Junior College Basketball

The Junior College cage season was not very successful. Boone lost eight games and won five for a percentage of .385. Probably the major factor in several of their defeats was the fact that the team was slow to start. For instance, in the Webster City game the score stood 13 to 1 against them at one time, and in the Fort Dodge game, 19 to 1. The team was built around Captain Walter Dyer, the only letterman back. He played center and his performance was always above par. Dyer was an excellent basket-shooter and finished high point man. Carroll Adams, stellar Boxholm guard and forward, was another B. J. C. star. He was lost to the team for part of the season as a result of an accident which cost him part of a finger. When he did return toward the end of the season, the injury still handicapped him greatly. The addition of Morris Reid, who entered at the second semester, was a big help to the quintet.

The Bears won three thrilling games from powerful teams. They defeated Webster City 30 to 29, Mason City 27 to 22, and Marshalltown 27 to 25. These games were undoubtedly the bright spots of the season.

The Junior College should have a powerful aggregation next year. They will have four lettermen who should be back, Adams, Peterson, Tillson and Reid. The non-lettermen returning are Maggio and Wheeler.

and the Red and Green outscored the Oskies 15 to 3 in the last two quarters to win 23 to 20.

In the charity game with East High of Des Moines the Toreadors, though tired from their battle with Oskaloosa the preceding evening, emerged on top by a 22 to 13 count. The let-down showed most in the erratic passing of the Boone boys. The Red and Green was never behind and East only threatened once, in the third quarter, pulling up within six points.

In the last game of the regular season Boone journeyed to Marshalltown to play for the conference title. The game was a thriller every minute, with the lead almost changing with the time. The Toreadors held the lead at half time, 12 to 9. At the end of the third quarter the Bobcats had an 18 to 15 lead. A free throw by Marshalltown, and a basket and a free throw for Boone put the score at 19 to 18 where it stayed until Chinstedt, stellar Boone guard, took a pass at the center of the floor, with but two seconds to go, and flipped it through the net. The ball had barely hit the floor when the final gun went off and the Toreadors had the championship by a 20 to 19 score.

At the close of the season when coaches and sport-writers picked the All Central Iowa Conferences, Boone placed two men, Brownie Knezevich and Harold Chinstedt, on the first team.

Brownie is a junior and will be back next year. He was best at one-handed shots, although his floor work was excellent. He is one of the hardest fighting members of a hard fighting team.

Chinny is another terrific battler and his floor game was always perfect. It was his uncanny ability to drop long shots that helped his teammates out of many bad spots. Chinny was co-captain for the later part of the season with Dan Enich, and was honored by being selected an All State guard.

THE TOURNAMENT

In the first game of the sectional tournament the Toreadors met the tall Perry outfit and eliminated them 28 to 16, after a fast game. They led 13 to 6 at the half and 24 to 9 at the end of the third quarter.

The Red and Green won the finals of the sectional from Madrid, in an uninteresting game, 42 to 12.

The district tournament was held at Marshalltown. Boone drew Paton for what proved to be a thrilling first round game. The Toreadors were cold in the first quarter and Paton was the opposite. The result was the score 11 to 0 in their favor. Then Boone hit its stride and the rest of the game was an exhibition of scoring plays. The score at the half was 22 to 14 in favor of the Toreadors, and the game ended 42 to 27.

In the second round the Toreadors met the tall, powerful Marshalltown team whom they had defeated twice in close games. This time the Bobcats were ready for them and had special tip-off plays which worked perfectly, as they had a tall center. The Toreadors could not do a thing in the first half and the score stood 14 to 4 against them. The second half they threatened twice, coming within three points after Brown, a tall center, had replaced Enich, but the lead Marshalltown had run up in the opening quarters was too great and the Toreadors lost 24 to 21.

A star in 1932, who was not used much this year because of mid-semester graduation. He gave very valuable assistance to his squad and coach.

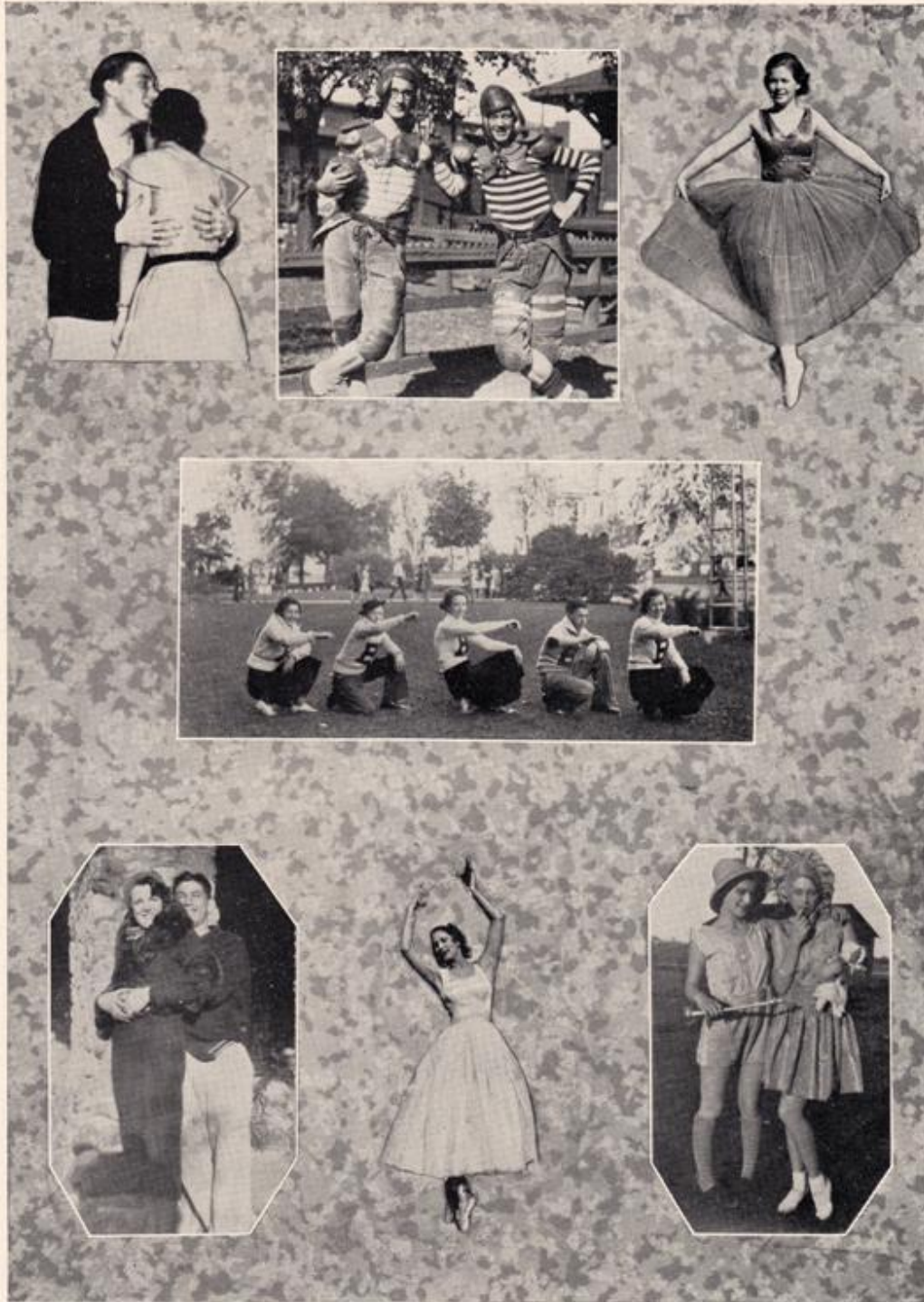
DAN ENICH, Center

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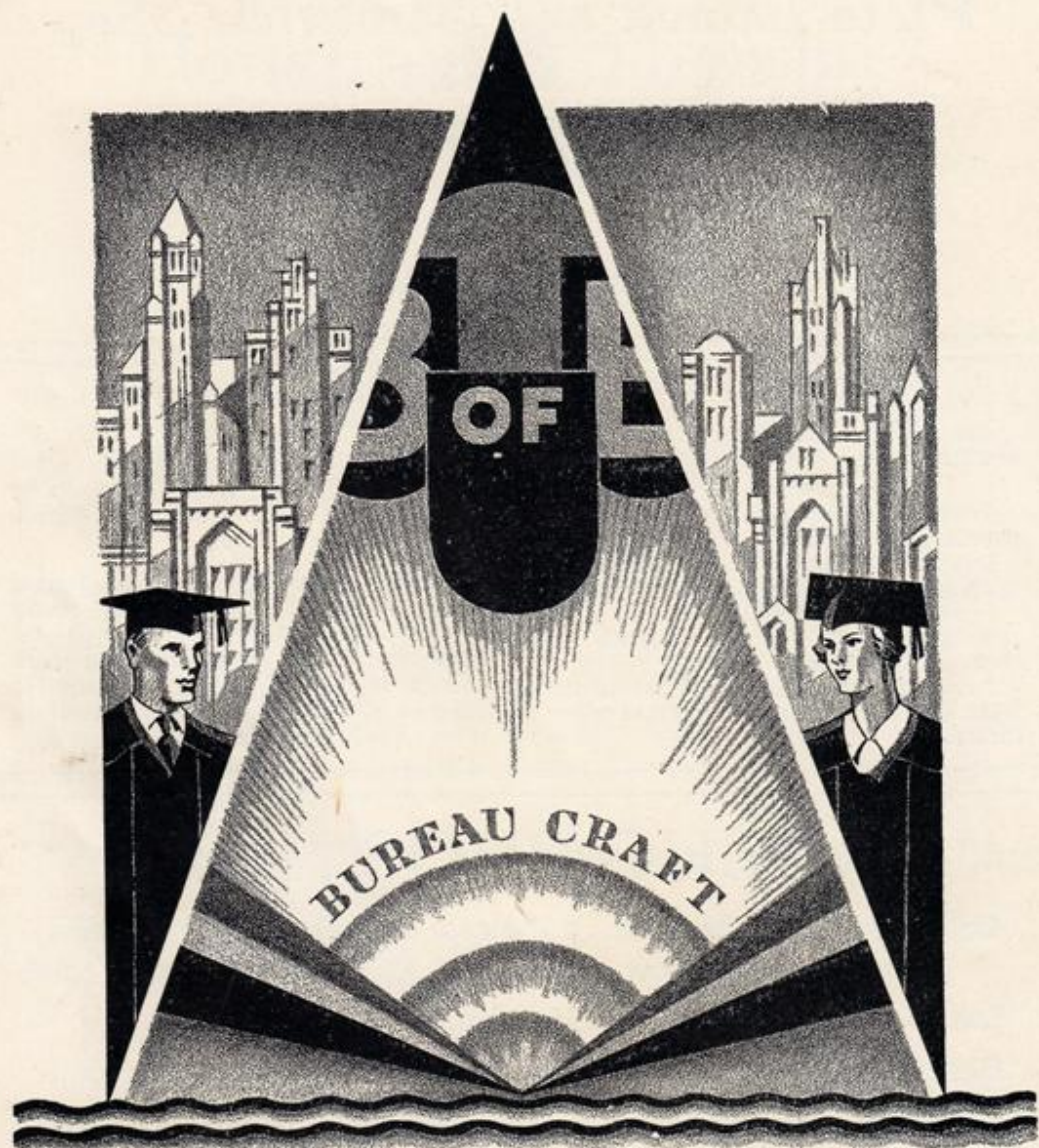
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
