

I hope you all like the memorabilia coffee cup of the BHS 50th Reunion.





We were born before television, polio shots, penicillin, frozen foods, Xerox, plastics, contact lenses, frisbees, and the pill. We were born before radar, credit cards, ball-point pens, pantyhose, dishwashers, air conditioners, electric blankets, drip dry clothes, and before man walked on the moon.

In our time, closets were for clothes not for "coming out" of. Designer jeans were scheming girls names Jean or Jeanne. We had never heard of FM radio, tape decks, C.D.'s, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yogurt, guys wearing earrings, and girls wearing tatoos. A computer was a human person who was smart in math. Hardware were things sold in a hardware store, and softwear was ribbons, doilies and cloth material. A chip meant a piece of wood, and a mouse was a rodent. If you were on line it meant you got a phone that was not on a party line, or in some rural areas it meant you finally got electricity.

In our days smoking was fashionable, grass was something you mowed, coke was a cold drink, and pot was something you cooked in. A roach was a bug, and a crack was something you noticed when the plumber bent over to fix the leaky sink. Rock music was a mother's lullaby, and AIDS were helpers in the Principal's office. We were before the sex change and just had to do the best with what we had. I guess we were also the last generation that was so dumb to think you had to have a husband to have a baby.

No wonder we are so confused, but we survived! What better reason to celebrate a 50th reunion!


After high school I graduated from Cornell College in 1951, Columbia University in New York City in 1953, receiving my Master Degree in International Affairs.


