"The New Poor," by Cosmo Hamilton, a popular farce of this year, was presented to the public on Thursday, March 19. The entire story is laid in the Wellington country home. The Wellbys belong to the new rich and are desirous of admittance to fashionable society but find it rather difficult. They hardly arrive at their beautiful home, when the servants walk out in a body, saying they can't stand the country. The family is in despair; the girls have attended a fashionable school and can't even boil water without burning it, so to speak. To add to the general excitement, Amos, the fastidious and particular son, comes home for the week end, bringing a guest. In the midst of the fuss, Alice slips out, going to the city to answer an advertisement, and engages a staff of servants. They are a Russian grand duke, who wishes to become butler, two other young noblemen and princess, cousins, and also exiles. They are engaged as chauffeur, footman and maid, respectively. Much of the amusement of the play arises from the treatment of these servants by the Wellbys. They are given more honor than distinguished guests.

After a month and half of service, the two younger daughters, Constance and Betty, fall in love with the two young men, Alice with the Grand Duke, and Amos with the Princess. About this time, Mary, a cousin of the family and a rising young author, begins to suspect that there is something wrong with the Royal servants and calls in O'Farrel, a detective. The Grand Duke is an artist and has made copies of three of the Wellbys valuable pictures. It is discovered that the copies have been placed in place of the original pictures, which theft is supposed to have been made by the servants. However, they are cleared of this accusation by the confession of Gutteridge, the guest. When the servants disclose their identity, in which they admit they are only college students earning money to put themselves through school, the four love affairs end all too abruptly to have been anything but mere novelties.

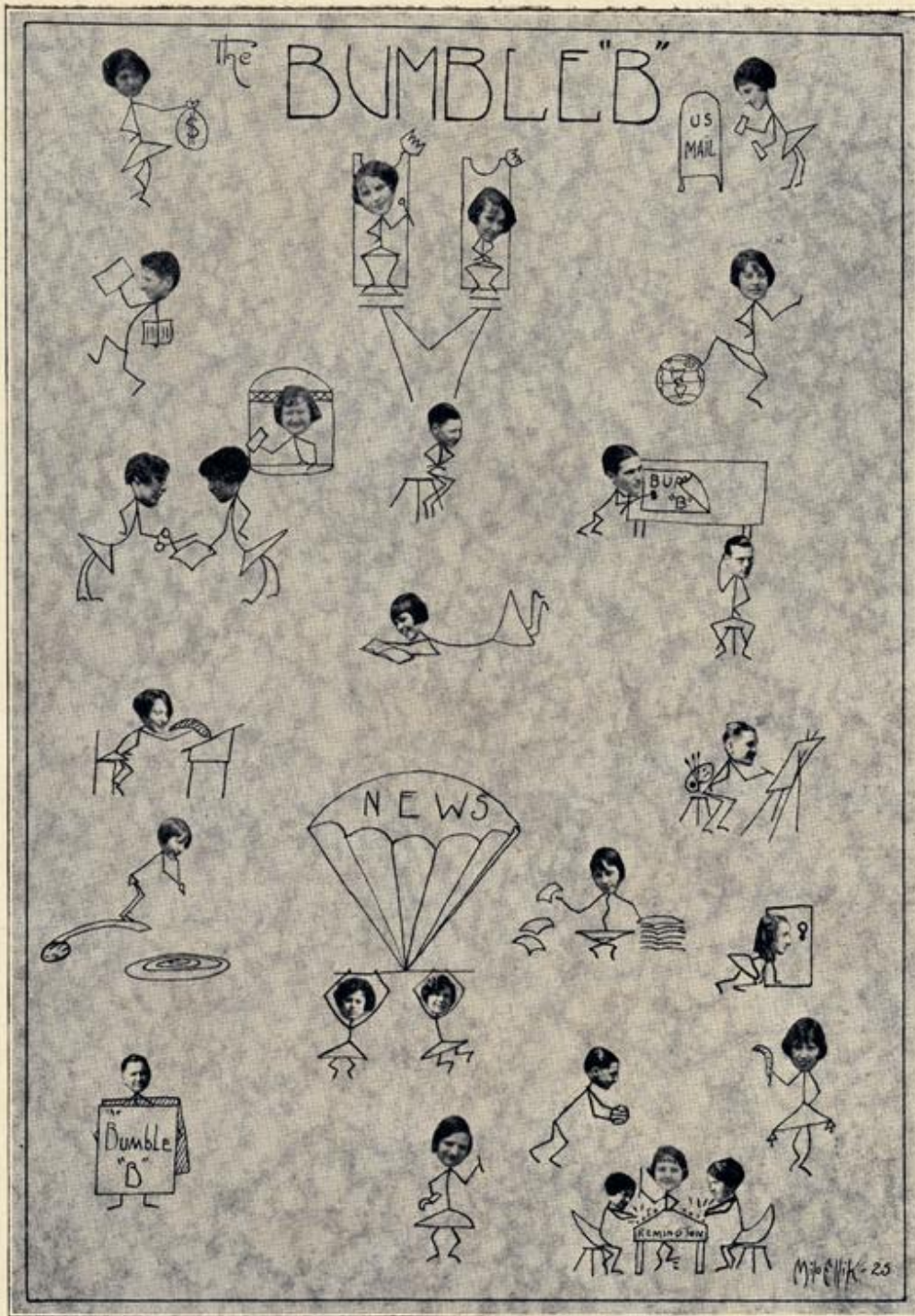
The annual assembly play was very successfully given, also.

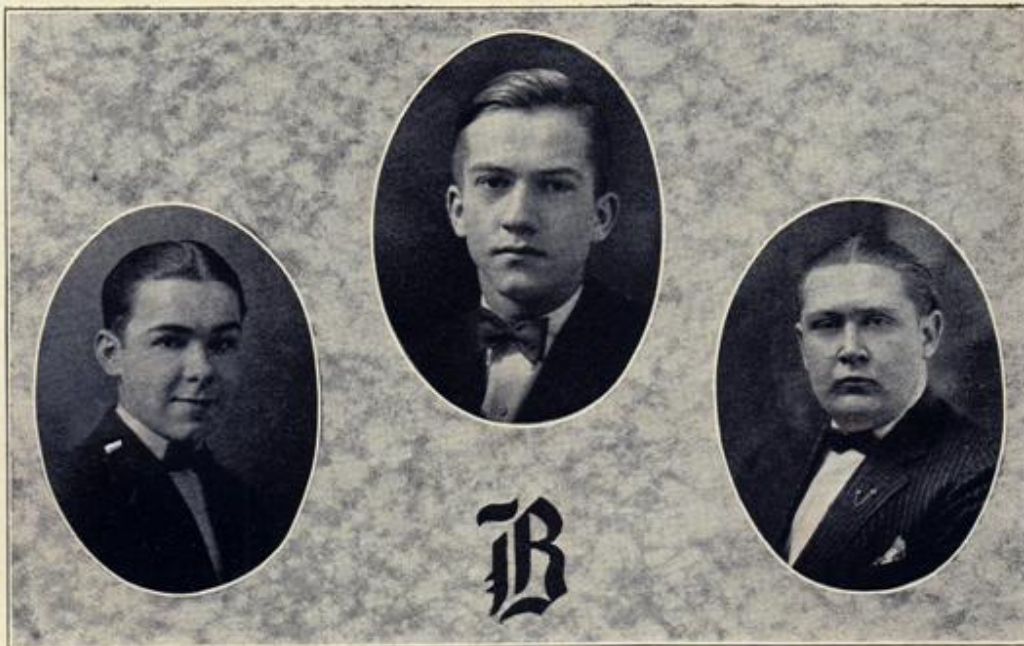

## Debate

The Debate Squad has spent a very prosperous year. The Affirmative team, consisting of Lyle Quinn, a four year debater, Marlowe Williams and Lawrence Preston, won three out of four hard fought debates during the past season on the "League of Nations" question.

The Negative team, composed of John Burnside, Marvin Cartwright and Eugene Slater, won a three to nothing victory over Ames.

The season was opened here on January 7, when our boys were awarded a decision over the visiting Perry team, after a pitched battle of words and wits. Perry fought to the last, but was out-classed and beaten by a three to nothing decision of the judges. The next contest, which was scheduled with Mitchelville on January 21, resulted in a one to nothing victory for B. H. S., due to the fact that Mitchelville was quarantined. On February 4, our Affirmative team went to Council Bluffs and after a hard fight lost to Abraham Lincoln High School. This ended our State League Contest.

On March 4, in the Ames, Waterloo, Boone triangle, our Affirmative team went to Waterloo, winning another three to nothing victory over a strong trio.

Ames came over to battle our Negative team, and went home beaten by a unanimous decision of the judges.

Much credit must be given to the Negative men for helping the Affirmative in perfecting themselves, and furnishing good competition in practice debates.

The debate class has also done good work during the past season. A number of practice debates were held with the Farm Bureau Team. The Affirmative team gave their arguments at a luncheon given by the Chamber of Commerce. The people of Boone have on various occasions shown their interest in the work done by the students in debate. Different teams have spoken before most of the city organizations.

One of the most interesting events in the class was a contest to determine the respective merits of the pupils. The class was organized into seven teams and a series of debates was held. The contest brought out some good material. None of

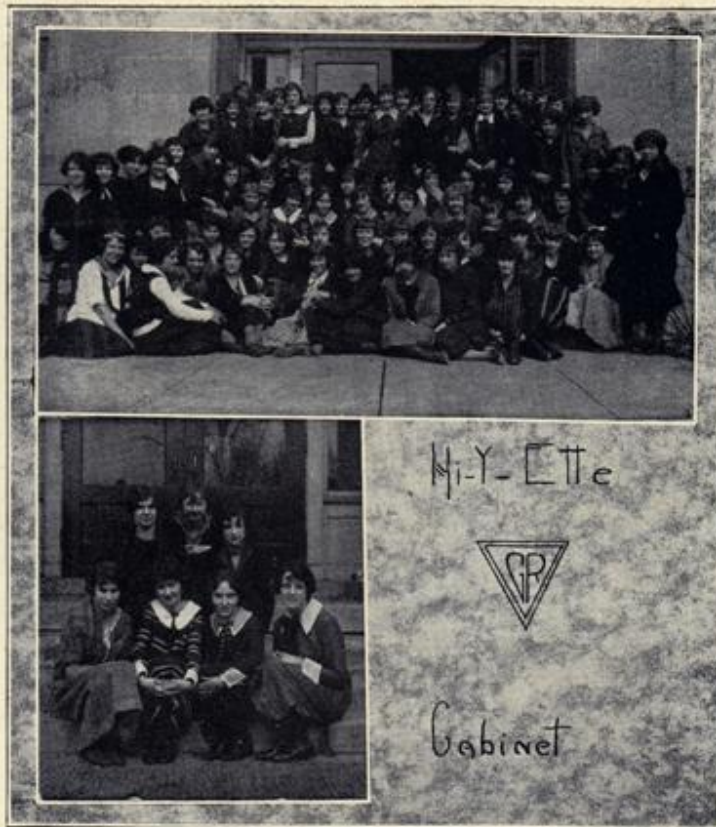

Among the club members this year are found the following Licensed Amateur Operators::

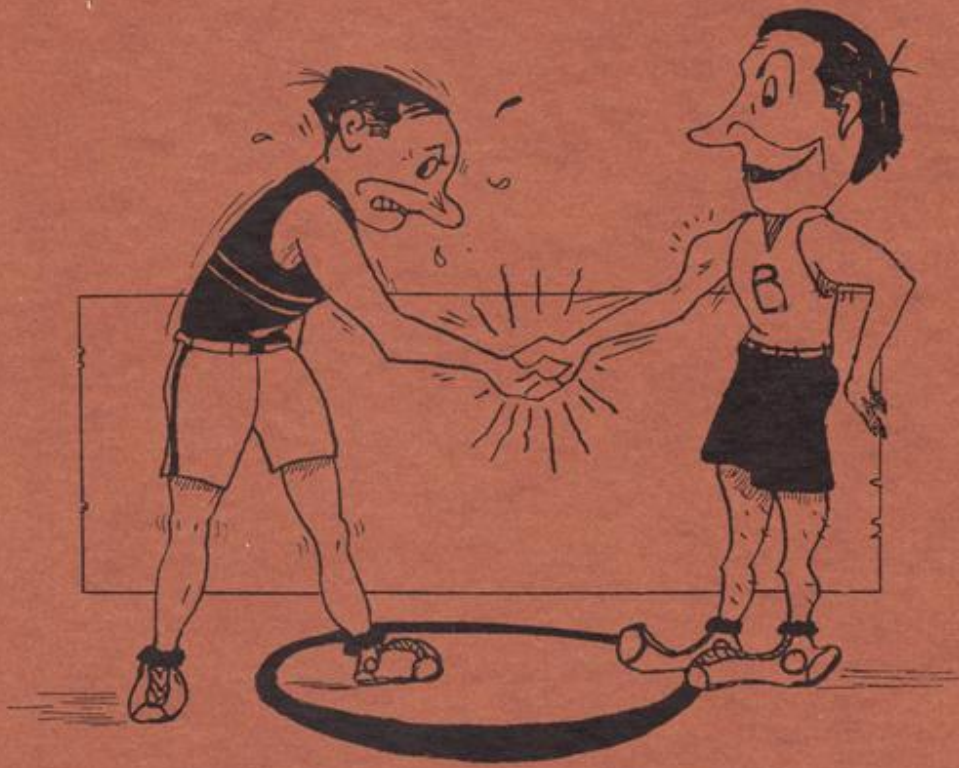

## Basketball Season



Stock in the Boone athletic market took a remarkable rise this winter. Having dropped a trifle below par during the football season, at the end of the basketball season it was selling at premium. Out of nineteen starts, fifteen of them ended with the larger score on the right side of the score board. Only three games on the regular schedule were lost, two to Oskaloosa and one to Jefferson, all, however, by a very close and exciting score. The other loss was to Sioux City at Spirit Lake in the District Tournament. Sioux City, however, had been previously defeated on our home floor by the overwhelming score of 41 to 13.

Boone was well represented on the All-State Honorary Teams. Captain Halleen was placed on the Second All-State team in the Center position. Halleen played consistent basketball all season, and will be a big loss to next year's team. Captain-Elect Johnstone was placed on the first All-State team as running guard. Johnstone was as scintillating as ever and was always up and fighting. As captain for next year's team, he should be a big inspiration. Councilman, our flashy guard, was placed on the honor roll. Grant, Stumbo, and Hannum played strong games through-

out the season. The entire team played as a well-oiled unit most of the time, which was very satisfying to the followers and supporters of Boone High.

With three letter men as the nucleus around which the 1925 cage machine was to be built, Coach Evans issued the basketball call soon after the close of the football season. Thorough drill in fundamentals was given the squad to begin with, as a foundation for the year's work.

On December 23, just before Christmas, Boone opened the season by defeating the Beaverites by the score of 35 to 13. It took a whole half to get started, but when the team did get started, how the ball went through the loop. Halleen starred in this game, making nine field goals.

After the Christmas holidays, and its effects, had passed away, Story City came, saw, and was conquered. The Story County team showed lots of fight and had a well balanced team, but they could not hold pace to Coach Evans' team. The final score was 28 to 13.

On January 3, Boone lost their first game of the season to the fast Oskaloosa outfit. This game, one of the fastest ever played on the local floor, was not decided until after the final whistle was blown. The final score was to 13 to 12. Boone also suffered a second defeat at the hands of this same team later in the season on their floor, the score being 20 to 12.

The next week end Jefferson was the winner in a close game played on their floor. This was atoned for, however, when Boone revenged the previous defeat by a score of 20 to 12, on the home floor.

The next victim was Ames. Stung by the Jefferson defeat the night before, Boone outplayed and outfought the Ames team, winning 23 to 15. This was not Ames' only defeat, as Boone trampled on them again after a fiercely contested struggle.

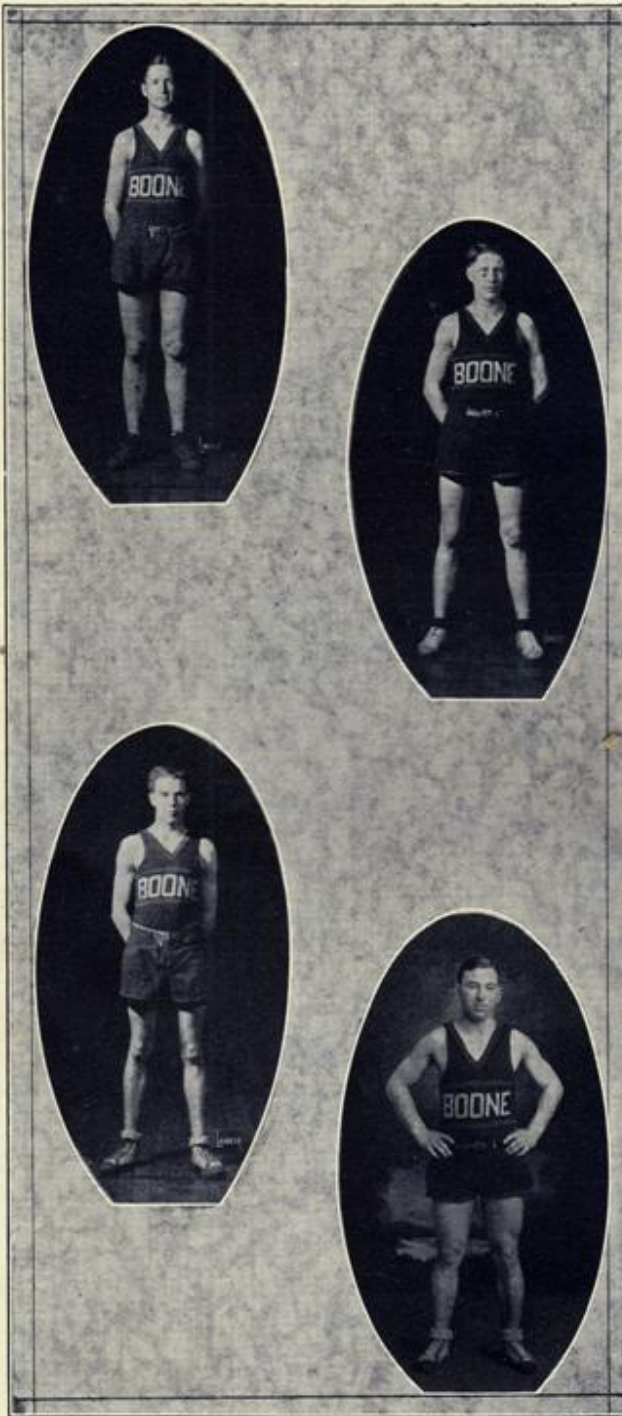
At Grinnell, Boone kept its winning streak, winning from Grinnell 24 to 10. The game was well played throughout, and Boone's tight defense featured, Grinnell caging only two field goals.

Sioux City, coming to this city, as favorite to win, had to leave with the low score of 41 to 13. Boone took them off their feet in the first few minutes of play, and the outcome was never in doubt. The close defense of Boone featured in this game also, Sioux City caging only two field goals.

Fort Dodge was met twice and defeated twice, once by a score of 27 to 9, and, in the final game of the season, and on our floor, by the score of 20 to 12.

Much credit must be given to the second team, as "Yannigans," for the success of this year's team. In most of the games they were put into play, and kept the other team guessing. With three letter men and four subs back for next year, Boone should have a State Championship team.

The games were all well played, and much good material was shown. There were many exciting games and close scores, although the Seniors and Juniors seemed to have an edge on the Sophomores.

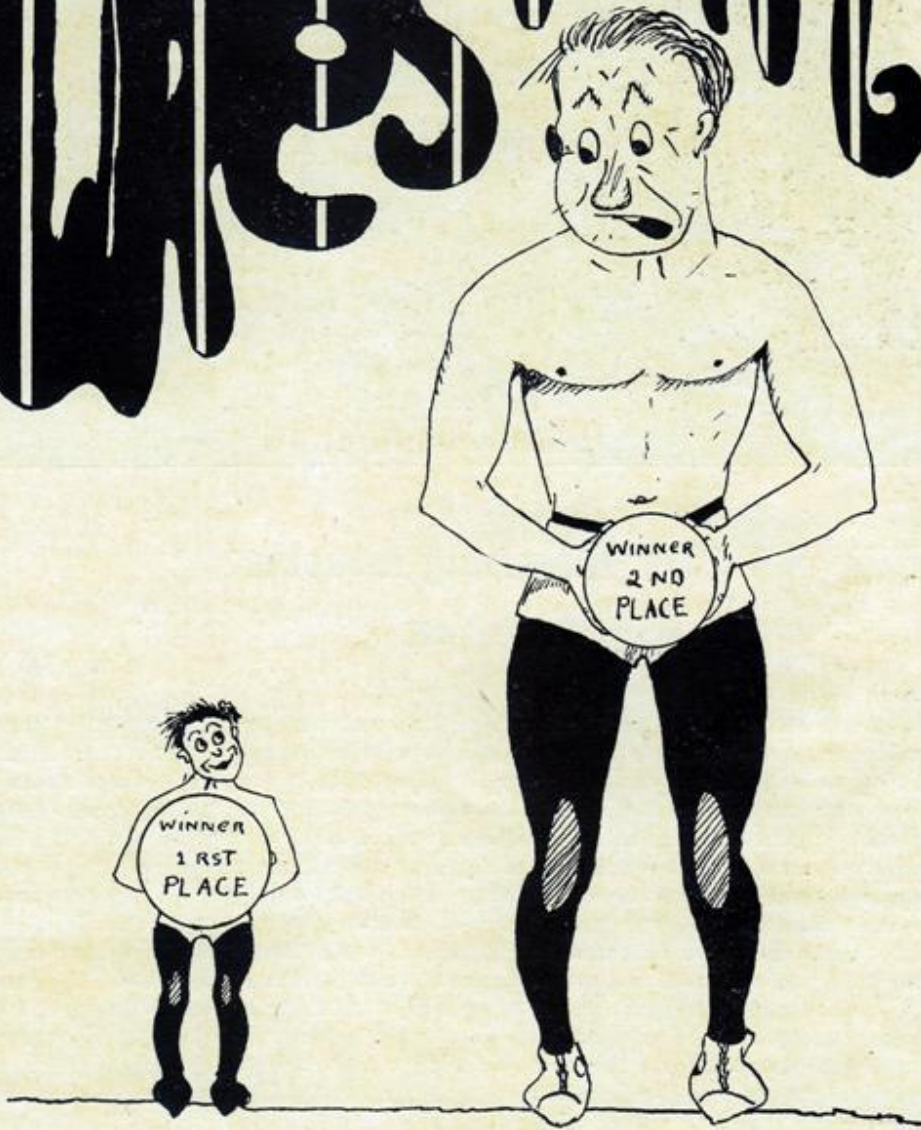

## Wrestling Season



Boone Hi has again produced one of her noted wrestling teams. The Boone mat team participated in only four dual meets, winning three of them. The first meet with Iowa Falls, Boone easily won by the score of 19 to 11. In this meet Boone won three falls and two decisions while the visitors collected one fall and three decisions. In their second dual contest, Boone was defeated at Cherokee, by the fast Cherokee team with a score of 21 to 9, Boone taking only one fall and two decisions, while Cherokee took three falls and three decisions. In the third duel meet, Boone Hi's wrestling team defeated the Ft. Dodge grapplers at Ft. Dodge by a score of 23 to 10. In this meet Boone gathered three falls and four decisions, while Fort Dodge collected two falls. In all the dual meets Boone had a total of 71 points to the opponents' 47.

In the State tournament out of eight men entered, six of them went into the semi-finals, four into the finals, and two of them won first place, namely, Captain Ray Morris and Lyle Wilson. This is Lyle's third consecutive State Championship. Boone and our ancient rivals, Marshalltown, tied for first place with twenty points each. This makes the third consecutive year that Boone has claimed the State Wrestling Championship, although this year it was shared by Marshalltown.

In the last dual meet, Boone defeated Ames by a score of 20 to 5. Boone won in all classes but one, with two falls and five decisions, while Ames won one fall.

Much credit must be given to Coach Irwin, who has coached and helped the boys in every possible way.

95-lb. Class

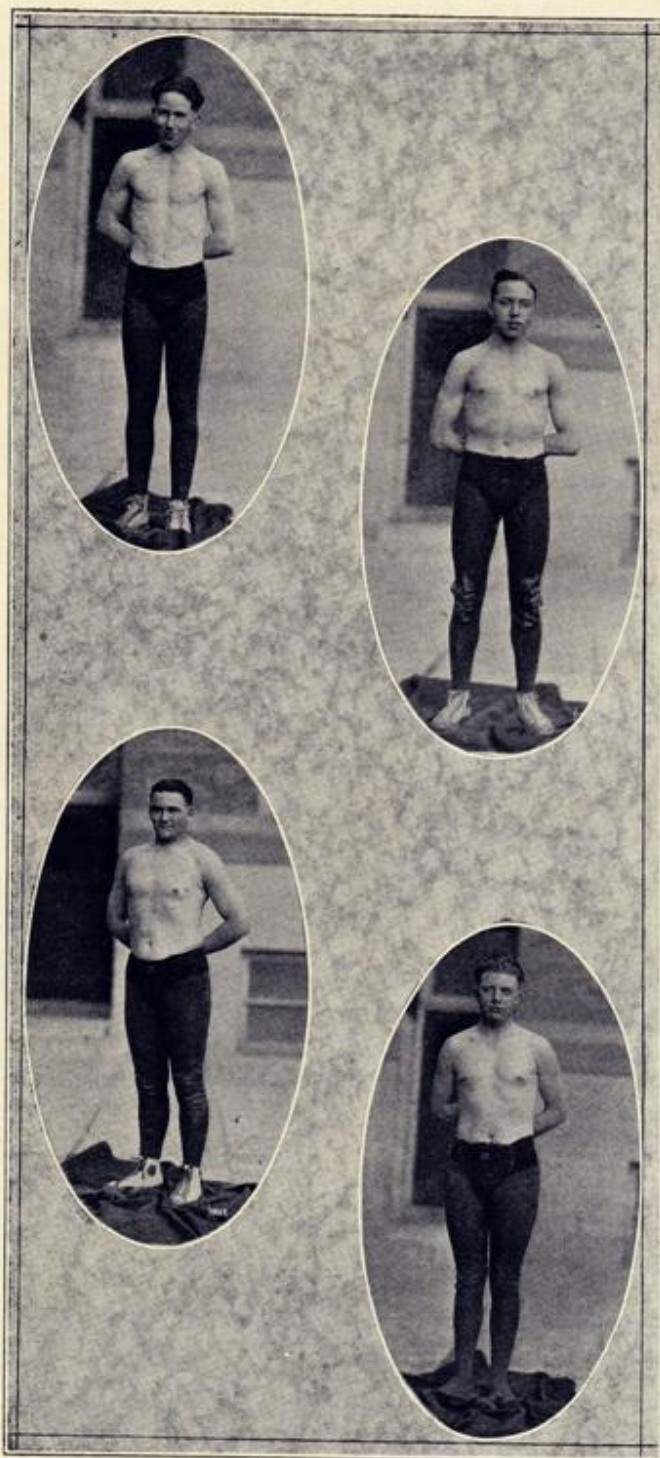
"Bundy" came out in his Senior year and showed that he could wrestle by making a regular berth on the team. He was small but mighty, and was Third State Champion.

## Spring Athletics



With the coming of Spring, and the Basketball season having come to a close, Track again comes into its own in Boone Hi. In the last two or three years the interest in this sport has diminished to almost nothing, not only among the student body as a whole, but also among those who would have participated in track work.

This revival of interest is due chiefly to Coach Evans. It is planned not only to enter a team in the State meet at Ames, but also to have a few dual meets and enter teams in the invitation tournaments held at Stuart, Carroll, Council Bluffs, Iowa City and a few others. In the annual class track meet, held at the Goeppinger Field, despite a slow track, and a shortage of time in which to prepare, good time was made in the track events. Some good records were also set up with the field events. The meet was won by the Seniors, who gathered a total of 61 point, while the Juniors were gathering 48, the Sophomores 5 and the Freshmen 17. This meet showed that the Red and Green colors will be borne by some fast and hefty men in the coming track and field meets. Boone High should again come into its own in track this Spring through the efforts of the twenty-five men on the squad.

It was decided by the Athletic Council to discontinue Baseball, that is, not have interscholastic games. The national sport was started in Boone Hi last spring, and much interest was shown. Choosing a team of twelve from four teams, they were sent to the Ames State Baseball tournament and without any practice in team work, won third place, defeating four teams and losing to Earlham in the semi-finals. Baseball is not discarded altogether this year as there is to be an inter-class tournament, each class having as many representative teams as they want. It has also been decided that the Seniors will play the Juniors at the school picnic. It is doubtful that Boone will be represented in the Ames meet this year, as each team has to win so many interscholastic games before they are eligible to compete. Mr. Irwin is in charge of the baseball teams.

Spring football has been started, under the direction of Mr. Kerr, to teach the fundamentals of football to those who wish to play next year. It is probable that tennis courts will be made some place for the future "Bill Tildens" to plays on. With all the sports, everyone should find something that he can enter and help bring fame to Boone Hi.
