



FOOTBALL

After three weeks of intensive practice under our coaches, Baldus, Stutzman, and Gluenkin, the Boone High football squad of 1945 opened its season with the Oskaloosa game. The coaches built a light but fast team from the forty-four squad members. Among these members were eight returning lettermen.

The team was in high spirits the night of the Osky game; and when they finished, the score read: Boone 24, Oskaloosa 0. The scoring was done by Jim Sturtz, who contributed 12 points on two beautiful runs, and by Welin with a pass to Currell. However, perhaps the most spectacular six points were Jim Emerson's. Instead of being satisfied with just blocking a punt, Jim stole the ball from the kicker and ran for a touchdown.

Our next two games were both non-conference and out-of-town. The team probably played its best at Fort Dodge. Nevertheless, after a scoreless first half, the Dodgers pushed across two touchdowns and beat us 13-0. The next week,



however, it was a little different story. Although the team didn't play quite so well, we were on the long end of a 26-0 score at the end of the game. The scoring was done by Denning, Mc-Dermott, Fitzgerald, Welin and Sturtz.

Our next two tilts were with Marshalltown and Grinnell. Although the team played a good game, especially our captain, "Jock" Welin, the Bobcats defeated us 22-13. Our scoring went something like this: Welin to Buckingham, T. D. No. 1; Welin to McDermott, conversion; and "Jock" on a beautiful run, T. D. No. 2. The team was out for revenge when they met Grinnell, and they got it with a sweet 40-9 score. The scoring was done by Sturtz, McDermott, and Denning.

The next week the Toreadors met a good team from Jefferson. But when the "bull-fighters" were through, Jefferson was on the short end of a 38-7 score. "Mac," Sturtz, Denning, Bob Case, and Art Johnson were the individuals most responsible for our 38 points.

This brought us to our last two games, Newton and Ames. The first was won when one of our ever-alert ends, Bill Currell, recovered a fumble on the end zone. The team protected that margin of six points for the rest of the game. The next week, however, the situation was reversed. After a scoreless three quarters, the Cyclones garnered six points and protected it till the end of the game.

Thus, with three wins and two losses, we ended up in a three-way tie with Newton and Marshalltown. Several of our boys were mentioned on all-state teams. These included Jim Sturtz, "Jock" Welin, Jim Emerson, Roger Orr, and Bill Currell.





BAND

The music department of Boone High School can look back upon one of its most successful years under the leadership of Mr. R. N. Cook, Mr. Konrad Scholl, and Miss Pauline Johnson. Mr. Cook and Mr. Scholl have completed their second year of instruction here, and Miss Johnson has completed her first year at Boone High. All three instructors have willingly given their talents to improving the music standards of this school.

Introduced this year by the music department was a merit system by which the students were able to gain a minor or major award, or a final award of a gold pin, a lyre initialed with a "B." All merits are to be earned in school-sponsored music organizations and are to be carried over from one year to the next, the total number of merits determining the award to be presented at an assembly. Merits are given for participation in small groups, such as ensembles and trios, as well as for participation in band, orchestra, and vocal groups.

Under the baton of Mr. R. N. Cook, the band department has had another outstanding year.

One of the main attractions was the marching band which provided entertainment by executing snappy drills and formations between halves at football games. After the football season, the pep band took over to help arouse enthusiasm at the basketball games; it also provided the music at the pep assemblies.

Later in the year a symphonic concert band with an increased membership was formed. This concert band of balanced instrumentation played an important role in the Christmas concert, which was presented jointly with the orchestra and vocal groups on December 16, 1945; furthermore, it presented two enjoyable concerts during the year, one to the students of Boone High and the other to the public. ORCHESTRA

Providing music for various plays and "religious emphasis" assemblies are two of the main functions of the orchestra. During the Christmas concert the orchestra played special numbers, besides accompanying the group singing. Also, during the year, various small groups, such as the string ensemble, woodwind trio, and G Club, have performed individually for the public. One of the highlights of the year was the spring concert which was presented by the orchestra February 22, 1946, before an enthusiastic audience. 
James Linn, oratorical division, a third. Maralyn Lister, dramatic division, a second. Mary Lou Bice, interpretive reading, a third.
