
In the oratorical division, Frank Ehman, Loran Lair, and Ruth Williams, were entered, with Ruth winning first place.

The three winners were entered by Miss Cook, the coach, in the sub-district and state contests, where they met with some success. Donald and Ruth each advanced to the third contest, while La Verne was eliminated in the sub-district meet.





## Debate

Boone High School's debate squad this year completed one of the most successful periods of debating that has occurred in Boone forensic circles for a number of years. Having a full squad of experienced debaters including, Willis Cooper, Loren Lair, George Higgins and Richard Williams, Coach Thorngren had prospects of a fine year, and a number of debates with various schools were scheduled.

The system of two man teams, inaugurated two years ago, is now used by all the High Schools in the state. This is an advancement in debating which is worthy of praise. Having less men on the team, it gives more time to each individual participant, stimulates research work, and allows the debaters to fully develop and prove the specific issues of the debate. This system will, no doubt, continue to be used in the future.

There were ten men interested in debate this year, although only five participated in interscholastic debates. Many practice debates were held for the other members, and experience was gained which will help them in their debate work later. A plan, although not developed this year, is being worked out by which members of the second debate squads of Webster City, Ft. Dodge, and Boone will stage a

round robin tournament, while the first squads are entered in the Drake Tournament. This should prove helpful, and give real experience to new debaters.

Frank Ehman, Paul Fritch, Waldo Wheeler, Kenneth Dodge, and Edwin Duckworth were members of the second squad who will be expected to carry the brunt of the schedule next year.

Besides the regular season debates, the boys debated before the Social Science Club, the Woman's Club, and the Rotary Club. Boone entered the Drake Tournament, but unfortunately the boys were called on to debate with a team which they had met only the preceding week. They were put out of the running in the first round. The debate squad has accepted an invitation to compete in the Cedar Falls Tournament held April 9, 10, 11, and 12.

The record for the past two years includes 16 wins out of 22 debates.



The club also had charge of the Christmas tree placed in the hall, and sponsored a very instructive assembly program on Lincoln's birthday.










## COACH JIMMIE IRWIN

On November 17, Boone, playing heads-up football, surprised the highly touted Roosevelt crew, defeating them 6 to 0.

On Turkey day, playing in the midst of intense cold and snow, Boone held the victorious Marshalltown Bobcats to one of the lowest scores of their season, 15 to 0. Boone probably played the best game of the year, showing splendid spirit and co-operation.


## The Season



### WINGO, Guard





Almost every game was hard fought, with neither team leading by a large score.



# Girls' Swimming Squad

The girls' squad is organized and conducted for the purpose of giving the best girl swimmers an opportunity to prepare themselves for the annual water carnival and to become candidates for the Bonita Club, Boone's honorary swimming club. In order to make the girls' swimming squad, candidates must be able to swim the crawl, the side overarm, the double half on the back, and do a plain dive from the board.

The girls eligible for Junior and Senior Life Saving usually come from this group. Before a girl may take the necessary training she must be able to swim at least 22 lengths with any stroke, swim the back, breast, and side strokes, perform a straight front dive or racing dive in good form, and recover an object in 6 to 8 feet of water by means of a surface dive. Junior Life Saving is given to girls between the ages of 12 and 17 years; Senior Life Saving, to girls over 17 years. The girl must have at least six hours of instruction before she can take the test.

## Bonita Club

The Bonita Club is the only athletic organization in school for which both boys and girls are eligible. Since its organization in 1926 its membership has increased greatly. School opened this year with twenty-seven old members of the club returning.

The following requirements must be fulfilled with an average of 85% to secure membership and emblems:


- 1. Ability to use the following strokes in good form:
  - A. Breast stroke.
  - B. American crawl-440 yards.

  - C. Side over-arm and under-arm.D. Double half and double over-arm on back.
- 2. Ability to bob, tread, scull, do the porpoise and wheel.
- 3. Ability to do four required dives.
- 4. Ability to demonstrate the Shaefer method of resuscitation.
- 5. Ability to demonstrate the break from the various strangle holds.

Emblems may be worn on swimming suits or sweaters.

No individual is permitted to wear one of the above emblems unless it has been duly awarded by the director and coach. The emblem shall consist of a background of old gold six inches in diameter, with a black "B" four inches high and two and a half inches wide. The center of the background shall have a scarlet Bonita across the letter "B".
