to 9. The game was an easy one for our men, although the Nevada eleven put up a plucky fight.

The Boone High School football season ended Nov. 20 with a defeat by Denison. The team fought to the finish, but luck was against them and Denison won by the count of 7 to 0. With most of the team remaining and backed by the High School boosters, the team promises to do wonders next fall, and there is no reason why Boone High can not be raised to the top in the Football map of Iowa. All that is needed now is boosting. The team will do the rest. Everyone boost Football! It will bring success and victory to Boone High.

## LANWORTHY. "Lang."




#### STANDLEY.

### BASKETBALL.

The season of 1916 was the most successful in the history of Boone High's Basketball career. Much credit is due Coach Dickensheets for his skill in developing a team that could successfully oppose the strongest teams in the state.

The season was opened with two victories over Ogden, setting our hopes high, and showing the ability of the team to develop the winning habit. But those hopes received a jar by the overwhelming defeat of 46 to 9 by Fort Dodge—overwhelming only in the first half, which ended 33 to 3—in the second half the team came back with a fight that can be equalled by few defeated teams. They held the visitors to a score of 13 to 5.

The next day the team showed their ability to win by defeating Eagle Grove 19 to 15. On the following Friday Boone again showed its winning habit by a score of 28 to 23 over Nevada. Saturday, Jan. 29, proved to be the great day for Boone High School. Fort Dodge was defeated by a score of 23 to 18 in one of the best games of basketball ever played. The team was coached to perfection and played with the steadiness that has made Boone High famous. The Fort Dodgers put up an excellent fight, but the Boone team led from the start. The sensation of the game was Meredith's long basket shoot-

ing and team work, which showed that he was one of the best and fastest forwards in the state.

The second defeat of the season came from Marshalltown, where the team lacked their old pep, and were unable to stop the star work of the Marshalltown center.

At Tama, Boone came off with an easy victory. Cook played the star game, showing his ability to cage the ball by making fifteen baskets.

On Friday, Feb. 11, Boone suffered defeat by Cedar Rapids. The team played a hard game and fought to the finish, but luck was against them; the ball could not be caged and the free throws were wild. This was the only defeat of the season on our home floor.


Our old rivals, Ames, tried some rough play, which only added to the glory of their defeat.

The season was ended by the tournament at Ames, where Boone eliminated Ames, Sac City, and Eagle Grove. The second team relieved the first squad so that they would be in the best condition to meet Fort Dodge. The Boone-Fort Dodge game was the real game of the tournament. The team led until the last minutes of play, when Fort Dodge rushed to the lead and spoiled our chances for State Championship.



Last year E. J. Marsh presented to the Boone High School a handsome trophy cup, upon which is to be engraved each year the numeral of the class winning the highest percentage of games. Much enthusiasm was created by the Inter-class contests to decide the basketball championship of Boone High School.

The games were played in ten minute halves, all four teams playing the same evening. Two teams played one-half of their game, then the other two teams took the floor while the first teams rested. This saved time as well as affording continual interest for the spectators.

The first games were played between the Freshmen and Seniors and the Juniors and Sophomores. By a great display of team work the Freshmen defeated the Seniors 20 to 8, giving the rooters the idea that they would be strong bidders for the cup. The Juniors won over the Sophomores by the close score of 19 to 17. The next games played were the Senior-Sophomore and Junior-Freshmen games. The Seniors sprung a surprise by easily defeating the Sophomores, while the Juniors put the Freshmen out of the race by a close margin.
