### ERWIN:

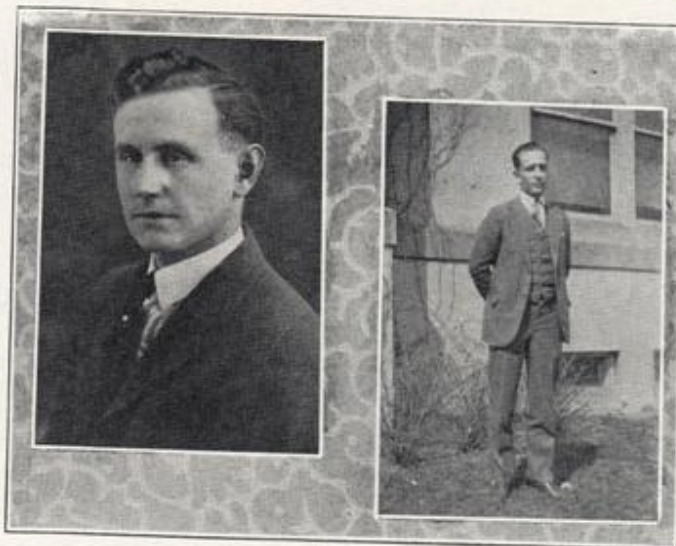

### KERR:

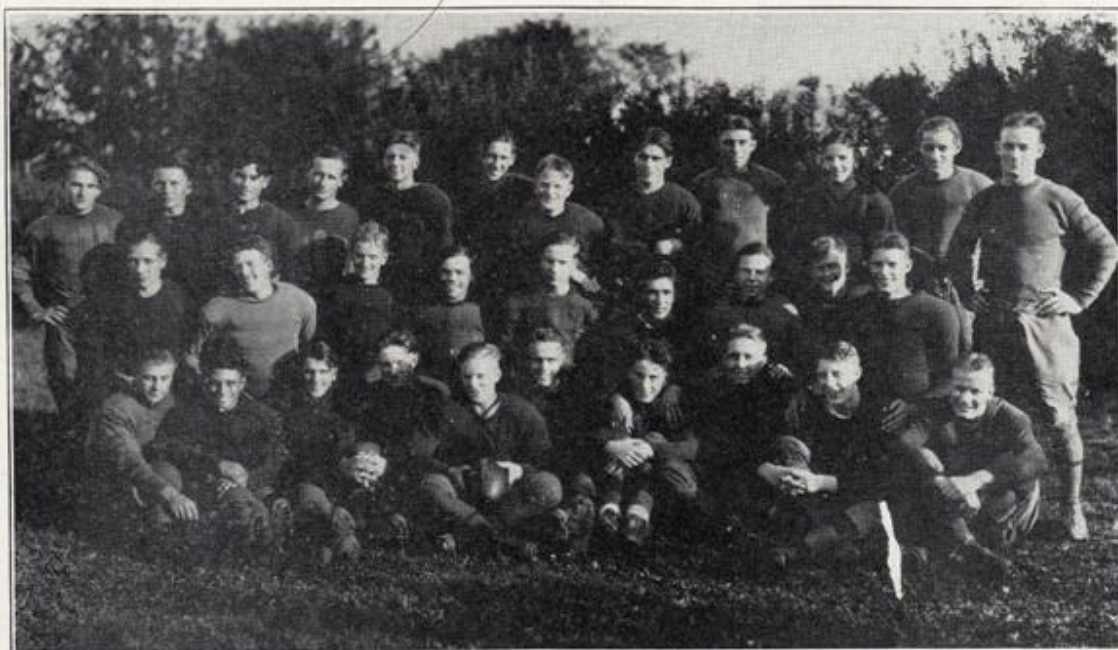

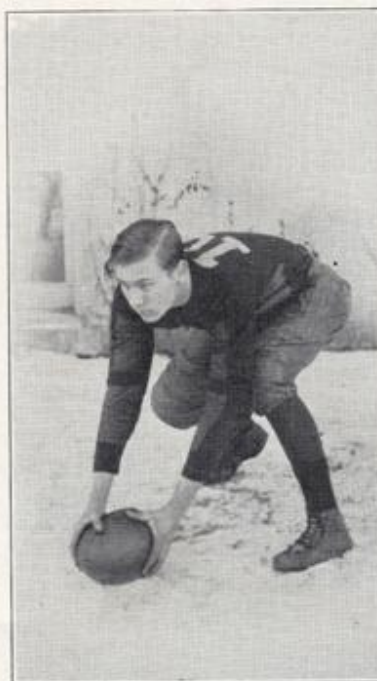


## FOX: Fullback

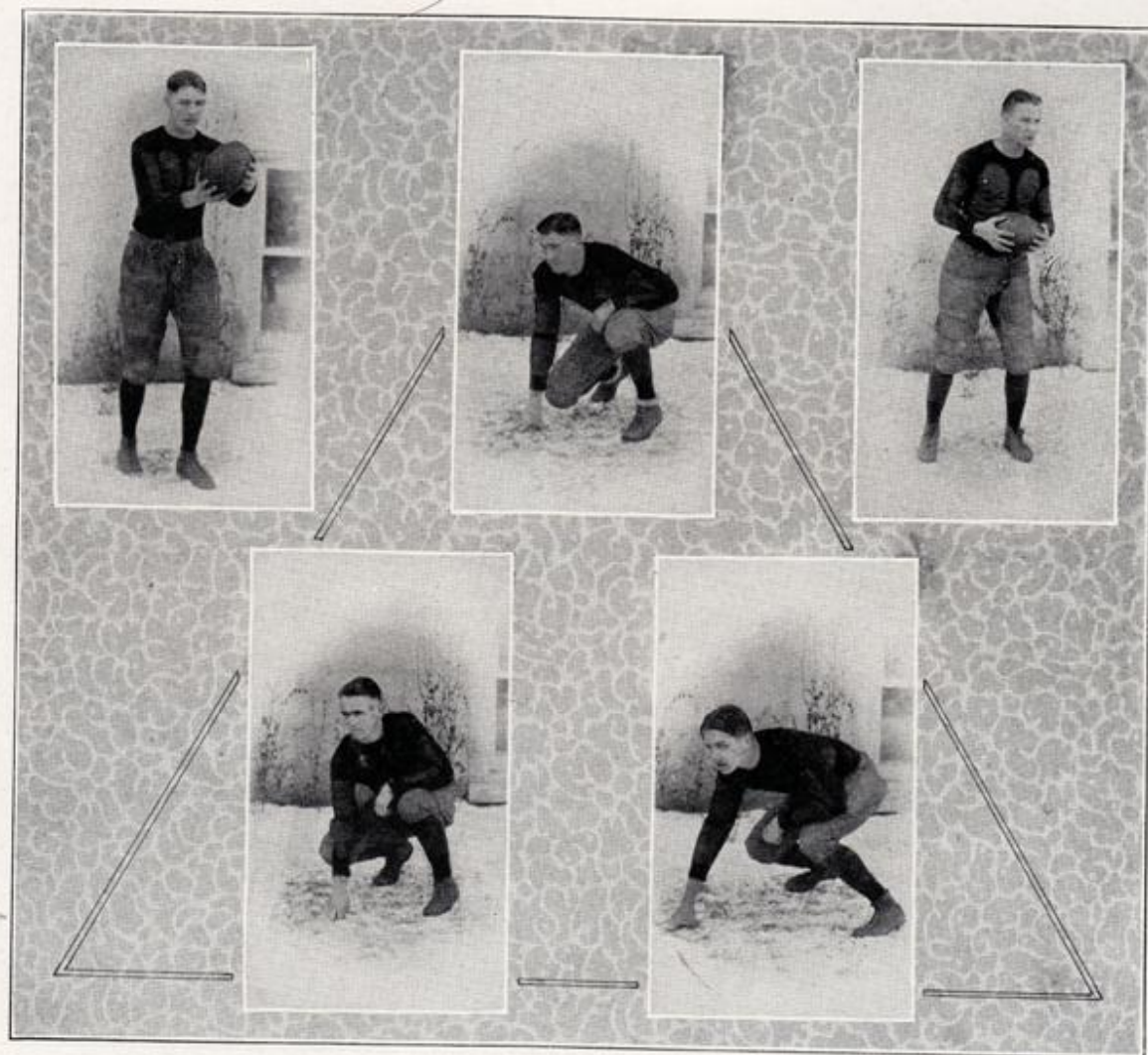

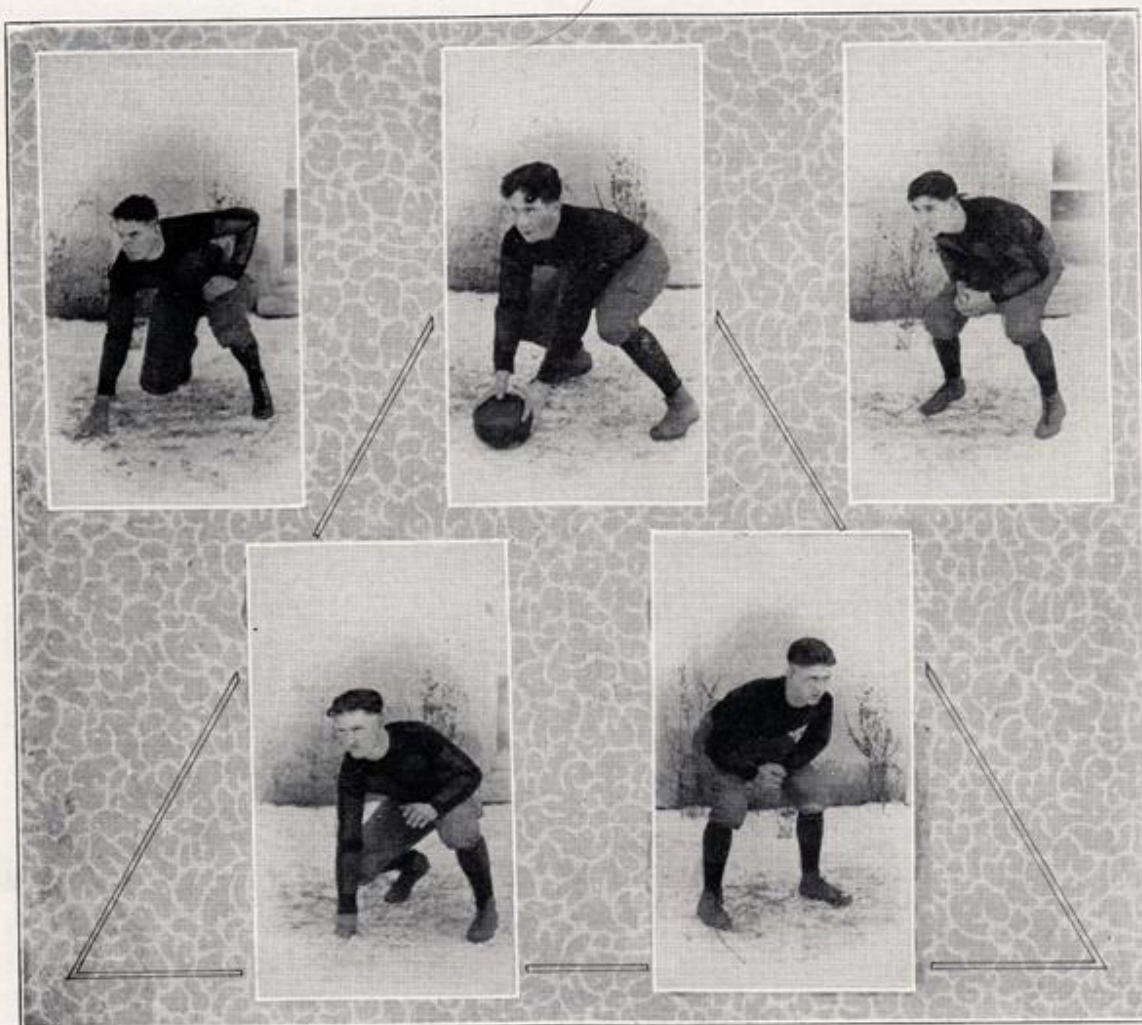
## ATHERTON:

 "Hap" played a great game at the pivot position. For a red-headed person he kept his head well and was a valuable man to his team-mates. He will be missed in the line-up next year.

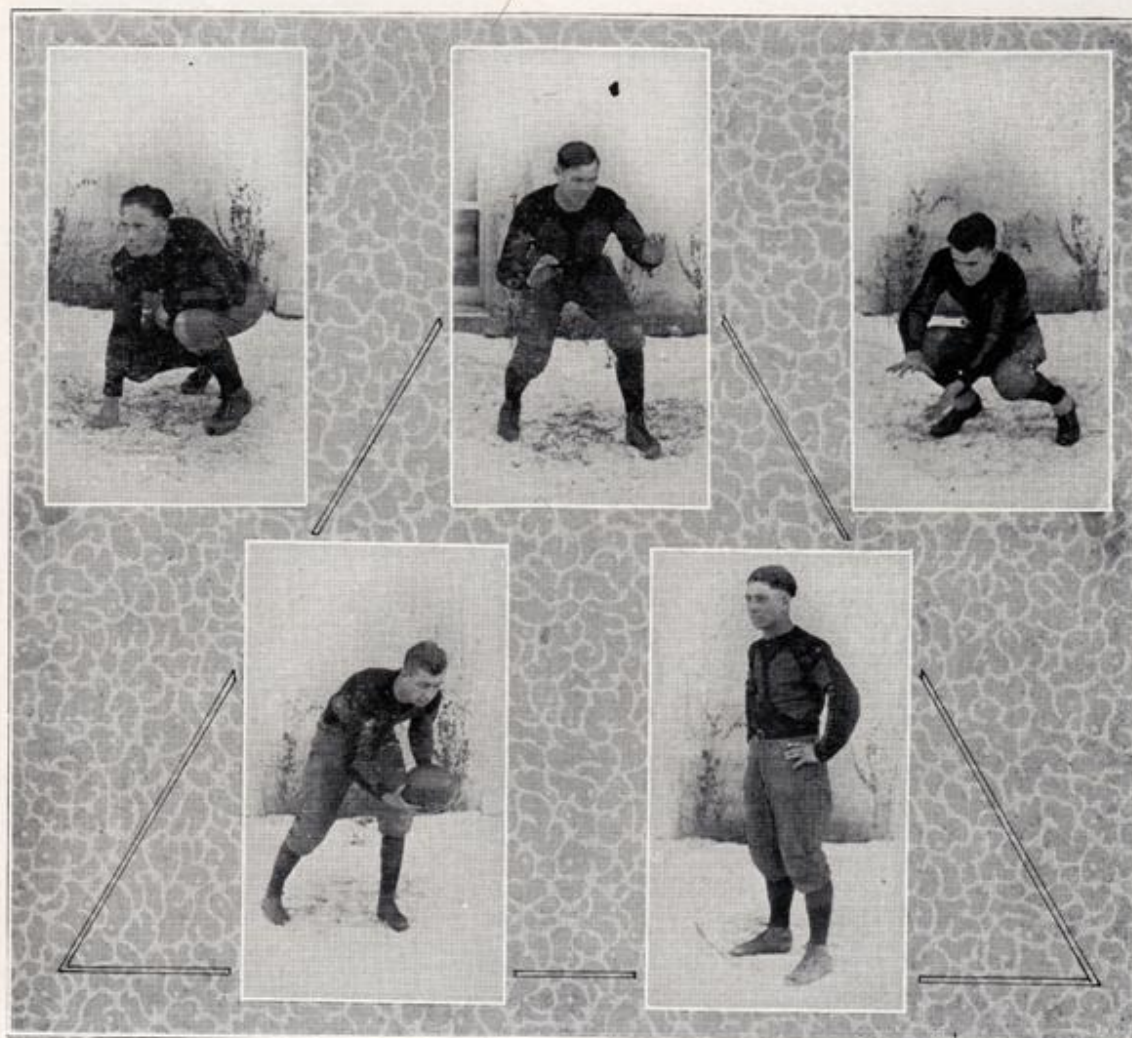
**MOORE:** Halfback

## *The Season*

The first games were not very successful, due to hard luck and many muddy fields. Boone won from Webster City, Valley Junction, and Ames, and tied West High and Colfax. The next two games were dropped to Fort Dodge and Jefferson.

The Boone High School football season ended on Turkey day with a defeat by Marshalltown. The team fought to the finish, but luck was against them and Marshalltown won by the count of 19 to 0.

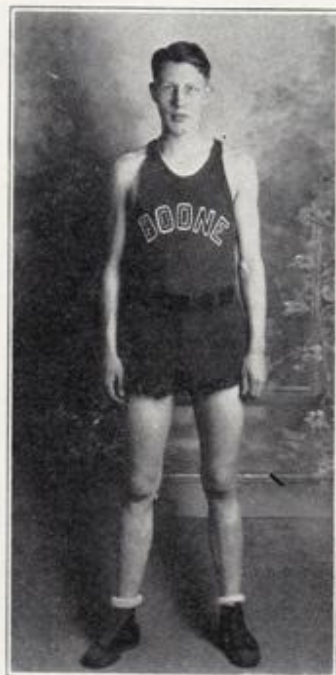

# The Season

When Coach Evans issued the first call for basketball, among others who reported for practice were three letter men, Captain Johnstone, Grant, and Stumbo, all of whom were regulars last year. Besides these, there were many men who had had no experience but were eager to learn the game.

The basketball season was one of the most successful in the history of the school, not only from the standpoint of games won and lost, but because of the spirit of the team and student body.

The first game was played against Ames before the Christmas holidays, providing the first victory of the season. The holiday period was spent in practice for the oncoming games. Two victories were added during the following week; Boone winning from Fort Dodge on Friday night, then traveling to Oskaloosa Saturday and winning by a two point margin. The next game was played against Perry. This game also increased the "win" side of the scoreboard. Boone took the "Grin" out of Grinnell, Friday, January 22, by a 26 to 11 score.

For several years Boone Hi had tried to find a name for their team but had failed until the Marshalltown game when they, unknowingly, named the fighting green "Toreadors." This name was bestowed on us because they said the game resembled a bull fight. Boone suffered its first defeat of the season from Cedar Rapids in a close game. We won from Marshalltown by the score of 23 to 18. Oskaloosa won from Boone in a close game resulting in a one point victory. Boone, playing three games in less than six days, won from Fort Dodge in a close game, then lost to Ames, this game going two extra periods.

Taking the season as a whole, it was very successful. The team at the end of the season was composed mostly of Seniors, only one Freshman and one Sophomore being on the first squad. The team won the sectional and district meets, went to the state meet, and there tied for second place with Cedar Rapids and Webster City. Newton, the state champions, and Cedar Rapids, who were the lucky ones in drawing, represented Iowa in the national tourney.

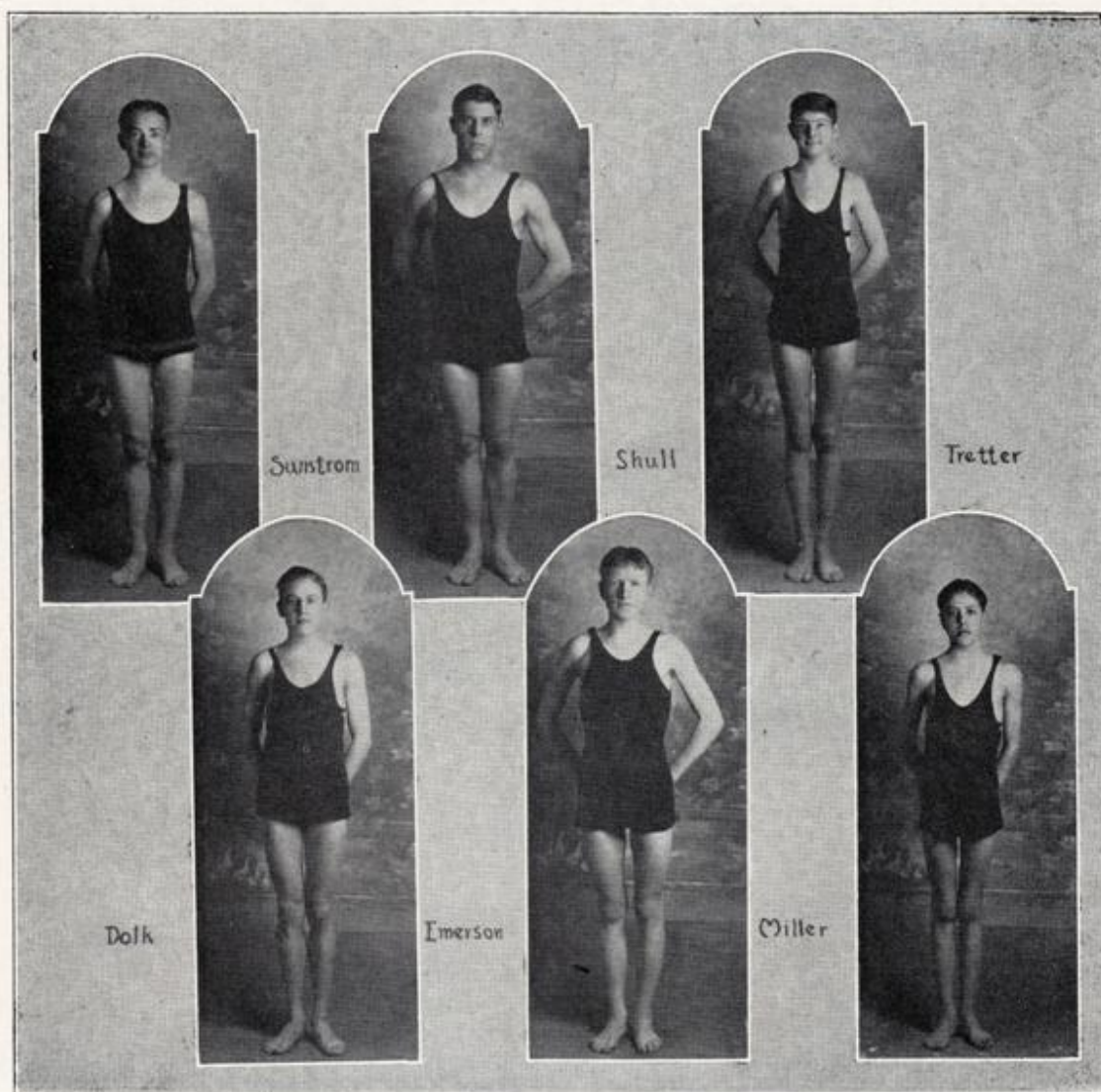

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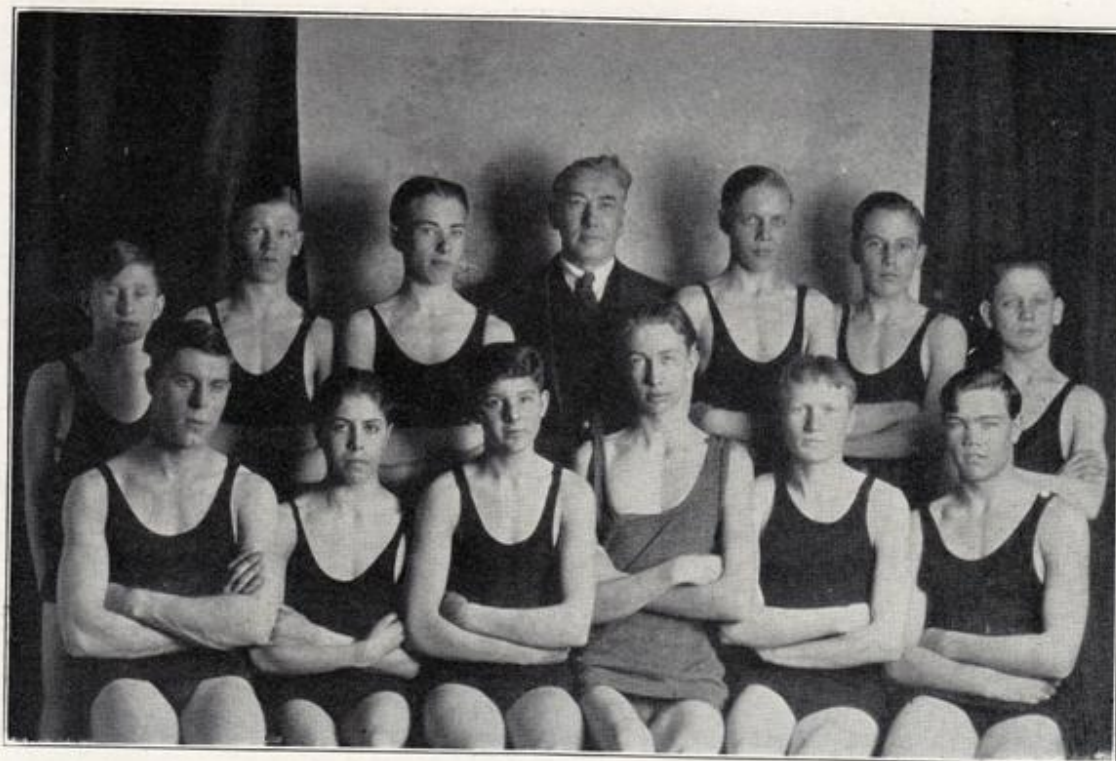


## *Swimming Season*

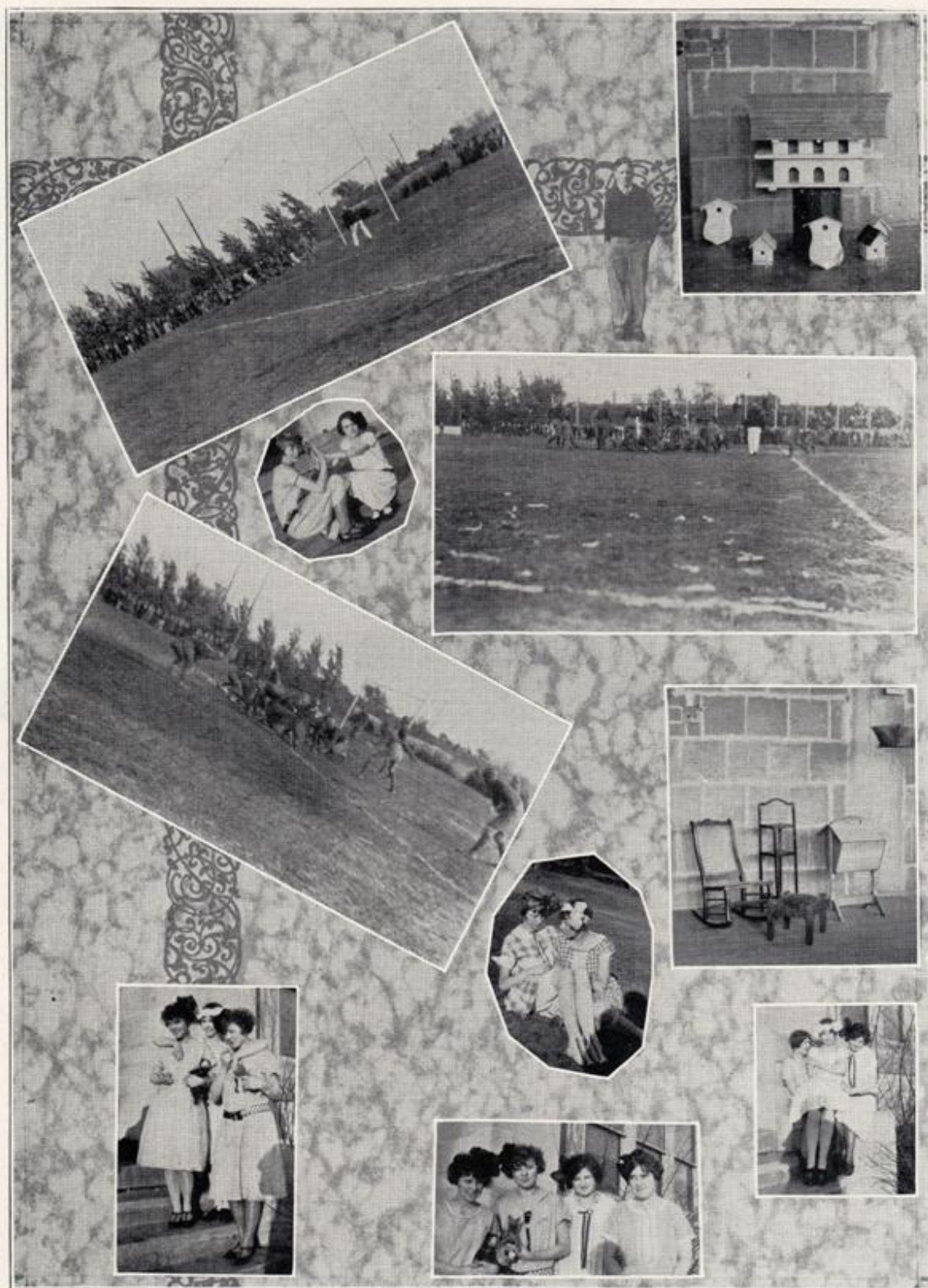

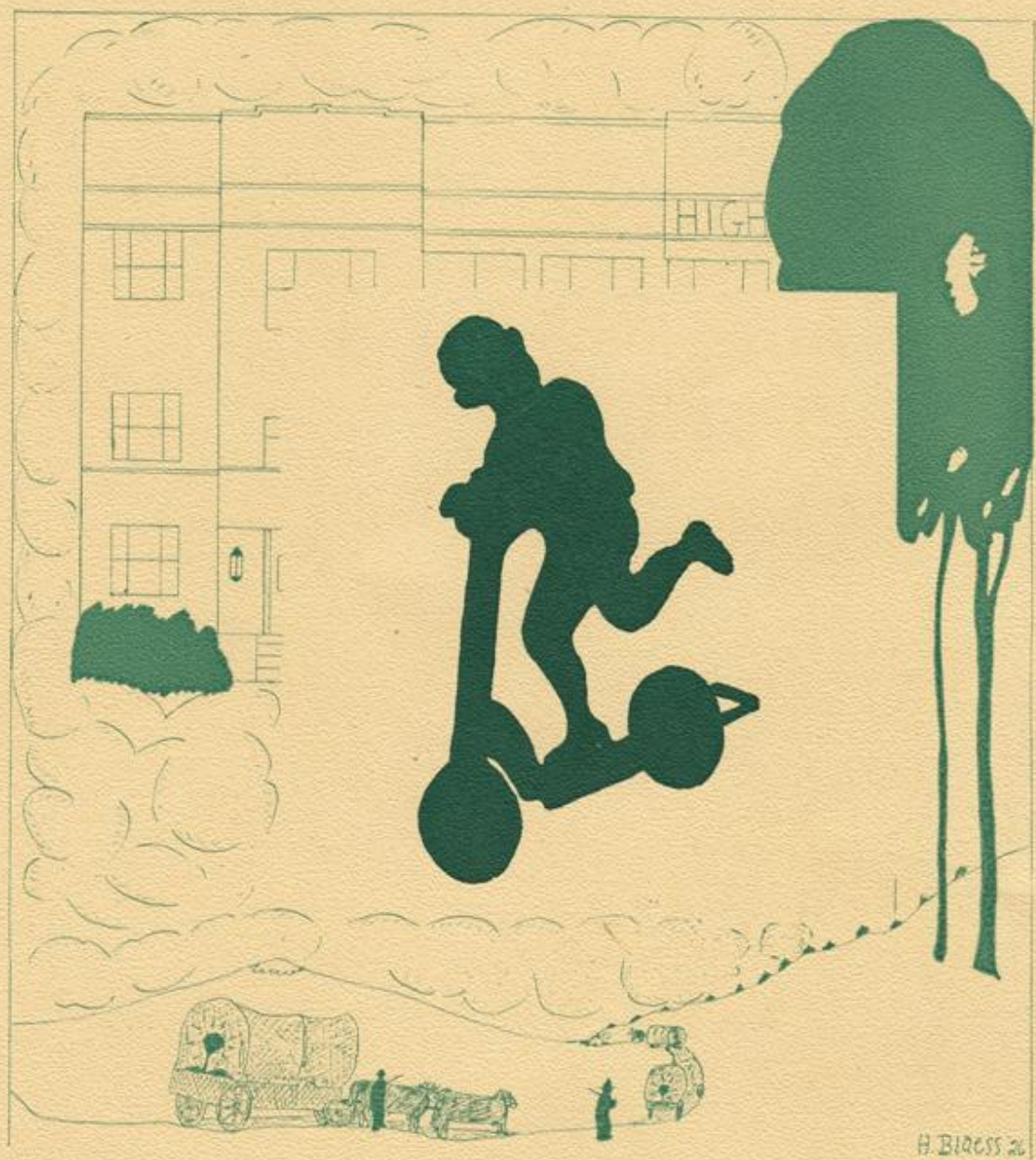


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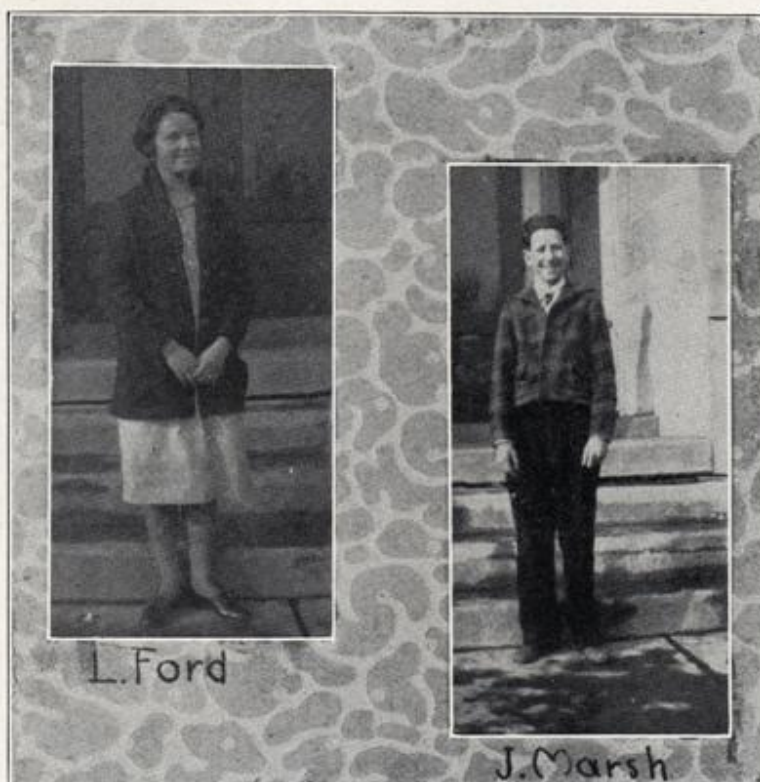

## Scholarship Awards

Through the generosity of Louis Goeppinger, as provided in his will, the following awards will be made semi-annually to members of the Junior High School who have completed the 9-A work. These awards are intended to improve scholarship and conduct and are made under the following regulations:

- 1 Only those students who have attended Boone Junior High at least four semesters shall be eligible to receive awards.
- 2 The student's conduct and general attitude toward school shall be considered in making the awards.
- 3 One award shall be made each semester to that 9-A girl, and one to that 9-A boy, whose average scholarship rank, for all semesters in Junior High, falls in the upper ten per cent of the girls, or boys, of her, or his, class, and who has performed the most praiseworthy and outstanding service for his school or community.
- 4 The award shall consist of ten dollars in gold or a gold medal suitably engraved, at the option of each winner.
- 5 A committee consisting of the Superintendent, High School Principal, and one member of the Junior High faculty shall determine the students to whom awards are made in accordance with the regulations.

At a Junior High Assembly, on the afternoon of February 10, 1925, James Marsh and Lorna Ford were awarded these scholarship prizes, which were generously provided by the late L. Goeppinger. These two honor students were the first ever to receive these awards.







## *Rip Van Winkle*

The thunder rolled ominously across the tops of the Catskill mountains and settled down into the quiet valleys. The Dutch mothers gathered their little tots into their tiny cabins to avoid the approaching storm. If they were frightened, they told them of the ghosts of Hendrick Hudson's crew who were playing ninepins far up in the hills. Sometimes the good dames told their children of Rip Van Winkle, a lazy old fellow, who had climbed over the rolling hills until he had come upon the bowlers. These mischievous old fellows gave him a draught of ale and he slept—slept for twenty long years, years of war and of peace, of tragedy and happiness. Then they awakened him and sent him down to his changed village to meet his old friends and neighbors.

On the evening of November 24, 1925, the students of Junior High dramatized this quaint Dutch legend before one of the largest and most appreciative audiences ever assembled in Boone High. The play was adapted from Irving's classic, and was directed by Miss Nellie Harvey and Mrs. Hallie Payne of the Junior High faculty.

The play opened with a charming prologue into which songs, dances, and legends of the Iroquois were introduced. This scene was acted before a chalked background which represented the lordly Hudson.

Rip Van Winkle, alias Lowell Morris, was then shown at his home, from which he was driven by the nagging of his wife, Mary Louise O'Connell. His son and daughter, Merald Ford and Eunice Martin, knew that his departure meant ill and seriously objected to his going out into the fast approaching storm.

Slowly Rip climbed the hills until he found Hendrick Hudson, (Richard Wooten) and his crew. These wicked men soon had Rip under their spell and he lay down to sleep the years away.

The awakening of Rip Van Winkle was a most noteworthy bit of acting, and his return to the village was educational as well as entertaining. Here Rip (now played by Maurice Shadle) found that his old friends had gone, that the country had been at war, and that the king no longer ruled. He even saw himself as he was in the old days. But the reuniting of Rip and his daughter ended a most clever production. Much was added to the play in the character of Brom Dutcher, Robert Sheetz, who attempted to defraud Rip of his property.

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## The Girl Reserves

The spiritual side of life is one of the most necessary but most neglected phases, but the members of this society have become a great aid in the works of church and charity, and intend to carry on through life the tasks which they have so nobly begun.
